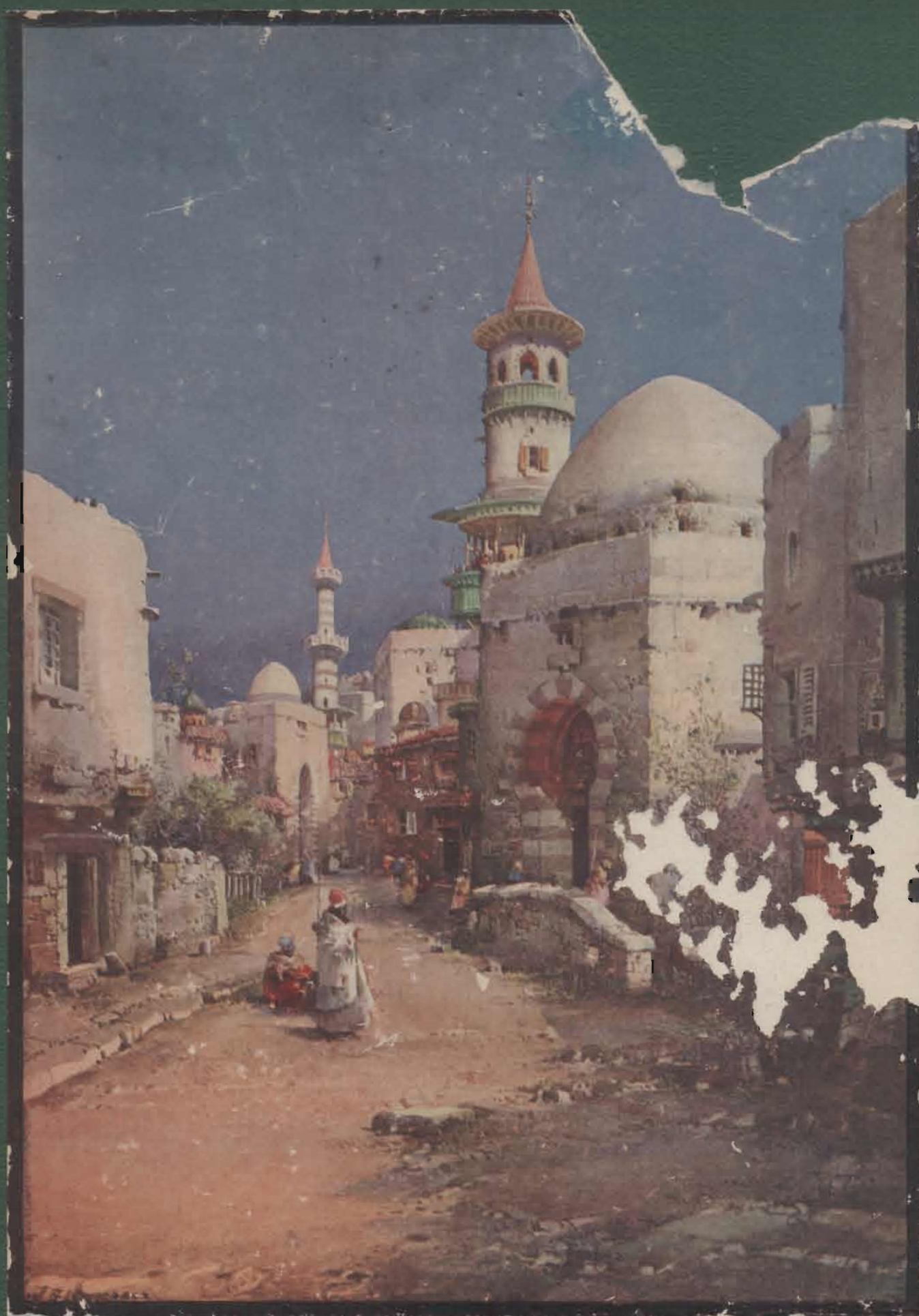

BEAVER DAM WOMEN EARN GOLF HONORS

Defeat Indian Spring, 11-1, to
Win District Second Team
Title by One Point.

MAKING a strong finish in the final round, Beaver Dam Country Club women golfers yesterday vanquished the Indian Spring team, 11-1, at Indian Spring to win the District second team competition. Beaver Dam nosed out the Army-Navy Club contingent by a lone point, 59-58, in the final standing for the season. Kenwood, meanwhile, helped Beaver Dam by defeating Army-Navy, 9-3. The win enabled Kenwood to finish third with 56½. Manor downed Woodmont, 10½ to 1½, and Columbia nosed out Washington, 6½ to 5½.

A RMY AND NAVY COUNTRY virtually clinched the women's second-team match championship yesterday at Columbia's course by defeating Washington Golf and Country Club, 10 to 2, to enhance its total to 55 points.

Beaver Dam, scoring 11½ points at the expense of Manor, moved into second place to trail Army and Navy with a total of 48 points. Kenwood lost to Columbia, 6½ to 5½, and Woodmont showed great strength in walloping Indian Spring, 11 to 1.

Routs Indian Spring to
Nose Out Army-Navy in
Second Team Race.

BEAVER DAM COUNTRY CLUB's women golfers made a Garrison finish yesterday at Indian Spring to crush the host club, 11 to 1, in the final round of the District second team competition, and nose out Army and Navy for the championship by one point.

Trailing Army and Navy by 7 points going into the concluding round, Beaver Dam's eight golfers played in their finest form of the season to ride roughshod over Indian Spring. Meanwhile, Kenwood aided the Beaver Dam cause by defeating Army and Navy, 9 to 3. Army and Navy needed only six points to clinch the championship, but Kenwood's women refused to lose any of the four matches.

Manor walloped Woodmont, 10½ to 1½, and Columbia shaded Washington, 6½ to 5½.

The Manor Club will be open during the tournament to woman members of Indian Spring. The competition for The Star Trophy is a 36-hole handicap affair, with 18 holes to be played on each of the two days. Mrs. J. E. Davis, winner in 1933, will not defend.

AL HOUGHTON was a few dollars richer today, following a pro-amateur tourney held yesterday at Kenwood, in which the Kenwood mentor outstripped his professional brothers in the pro sweepstakes, but saw the main prize go to a pro-amateur team from Baltimore.

Houghton shot a 72, one above par, to win the sweepstakes tourney, but he and Maury Fitzgerald were not good enough to overcome the inspired shooting of E. G. Barnes, amateur of Hillendale, and C. T. McMaster, the burly Hillendale pro. Barnes came to Kenwood with a handicap of 14 strokes and shot the game of his life—a 70—to prove the mainstay of the Barnes-McMaster team. TOO LONG DRAWN

Washington's Fair Players

Busier Than Men—Fall
List, Too, Heavy.

THESE is a growing disposition among the women who manage the affairs of the Columbia Golf Association to shorten the rigorous schedule through which the members of 16 teams from 10 clubs have played in first and second team matches this year, and next year may see a shorter schedule among the fair golfers with a finale somewhere along about July 1 instead of July 24 as this year.

The leaders in feminine golf look upon the team matches nowadays as affairs too long drawn out, while at the same time viewing the present method of determining the team champions as satisfactory from the standpoint of competition. But there is no doubt the trend of thought is along lines of shortening the schedule instead of maintaining the lengthy series of matches which began early in April and ended only last week with a first team victory for Chevy Chase, while the second team contest was won by Beaver Dam.

