Although additional nominations are permitted before the annual meeting. December 4. at a club to be named, the above nominations will undoubtedly receive a unanimous vote from the floor.

Mrs. Weible will attempt to carry out three of her favorite ideas in the coming year, she said last night, that

coming year, she said last night, that of getting a local club to make a bid for the Women's National Championship; having all courses remeasured for correct yardage, and installing a handicapping system for better team play with strokes.

Mrs. Weible, of Kenwood; Mrs. Kramer, former tournament chairman from Manor Country Club, and Mrs. Letts, who captained the champion Chevy Class team in 1940, all served as officers for the first time in 1940. Mrs. Letts is a former Washington Post Cup champion.

Mrs. Weible will hold the first meeting in mid-January, following the annual meeting and election, a fixture on the first Thursday in December.

Women golfers of the town, anxious to start working for 1942, will install new officers December 4. For the first time in the 17-year history of the Women's District Golf Association, the annual meeting will be held at a spot other than a country club.

The meeting will be held at the Officers' Club at the Army War Col-lege, at 12:30 p.m. December 4. Mrs. Walter L. Weible of Kenwood again will be chosen president of the association, with Mrs. F. H. Kramer of Manor and Mrs. F. Dickinson Letts of Chevy Chase slated to be re-elected vice presi-

dents.

Usual custom of the women has been to gather at one of the country clubs. Mrs. Weible, however, has other ideas. She has moved the annual meeting to the War College Officers' Club, which used to be the gathering point for the newspapermen at the old Cleland Cup tournaments. Mrs. Weible's husband is an Army officer.

Among the speakers at the annual meeting may be Helen Hicks Harb, the former national women's champion, who now is making her home in Washington. Mrs. Weible will in Washington. D. C. Women Golfers Will Draw Schedule Disregarding War

Will Card Major Events And Then Curtail Plans If It Is Necessary

Feminine golfers of Washington will proceed with compilation of their normal schedule, although they do not yet know how far the war may affect their 1942 season. Mrs. Walter L. Weible, president of the Women's District Golf Association, amnounced today that the executive committee will meet at Kenwood January 15 to take initial steps toward lining up the major tournaments for 1942. Mrs. Weible is closely associated with the military. Her husband is a lieutenant colonel in the Army. But she has no true idea how war will affect the feminine links schedule next year and in the lack of definite knowledge will ask her executive committee to proceed as if a normal year was coming up.

Tourneys to Be Scheduled.

"None of us know now what will happen in 1942," said the feminine prexy. "Many golfers may go into Red Cross work or into other war activity. There may be a complete blackout of all golf. Just now we do not know what will happen, and probably we won't know until spring, and our tournaments actually start. But meanwhile we will go on with But meanwhile we will go on with our prellininary steps as if the coming season was to be a normal

one."
Meanwhile Mrs. Weible, who already has reappointed Mrs. P. W. Rutledge to the important post of tournament chairman for the linkawomen, is looking for two experienced and capable executives to handle handleaps for classes A and B next year. She considers (naturally) the job of handleap chairman among the more important posts within the association. She served as handleap chairman for a year before she was elevated to the presidency.

"Handicaps have become one of the more important parts of our work," are said. "It is important that experienced women fill the posts of handicap chairmen, women with ability and knowledge. I have several in mind, but the appointments won't be made right away."

Mrs. Weible said that if budget book sales do not justify the diversion of considerable prize money the tournament list may be reduced

the tournament list may be reduced to the major effairs in 1942. This would mean the championships and a few of the larger affairs.

Leading Woman Pros To Exhibit Skill in **Exhibition Here**

Opening event of the feminine golf season around Washington out-side of the regular tournament schedule will be an exhibition match featuring four nationally known woman professionals. Three of them under plans now being worked out by Mrs. Walter L. Weible, prexy Women's Golf Association, will be Helen Hicks Harb, 1931 na-tional champion, now living in Washington; Patty Berg, the Minneapolis red head, who won the na-tional title in 1938, and Helen Dettweiler, Washington girl who turned pro golfer three years ago.

Patty Berg and Helen Dettweller appeared at Kenwood last year in an exhibition match staged by the women, which also included District men's champion Ralph Bogart, and

Mrs. Weible plans several more exhibition matches during the sea-son, some of them to raise funds for Army Relief, Navy Relief, Red Cross the United Service organizations.

Feminine Administration Continued.
Feminine golfers of the town had before them today a picture of a successful administration of the Women's District Golf Association, a little disappointed because no moves have been made to bring the national women's champion here, but one which has seen the growth of the organization continued, with larger tournaments fields than ever before and an administration which in all its essential elements will function again in 1942. "I have been very much disappointed that no club here has come forward with a request for the women's national championship," Mrs. Weible declared in accepting the presidency again for the second year. "Some people said it is too hot in Washington. The tournament will be held next year at Tuisa, Okla, which happens to be a hot place. So I don't believe the heat argument will hold water. "Again I ask for only construc-

"Again I ask for only construc-tive criticism next year. I am sure we will all pull together for bet-ter sportsmanship, good fellowship and the fun in golf."

Mrs. Harb is Speaker.

Helen Hicks Harb, the 1931 national women's champion, made a gracious little talk. With all the savoir faire of an experienced speaker Helen told the 91 women gathered at