Vacations Hit Chevy Chase.

IN MOST years the team series are not won until the final match. Such was the case this year. Chevy Chase sprinted into a long lead early in the year, but came near being overhauled in the closing stages of the schedule as the Chevy Chase team was decimated by vacations. The same is true of the second-team contest, in which Beaver Dam came from behind to nose out the Army-Navy Country Club, last year's winner.

For that long stretch from April 3 until July 24 the members of the first teams played an average of close to one match each week. The second teams did the same thing, starting on April 11 and winding up on July 25, although the second teams did not play as many matches. Obviously it was impossible to keep the strongest team in the field at all times, and particularly after June 20, when the vacation season started. This situation has started a reaction among the women who, fond of golf as they are, see in the rigorous schedule of team matches entirely too long-drawn-out an affair.

Golf among the women of the clubs about the Capital has taken on all the aspects of serious competition. They have many more events than do the men, varying the team tournament with a series of tournaments that start early in April and do not wind up until October.

Keefer Tourney Next.

DOZENS of teas and parties of all kinds have been missed this year by fair golfers who played in the team affairs and other events. In only one city of which we know—Philadelphia—are the feminine links stars so busy throughout the season as they are in Washington. But the women are going to do something about it, if the rumors going around result in action at the next annual meeting of the W. D. G. A. They are not going to have their social activities punctured by a mere golf tournament. Meanwhile the month of August stretches ahead with no tournaments of any kind scheduled for the fair golfers. The next big event is the tourney for the Keefer Trophy, scheduled at Chevy Chase on September 5 and 6. This will usher in the fall season, with intercity matches, handicap tournaments and the twin major final affairs—the Curtis Cup international matches at Chevy Chase late in September and the Middle Atlantic championship at the Washington Golf and Country Club in October.

She took her first year in law in Boston, completing her course at the Washington College of Law, graduating with an LL.B. degree. Subsequently she was admitted to practice before the District and before the Supreme Court of the United States.

Miss Harris served as Dean of her Alma Mater for one year but resigned because of the growth of her private practice, however she retained her professorship at the College until September, 1933. She is now taking her sabbatical year from the Law School. She has served with honor upon the Public Welfare Commission of the District of Columbia Bar Association, is vice-chairman of the District Council for the Women's Organization for National Prohibition Reform, which organization played a large part in the repeal of the 18th Amendment. She also is a member of the Advisory Committee of the Legal Aid Society of the District of Columbia. Miss Harris is con-

sidered the leading woman attorney in the District and much to her disgust is looked upon as the Dean of Women Lawyers.

Mr. Timmy Timkins of Timkinsville, a Shetland Sheep Dog, and Miss Sukey Sukims, an alleged Wire-Haired Fox Terrier, play a very important part in her home life. When she has any time left from the above mentioned interests she devotes it to her garden.

Falling in line with the "new deal" Miss Harris drew up a new set of codes to govern all lady golfers. This was a much needed thing and will be especially beneficial in establishing handicaps. The Elizabeth Harris Cup Tournament for the high handicap players was inaugurated this year. Commonly known as duffers, these players were really given official recognition.

The various Club chairmen have been asked to get suggestions from their members so that when the executive committee is called in session they will have some real information to give the president.

Young State Champion Wins, 6-4

Virginian Is Victor Over Mrs. Betty Meckley, Taking Every Hole.

LILY HARPER, 18-year-old Portsmouth, Va., sensation, who has the unruffled calm of a Virginia Van Wie in her championship moments, and Mrs. David Clark, of Army and Navy Country Club, a seasoned campaigner, will meet today to decide who will wear the 1934 Middle Atlantic golf crown.

They won their semifinals yesterday at Washington Golf and Country Club, slim, petite Miss Harper defeating Mrs. Betty Palmer Meckley, of Indian Spring, 6 and 4, Mrs. Clark eliminating Mrs. Roland Mackenzie, of Congressional, 2 and 1.

The two finalists will clash at 10 a. m., and there will be more than passing interest in their 18-hole match.

Wins Virginia Championship.

Miss Harper, who has stepped along at a comet pace of late, captured the Virginia championship this season. Two years ago Mrs. Clark, a former Philadelphia golfer, won the same title.

It isn't often that a medalist wins a tournament, and Mrs. Clark, whose record-breaking 83 gave her the prize Monday, will be out to smash the jinx that trails so many qualifying winners who later become finalists.

Miss Harper's playing yesterday was far more impressive than that of Mrs. Clark's, but their shooting in the semifinals is no gauge of what they might do in today's match.

The 104-pound Virginian outmaneuvered and outscored Mrs. Meckley from the start. True, however, is the fact that Mrs. Meckley was decidedly off form, particularly with her approaches and putting. Miss Harper capitalized on every erratic, wobbly shot executed by the former Middle Atlantic finalist and twice former District champion, and swept into a lead she refused to surrender.

Reasonably Long on Tee Shots.

Miss Harper's forte is approaching, especially when she is within 50 or 75 yards of the greens. But there is more than that to the little lady, a versatile Lilliputian aside some of the District women she has eliminated. She can hammer out reasonably long tee shots, and usually she is pretty straight.

The Virginian, who lost in last year's Middle Atlantic finals, was 1 up to stand 3 up. She played the next five holes in 2 over par, maxing the battle with a par 3 on the 210-yard fourteenth green, reaching it comfortably with her driver.

Miss Brawner, after blasting veering hooks into the rough, completely lost her game on the difficult par-four seventh hole and pitched out of the sand to convert two putts into a 10 which tended to settle the champion-

ship then and there. She went out in 52 and came back with the identical score.

Displaying a complete reversal of the sensational form that carried her into a deadlock with Mrs. Clark on the day preceding when her tee shots were beyond reproach, Miss Brawner drove every first nine tee shot into the rough while the new champion took advantage of the situation and continued her consistent, master-stroking style of play to sweep every semblance of competition from the match.

Fischer of Beaver Dam, played off for the last two places in the first flight, with Mrs. Fischer going out.

Helen Dettweiler of Congressional, the Maryland State champion, handicapped by an injured wrist, took 103 and failed to qualify; Miss Dettweiler injured her wrist changing an automobile tire several days ago.

Mrs. Pray's courageous stand is one of the most inspiring bits of golf that has come along in many years. It proves again that any competitor, given time to practice and the will to work, can go far in golf.

A nice touch came on the final day of the tournament in the form of a lengthy telegram from Mrs. J. Marvin Haynes, the 1933 champion, congratulating the new champion on her achievement. Mrs. Haynes intends to spend the Summer at Lake Tahoe in California.

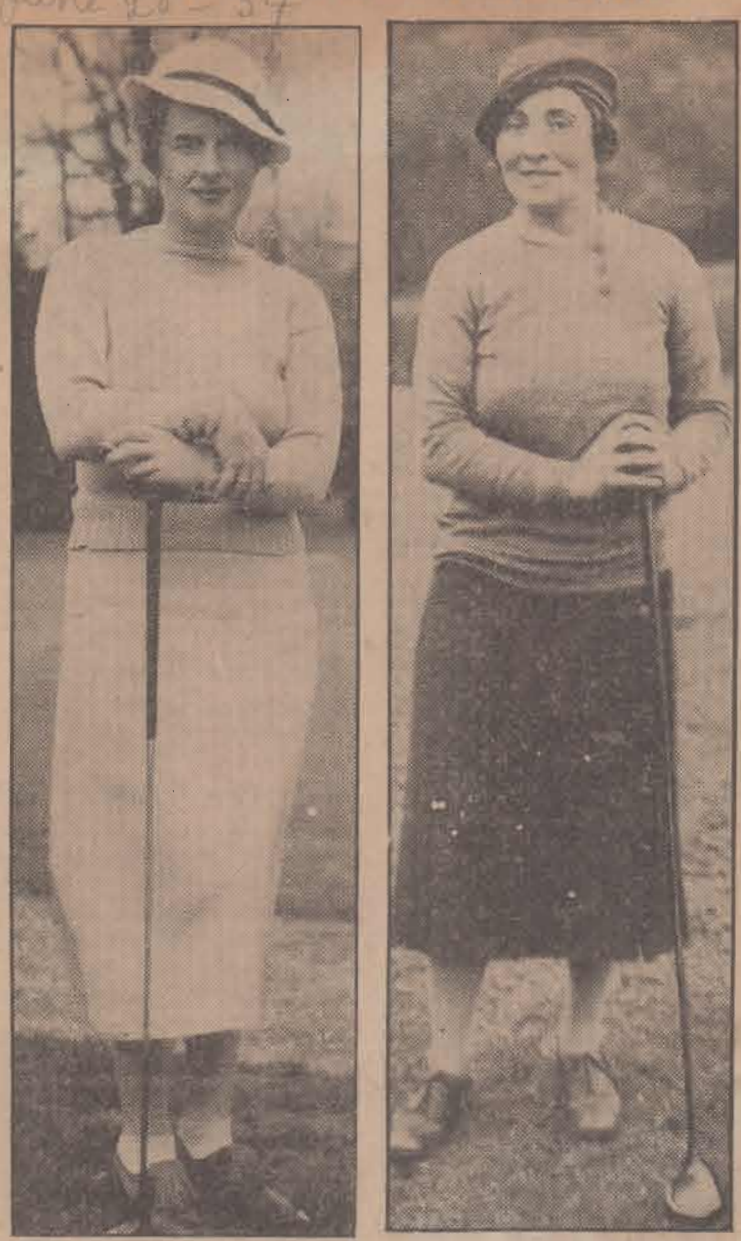
Miss Faunce Handy Winner.

THE Curtis Cup, emblematic of international women's golfing supremacy, will remain in the United States for two more years. This was determined yesterday at Chevy Chase's course when the crack American team defeated Great Britain's stars in five of the six singles matches to rout the invaders by 6½ points to 2½.

Miss Van Wie, who seldom changes her expression on the course, so determined is she with every shot, turned back the challenge of Diana Fishwick, 1930 British champion, 2 and 1 in the feature match.

After being one down at the turn, Miss Van Wie made a gallant comeback on the back nine, to blast the hopes of the No. 1 star of the English forces. The National champion, finding herself after a ragged start, shot the last eight holes in only one over par.

Miss Orcutt Brilliant.

Four times Metropolitan champion and star of the Scotch four-some matches, Miss Orcutt played brilliantly against Molly Gourlay, veteran English golfer, winning, 4 and 2, after shooting the 16 holes in four over par. One down at the fourth, the New Jersey girl took the next six holes to reach the turn 5 up—a lead which Miss Gourlay found impossible to overcome.

Seventeen-year-old Pam Barton was no match for Mrs. Cheney, bowing by 7 and 5 before the withering blast unleashed by the Californian on the last five holes. Going out in 42 and standing 3 up, Mrs. Cheney shot the next four holes in one under par, winning each hole, and shattering the young British girl's hopes on the thirteenth green. It was the most decisive victory of the day for the Americans. Mrs. Cheney finished three over par, while Miss Barton, runner-up for the British title, was way off her game.

The most consistent golf of the day was provided by Charlotte Glutting, who conquered Wanda Morgan, 3 and 2. Three up at the turn after capturing the first 3 holes, Miss Glutting refused to crack, although Miss Morgan won the tenth and twelfth to make the match more interesting. Miss Glutting finished strong, climaxing the battle with a beautiful birdie 4 on the sixteenth hole.

Miss Glutting Victor.

Miss Glutting, out in 40, 2 over par, wound up the 16 holes 2 over par. Many were of the opinion she shot the best golf of the day in the face of stubborn opposition, such as that supplied by Miss Morgan.

Mrs. Hill won from Diana Plumptre, 3 and 2, overcoming the pretty British girl's opening-hole lead to sweep into a 2-up majority at the end of 9 holes. IN A PREVIOUS KENWOOD MAGAZINE a glamorous story glorifying the game of a youthful miss appeared among its very readable contents. This writer believes Kenwood can boast of a feminine golfer just as good if not superior to your lady who received the acclaim.

Miss Virginia Pope, former George Washington University champion, who recently broke the Kenwood women's course record and shot the lowest individual round in the District girl's junior at Congressional is the woman I have in mind. I doubt if there is another young golfer in this section, excepting the slender Miss Lilly Harper, of Portsmouth, Va., who has a better or more compact swing than Miss Pope.

Virginia, in shooting her record breaking 32 over her home course had two three-putt greens and an equally bad five on a par three hole helping make what could have been a score equalling the great record breaking 61 shot by Al Houghton at Washington and the 62 at Indian Spring by Roger Peacock.

The former women's competitive record for the Kenwood course was set by Mrs. J. Marvin Haynes, former District and Middle Atlantic champion who posted an 84 during the qualifying tests for the District championship in 1933. Maureen Orcutt, National ranking star from New Jersey, had an 82 over the Kenwood layout in an exhibition match last Fall but her round can not stand as a competitive or non-competitive record because all putts were not holed.

Miss Pope started off on her brilliant round with a well deserved 5 on the long par 4 first hole that ranks as one of the stiffest starting holes in the country. Her card shows a 6 on the second hole, the result of a bad second shot.

She two putted the third green for a par 4 but missed a short putt on the fourth that would have given her another par 4. Another par was chalked up on the par 5, fifth hole and still another on the short par 3, sixth hole.

Golf Winner 'Talked Into' Tournament

Miss Winifred Faunce Had Not Practiced for Two Years.

Took Up Game Because It Was Something She Hadn't Tried.

By Virginia Lee Warren.

WHENEVER a golfer fails to smash par, he's likely to think it's because he doesn't give enough time to the game.

"Golf is like piano playing," he reasons. "Miss a couple of days' practice and you sure can tell the difference in your technique. Now if I could only go 'round the course every day I'd get somewhere. That's the way these tournament winners do."

And he adds, "Nobody ever got anywhere playing week-end golf." This is a perfect cue for Miss Winifred Faunce to step right up and say, "Is that so?"

But being the modest, diffident person she is, Miss Faunce does nothing of the kind. Instead, she declares there is nothing remarkable about her winning tournament after tournament with only week-end practice behind her. When she carried off the District Women's Golf championship in June—most important tournament of all—she had gone for two whole years without her customary week-end playing.

Put Thrill Into Play.

Since the other players in the big tourney knew Miss Faunce had paid scant attention to golf courses in the last couple of years they didn't regard her as a formidable opponent. And she certainly did not consider herself a serious threat.

"I never would have dreamed of entering," she said yesterday, "if a group of women friends hadn't talked me into it."

Foremost in that group was Mrs. Howard Simons, chairman of the tournament committee. If Mrs. Simons had hoped to inject more than the usual thrill and excitement into the fray, she was admirably successful.

Winifred Faunce's victory was a complete upset. Not only did she win the championship. She became the medalist as well as the champion—a rare combination. And yet she has never been anything but a week-end player.

Eight years ago she took her first whack at a golf ball. She had already made a reputation as a swimmer: was holder of the South Atlantic and District diving championships.

Tried Something New.

"But I lost interest in swimming," she said. "And I decided to take up golf. Why? Oh, I don't know. Simply because it was something I hadn't tried, I suppose."

She learned from Jack Tucker, professional at the West Potomac Club, how to handle her golf clubs. Two years after she began playing she won her first tournament, the Evening Star Trophy. Then golfing honors came to her frequently. "Came to her" is used advisedly. Winifred Faunce didn't have the time to go out after them in the serious manner of most cup winners.

In addition to working in the Postoffice Department by day, she went to George Washington University at night. That left her only an hour or so in the early mornings, once or twice a week, for golf. After she received her A. B. from George Washington she went to Columbia University for graduate study. While she was getting her master's degree she had less time than ever for mashies and putters.

Miss Faunce not only plays less frequently than most golfers, she also plays less strenuously.

"No 36 holes for me," she smiled. "When I first began I made a rule that I'd never play more than 18."

Miss Faunce Is Lone D.C. Qualifier

Manor Club Star's 92 Puts Her in National Match Play.

CHESTNUT HILL, Pa., Oct. 1 (Spl.).—Winifred Faunce, District champion, shot a 92 today to become Washington's lone qualifier for match play in the National Women's golf championship.

Miss Faunce, member of the Manor Club, carded a 47 on the outside nine, returning in 45. She made the grade by one stroke.

Two other Washingtonians, Mrs. Leo Walper, of Kenwood Club, and Mrs. L. G. Pray, of Manor, failed to qualify. Mrs. Walper skyrocketed to 51-49-100, and Mrs. Pray withdrew after compiling a 50 on the first nine and 34 shots for the next five holes.

Wind Spoils Tee Shots.

A stiff wind played havoc with Miss Faunce's tee shots on the third, thirteenth and eighteenth holes, where she went two over par on each. On the 515-yard third, Miss Faunce required four shots to get out of the rough and trap, and finally three-putted, winding up with a 7. She knocked her ball into tall grass to the left of the thirteenth fairway, taking a 6.

Miss Faunce started back nicely with 5-5, even par, but from the twelfth to the fifteenth had trouble reaching the greens in regular figures. She finished with a 6 on the par 4 eighteenth.

There were only two bright spots on Mrs. Walper's card. She birdied the long fifth, and parred the 420-yard fifteenth. Mrs. Pray's only pars were made on the ninth and tenth. Miss Faunce meets Mrs. Harley Higbie, of Detroit, in the first round match tomorrow at 10:50.

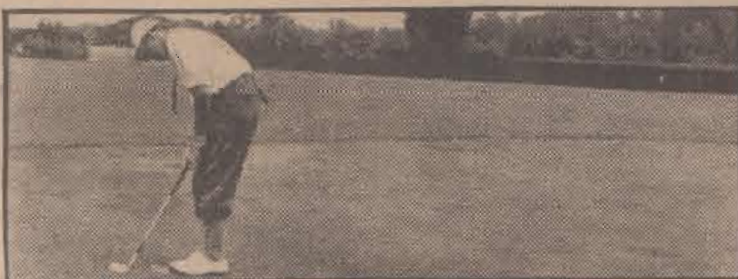

CURTIS CUP LAY BEGINS THURSDAY

Fair Golfers. Rivaling Men
In Ability, to Battle at
Chevy Chase.

NOWHERE along the bunkered path to the cup could you find a finer group of feminine golfers than the dozen and a half determined women who will be gathering at the Chevy Chase Club today and tomorrow to start their practice rounds in advance of one of the great classics of the golf season in the United States—the International matches for the Curtis Cup—symbol of team supremacy between the United States and Great Britain in the realm of the driver and the mashie.

They play the game like the best of the men, these sturdy representatives of the two great golfing nations of the world, and they are due, if weather conditions favor, to unleash some scoring that will put to shame the best efforts of all but the top flight amateur golfers of the country. Gathered at Chevy Chase this week will be all the top-flight feminine divot-diggers of the world, barring only three who have not been named on the two teams because of alleged infractions of the amateur rule. Joyce Wethered, acknowledged queen of world golfers; Enid Wilson, another sturdy English girl, who was a definite threat to win the United States title last year, and Helen Hicks, foremost woman professional of the world, will not be among those competing, but every feminine club wielder among those recognized as the top-notchers of their respective countries will be at Chevy Chase when the show opens next Thursday.

A Talented Array.

NOT since golf emerged from the red-coat and pat-ball stage has such a distinguished group of women golfers gathered in Washington since the national woman's championship was held at Chevy Chase in 1908, the year that Mary McCain qualified for the championship. The Curtis Cup, presented by a Boston sportswoman and former national champion, corresponds in women's golf to the Walker Cup, symbol of supremacy among the male players of the world.

Here are the salient facts of the coming clash between the two teams: The place—Chevy Chase Club, Chevy Chase, Md.

The time—September 27 and 28, matches to begin at 1:30 p.m.

Method of play—Doubles matches catch foresomes, each side plays one ball on September 27.

In the top match, Virginia Van Wie, American national champion, concentrating on victory with all her acknowledged power, turned back Diana Fishwick by 2 and 1, with card five strokes above par for the first 17 holes.

Maureen Orcutt, sturdy New Jersey girl, playing the best golf of the day for the long stretch, needed 4s on the last two holes for a 79, when she beat Molly Gourlay by 4 and 2.

Mrs. Leona D. Cheney of Los Angeles, blond and jolly, turned back the nervously determined challenge of 17-year-old Pamela Barton of London by 7 and 5, needing par from the thirteenth hole for a 78.

Charlotte Glutting of New Jersey, with pars on the last 3 holes for an 80, beat Wanda Morgan of England by 3 and 2.

Mrs. Opal S. Hill of Kansas City, with three pars left for an 82, beat Diana Plumptre, statuesque British beauty, by 3 and 2.

Both Teams in U. S. Meet.

BRAVERY personified, determination written all over their features, the British team went out to stem the onrushing tide of American victory in those singles matches. But their best efforts could not stop the unrelenting rush of the Americans. Gearing up their games to top speed, the United States girls led in five out of six matches at the turn.

Members of both teams left the Capital last night for Philadelphia, where the national championship will open Monday.

Congratulates Americans.

A MODEST little speech from Mrs. Vare and Miss Chambers, tall and sturdy English captain, wearing one of the orchids which were presented to all members of the British team, rose to speak. She extolled the sportsmanship of the winning team; congratulated it on its fine golf, and expressed the hope that all would meet in England in 1936 for the renewal of the matches.

Previously President Jacques had paid high tribute to the officers of the Chevy Chase Club, and particularly to General Chairman Robert Stead, and to Mrs. Frank R. Keefer, chairman of the Women's Committee.

For the golf itself, most of the gallery followed the match in which Pam Barton, sturdy British lass, played Mrs. Cheney. They saw Pam, nervous at the start, win the first hole and then collapse before the pressure put on by Mrs. Cheney. Much the same situation existed in

You Washington golfers who haven't seen the top-notchers of women's golf are due for a real surprise this week, from the tremendous hitting of Maureen Orcutt and Charlotte Glutting to the meticulously accurate work around the greens of Mrs. Opal Hill. They don't baby the ball. They hit and they hit it hard, as a golf ball should be hit.

Americans Are Favored.

WHO will win? Well, that doesn't make a great deal of difference. After all it is a sporting event of first magnitude and the winning or losing for its own sake cuts small figure. But the American team, even without Helen Hicks and Mrs. Vare, appears like a strong outfit and one which should win. Put Miss Wilson and Miss Wethered on the British side and the story might be different. But they won't be around when the firing begins.

The doubles matches on Thursday should be interesting to a lot of folk who will watch a form of play not often used in this country. Two players on each side play one ball, making alternate shots. In this opening contest. There are only three matches on Thursday, with 12 players competing, six on each side. On Friday the singles will be played, again with 12 players, six to a side. GIRL STARS JELIN AS REAL THREATS

Next Week's Mid-Atlantic
Title Play Test for Young
State Champs.

ACOUPLE of young women who are potential candidates for future Curtis Cup teams and possibly potential national champions will be among the leading contenders for the Middle Atlantic women's championship next week at the Washington Golf and Country Club. Helen Dettweiler, brilliant young Congressional Country Club star, holder of the Maryland State women's title, a girl who has been playing golf only three years, and Lily Harper, slender and demure youngster from Portsmouth, Va., are the two youngsters who appear at the moment to be just about the best in women's golf in this section.

Possibly they are future national championship material, and possibly a couple of years hence either or both of them will be on a Curtis Cup team representing the United States. Time alone will tell that and of their possibilities as future champions. For a section which never has produced a woman golfer of national caliber, and a consistent qualifier in national events, the Mid-Atlantic sector too long has lagged behind in the development of young feminine players.

Only Five Ex-Champions.

NO SINGLE factor in the game will do more to develop young golfers than fast competition. For this reason, nine years ago the Middle Atlantic Golf Association inaugurated its women's championship. To date, the tourney has been won by only five golfers. The present champion is Mrs. Jean Jones of the Country Club of Virginia at Richmond, who beat Lily Harper on the eighteenth

SHE weighs just exactly 100 pounds as she squares away to hit her tee shot 200 yards down the fairway.

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STRAIGHT OFF THE TEE

THE Middle Atlantic section at last seems about ready to come in for its proper recognition as a center of good feminine golfers.

Either of the two fair players who met today for the mid-Atlantic title at the Washington Golf and Country Club is good enough to do well in a national championship, and it is quite possible that with ample time on one side and a little more experience on the other, one of them might win the big crown.

Mrs. David H. Clark of the Army-Navy Country Club, mother of three children, a veteran of the golf wars for several years and a former Philadelphia debutante, plays golf for the fun of it. She probably would go fairly far in a national if she were sufficiently interested to go in for it seriously. But golf, to her, is sport and fun, and when it becomes hard work, as it is in a national, she does not care greatly for it.

LILY HARPER, the slim young Portsmouth, Va., miss, who met Mrs. Clark today for the title, packs more power and punch, more downright, cold-blooded concentration than a dozen lassies her age.

At 18 years Lily Harper looms as the best feminine golfer ever produced in this sector. She does need experience, but you never would know it to watch her calm and cool demeanor as she wallops the ball to distances many of the better male players envy.

Her distance—those 200-yard wallops—is amazing to the women who have watched her play this week at Washington. She obtains it by a fine pivot and exceptionally good wrist action, for she hasn't much weight. When the youngster finishes this tournament she will tip the scales at less than 100 pounds. She loses several pounds in every tourney and she started this one weighing 102.

Lily is very much like Pam Barton, the British youngster, who captured the fancy of the galleries in the Curtis Cup matches at Chevy Chase. And she isn't far from being as good a golfer as Pam.

IT TAKES a lot of golf to whip a seasoned campaigner like Betty Meckley by a margin like 6 and 4. Yet that is what the Harper kid did yesterday in the semi-final of the tournament. The firing will start at 9:30. The women later will play an 18-hole round at the course.

AMERICA'S stalwart golfing daughters yesterday served warning to the British stars that they intend to hold on to the Curtis Cup for another year.

Paced by Virginia Van Wie, National champion, and encouraged by a record-breaking score by a former teammate, Helen (Billy) Hicks, Uncle Sam's defenders cut loose with impressive practice rounds that augur well for their chances in the international matches Thursday and Friday at Chevy Chase.

Shorn of her amateur status, now America's first "business woman golfer," Miss Hicks, the smiling, smooth-stroking New Yorker, gave the women something to shoot at by scoring a 38-39-77. She finished 1 stroke above the women's par, which will be observed in the matches this week, to smash the feminine course record by a stroke.

Van Wie Shoots 80.

Miss Van Wie, a native of Chicago, who conquered Miss Hicks in the 1933 National championship, looked at the Chevy Chase layout for the first time and stroked around leisurely for an 80, the best score reported by any the American regulars. Without so much as batting an eyelash the tall, slender champion stepped up to her first putt on the initial green and tapped in a 20-footer for a birdie 3. Out in 42, she birdied the fifteenth and sixteenth, playing the back nine in an even par 38. A 7 on the 564-yard eighth caused her score to skyrocket on the first nine.

Charlotte Glutting, of West Orange, N. J.; Maureen Orcutt, Englewood, N. J.'s pride; Mrs. Opal Hill, of Kansas City, and Lucille Robinson, of Des Moines, Iowa, aggregated 82 each. Despite the fact that an original field of 157 has been reduced to 64 via the 18-hole qualifying route it is just as certain as golf can ever be that the two contending American and British Curtis Cup teams that fought it out at Washington last week ultimately will produce the winner of the thirty-eighth women's championship.

The "big six" of the tournament is composed of Glenna Collett Vare, five times champion; Virginia Van Wie, the soft spoken Chicagoan who is seeking her third successive title; Maureen Orcutt and Charlotte Glutting, New Jersey stars; Mrs. Leona Cheney of San Gabriel, Calif., and Diana Fishwick, the golden-haired British girl who won her native championship in 1930.

Glenna Is Generous.

MRS. VARE'S remarkable showing in the qualifying round yesterday when she shared a three-way tie for the medal at 82 was not surprising to the squad she captained at Chevy Chase last week when the American team trounced England. She was playing in so much better form than some of them that they tried to prevail upon her to enter the conflict against John Bull's invaders. However, Mrs. Vare demurred, saying that she had been appointed a non-playing captain and a non-playing captain she would remain.

Rated along with the five outstanding Americans are four other domestic contenders—Lucille Robinson of Des Moines, twice winner of the Western championship; Marion Miley, slender Dallas youngster; the veteran Mrs. Opal Hill of Kansas City and Mrs. Frank B. Goldthwait of Dallas.

Britishers Clash.

BESIDES Miss Fishwick, the other English team players who survived the medal test are Dori Chambers, Molly Gourlay, Wanda Morgan and Diana Plumptre. The latter two are considered having a good chance of going far in the championship, provided they survive to day's taxing two 18-hole rounds.

Among the outstanding first-round matches were the meetings between Miss Orcutt and Ada McKenzie, former Canadian champion, and Miss Glutting and Margaret Woodhouse, Atlanta, 1929 Southern champion.

The luck of the draw sent Miss Fishwick against her compatriot Miss Chambers. Betty Jameson, 17-year-old Dallas star, Southern champion and youngest player of the surviving field, encountered the tall and smiling Miss Plumptre.

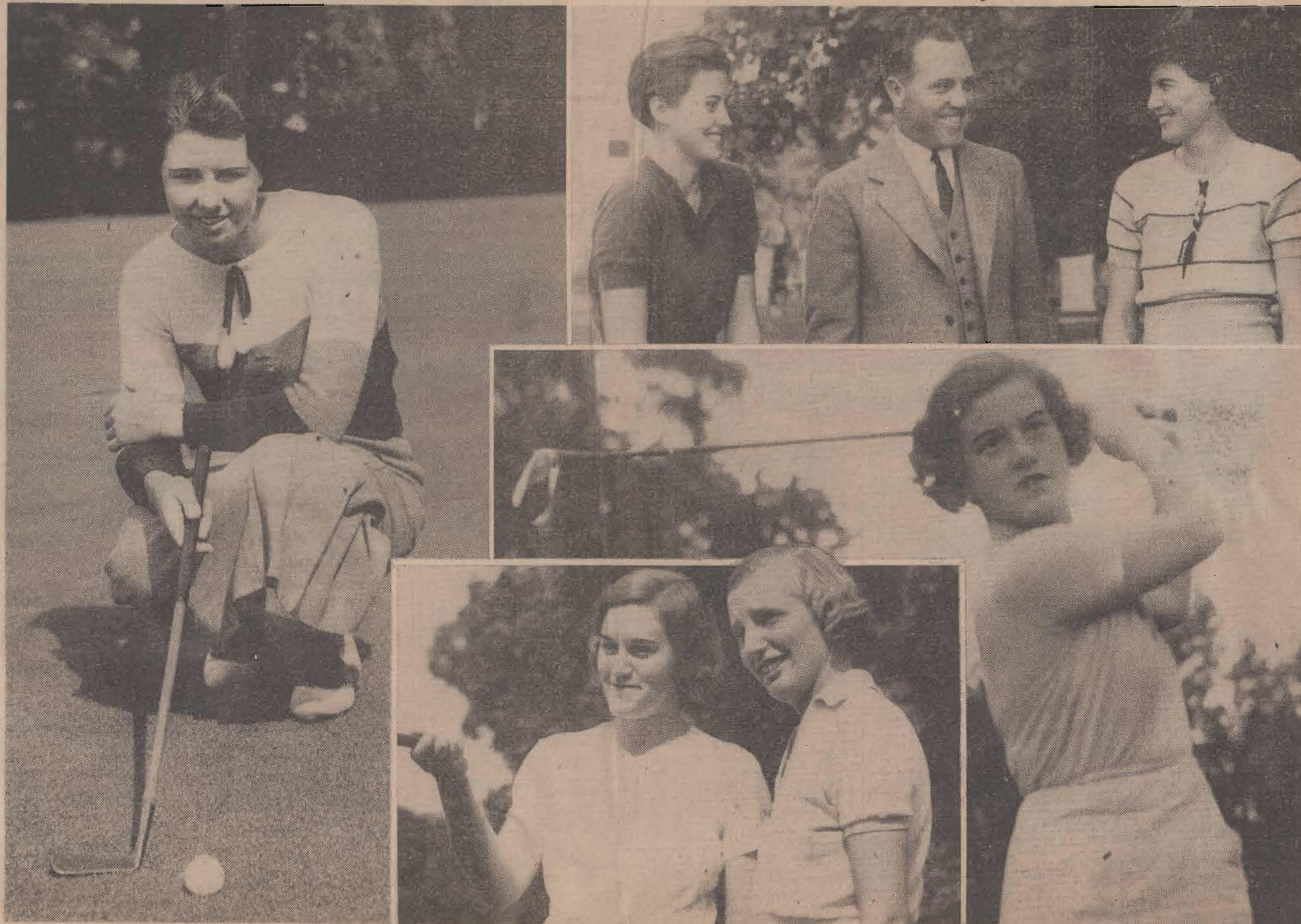

Mrs. Hill Is One Lucky Opal—at Golf

Is Only Player Ever to Win Western Crown for Three Times.

THEY say an opal is unlucky to anyone except those born in October.

But Mrs. Opal Hill, of Kansas City, who has to carry the Opal in her name all the time, wasn't born in October and still she has been lucky in golf.

Mrs. Hill is here with the American Curtis Cup team to meet the British stars at Chevy Chase Thursday and Friday. She was one of nine selected. She helped the Yankees triumph at Wentworth, England, two years ago, and she bids fair to play an important role in this week's matches.

Unlike other nationally famous women golfers, Mrs. Hill did not take up golf until she was 30 years old. She took it up for her health on the advice of a physician. Her progress was both miraculous and meteoric.

Playing in her first tournament at the Hillcrest Golf Club in Kansas City a few months after she had instructions, Mrs. Hill scored a 142. Most women would have become discouraged, but not this brave, slender little woman. Five months later after constant and faithful practicing Mrs. Hill shot a 92 to win her first tournament.

First Championship.

A few months later she was shooting in the low eighties, and less than two years after she swung her first club Mrs. Hill was playing in her first National championship. That was at St. Louis, where she qualified with 87, and reached the quarter-finals only to

lose to Edith Cummings, 4 and 3.

Since then Mrs. Hill has been thrice semifinalist and twice medalist in the National championship. At Los Angeles in 1930 she won the medal with a brilliant 79—the only golfer in the field to crack 80. Not only that but she is the only golfer who ever has won the West-

ern championship three times in all the 33 years of this tournament, considered by many the equivalent of a National championship. This season Mrs. Hill won the Trans-Mississippi championship, defeating Lucille Robinson in a stirring 36-hole match.

Add to her remarkable record

a 68 for a par 70 course carved out last year at the Leavenworth Country Club in Kansas. In the memory of man no woman ever has scored that low, but Mrs. Hill modestly admits that at the rate the young players are shooting these days it will be broken.

Yet in view of the fact that she

took up golf so late in life—which was 11 years ago—Mrs. Hill has never won the National championship, though she has been on the threshold several times.

Her golfing career is quite parallel with that of the late Walter Travis, who took up golf for his health when he was past 30, and

AMERICA'S feminine golf stars, heavy favorites to retain the Curtis Cup, were held to a draw by Great Britain's fighting team in yesterday's Scotch foursomes, at Chevy Chase course in a renewal of the international matches born two years ago at Wentworth, England.

This was perhaps the most dramatic struggle of the three, with every shot on the last three holes being vitally important in the ultimate decision.

America's winning twosome was composed of Maureen Orcutt, the long-driving Englewood, N. J., star, who has both political and golf ambitions, and Mrs. L. D. Cheney, of San Gabriel, Calif., a former Western champion. They gave Uncle Sam 1 point by defeating Diana Fishwick, 23-year-old former British champion, one-time conqueror of Mrs. Glenna Collett Vare, nonplaying American captain, and Wanda Morgan, a British star of note, 2 up. This match was sternly contested, the English golfers faltering on the fourteenth, fifteenth and eighteenth holes, after a hole-for-hole battle on the first nine.

British Take Match.

The British came over the top in the third and final match of the day when Diana Plumpton, English ace, and Mrs. J. B. ("Pat") Walker, of Ireland, who styles herself an "Internationalist," laid waste to the hopes of Mrs. Opal Hill, of Kansas City, a three-time Western champion, and Lucille Robinson, of Des Moines, Iowa, present Western titleholder. 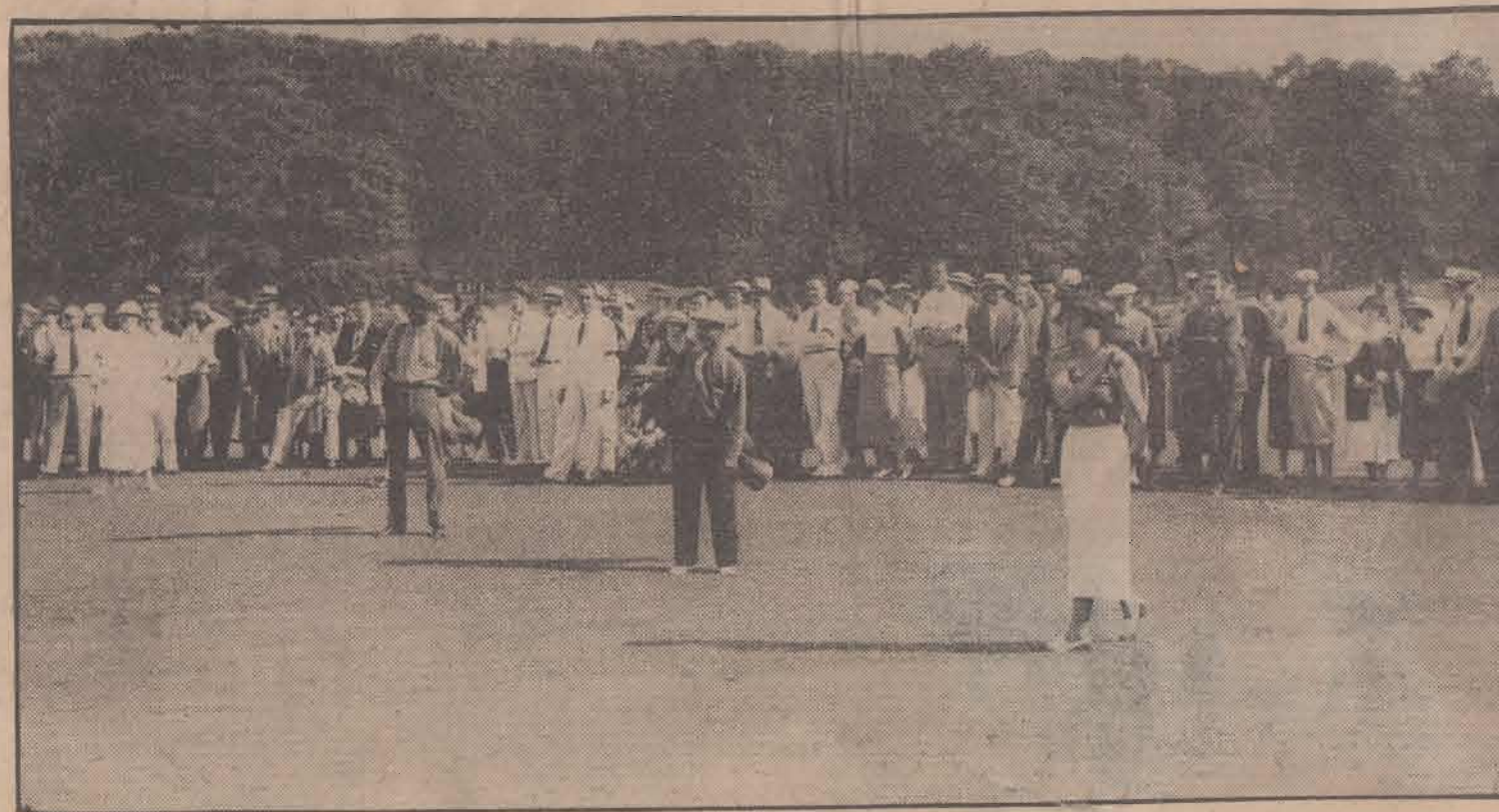

Canada May Vie In Cup Races Next Year

Possibility of Syndicate
Entering 1935 Yacht
Is Discussed.

ST. JOHNS, N. B., Sept. 27 (U.P.). Possibility that Canadian sportsmen may form a syndicate to challenge for the America's Cup was the subject of talk in yachting circles tonight, despite skepticism of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club members, who believe the effort would be too expensive.

The idea of a Canadian challenge was brought up by Commodore James W. Barnes, of the Royal Lennebeacasis Yacht Club, who expressed the belief that a boat built in eastern Canada, and manned by deep-sea mariners, would be able to lift the cup from the New York Yacht Club.

Canada last challenged in 1881, when the Atlantic was defeated, and shortly afterward the America's Cup committee ruled that no inland boat could challenge for the trophy. This was pointed out by the Royal Canadian as precluding any chance of building a successful challenger, since most of Canada's yachting is on inland waters.

That is the question Fulton Brylawski wants to know and the question he has put up to the United States Golf Association for decision.

With the contest close, one of the players putted from 30 feet away and the caddy, believing the ball would stay short of the cup, didn't pull the pin out until the ball lobbed over the lip of the tin. Then, in pulling the pin, he knocked the ball 15 feet away. And now the question is whether the ball may be deemed to have holed out and whether the penalty for a ball striking the pin applies in four-ball match play.

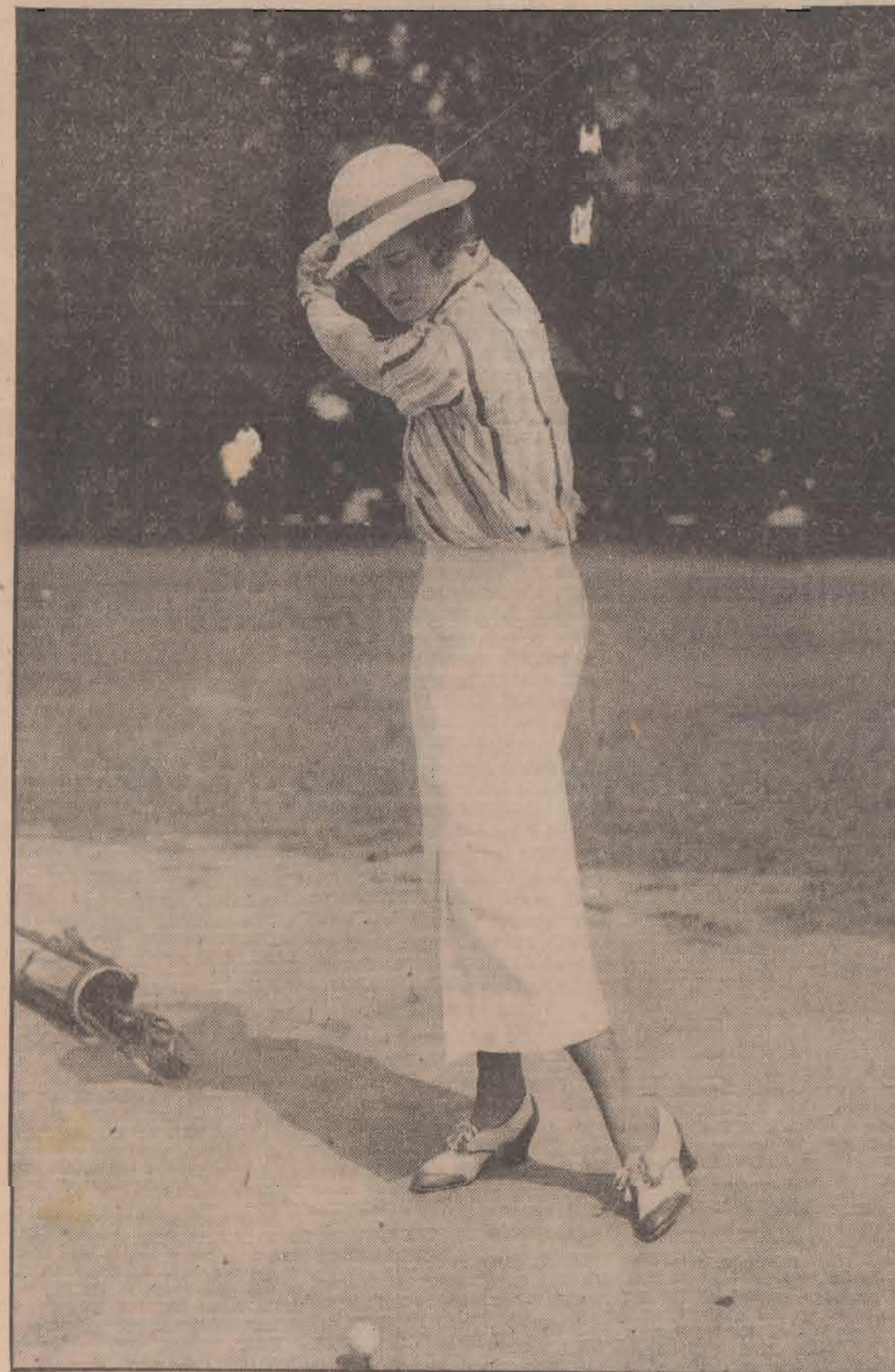

Plenty of Room for a Swing Makes Long Drives Longer

Miss Virginia Pope Sponsors Briefest of Shorts; Hates Annoy Miss Helen Dettweiler; Miss Elizabeth Harris Insists on Three Pockets.

PLENTY of room at the top. That's what women golfers demand of clothes they wear on the links. While the game is the thing, Washington players declare it pays to give some attention to the costume, since a smashing drive and a talent for putting aren't much good if tight-fitting blouse and skimpy skirt hamper free play.

Players who have a habit of dragging cups home after tournaments laughingly say they don't care how they look, they just want to wear clothes that don't get in their way while playing. But these women either have a strong subconscious style sense, or they are gently fibbing, because they manage to look smart though sportsmanlike on the golf course.

Miss Virginia Pope, who tees off at the Kenwood Club, should get most of the credit if shorts become popular among championship players.

"None of the other women at Kenwood have been wearing them, but I gave them a try last week and

liked them fine," said Miss Pope yesterday. Now that the first pair of knees has been bared, others are likely to be exposed, believes the young golfer.

Miss Pope's shorts costume is different from the usual blouse and panty affair. Hers is made in one piece, has no sleeves, is cut low in back. The material is a cool green and white cotton.

Before she tried this practical and brief costume, Kenwood's prize young woman golfer wore sun-back pique dresses in all white or in blue and white. She has also gone swinging down the links in one and two-piece seersucker frocks but these are always sleeveless.

"I've found even a tiny cap sleeve bothers me in playing," said Miss Pope. "It's the same way with a hat. I don't wear any. Dark glasses? No. The sun doesn't seem to hurt me. I play bareheaded all summer long."

Another young player who scorns any type of headgear on the golf course in summer is Miss Helen Dettweiler, Congressional Club's pride among the "baby" niblick wielders.

"A hat annoys me," was the reason she gave for going bareheaded no matter how hot the sun.

Blue Seersucker.

Since blue is Miss Dettweiler's favorite color, she selects most of her golfing clothes in that color. She has found two-piece seersucker frocks, consisting of long-tailed blouse and skirt with pleat in front and back, are the best for keeping one's score down. The blouses have short, pleated sleeves and an inverted pleat down the center back so there is plenty of room for a wallop swing at the ball.

Socks with white or brown golf shoes complete the costume.

It's all right for young golfers to play without hats if they agree Mrs. Donald M. Ketner and Miss Elizabeth Harris. But these three don't insist upon having some sort of protection for their eyes.

"A two-inch brim is sufficient," said Mrs. Scott, who does most of her playing at Indian Spring Club. "And I always wear white linen hats because they're coolest."

Mrs. Ketner usually covers her head with white felt vagabonds. A white flannel skirt with pleats in the front, a striped wash silk blouse with brief sleeves and mannish collar, and black and white golf shoes are worn with the white felt hat.

Mrs. Scott's golf dresses are custom made. They're invariably of seersucker and have pockets for tees, hankie and other doodads. Some of the frocks are two-piece. Some are one-piece. All have short sleeves with pleats on top, action-back bodices and straight skirts with kick pleats front and back.

"I dress them up a bit with buttons," she said. "For instance, here's a blue seersucker dress with tube-like buttons of very dark blue. Then here's this brown and yellow checked seersucker with brown buttons."

Shoes Most Important.

More important than the dress are the shoes when 36 holes are in the offing, Mrs. Scott has learned. She wears a shoe that has no seams underneath so that it fits the foot smoothly like a moccasin. Brushed wool socks are worn with these tan and white shoes.

Miss Harris, president of the Women's District Golf Association, always wears two-piece seersucker dresses on the links in summer. She runs true to form by having a pleat here and there to give her room for an easy stride, for a powerful drive.

"And I must have pockets," she said yesterday. "Three of them are a part of every one of my dresses. Then I can carry tees, cigarettes, and matches or a lighter. Oh yes, and a score card."

Miss Harris wears socks. She also wear silk stockings. Both are worn at the same time.

"I like the feel of silk next my skin and yet silk stockings aren't strong enough to go 'round the course by themselves. So I reinforce them with socks. It works beautifully."

Necklaces or No?

QUESTION: My friends tell me I should never wear beads and necklaces because I have an extremely short, thick neck. But it seems to me some necklaces make it look a little longer. Besides, I have several costumes that do not look without some jewelry. What do you think I should do?

ANSWER: A woman with short thick neck should not wear chokers or short strand beads. But medium-length necklaces, especially those with pendants that pull them down, are often better.

THIS has been a dreary winter for the golfing maniacs, many of whom had the audacity to play several rounds over snow-blanketed courses. Paging Mr. Samuel Bond, to whom fell the honor of being the first to crack the ice at Kenwood!

Well, after being starved out for weeks by snow, more snow, and still more snow—and suddenly rain, and more rain—the golfing maniacs were rewarded with many days of beautiful weather, lots of good old sunshine, sweet breezes, the proverbial “19th hole”, or bar rooms. Make no mistake about this: the 1934 golf season is well under way, and it will continue along the even tenor of its way until way past October, when Kenwood will play host to the famous professionals in the fourth annual National Capital Open, the climatic event of the season.
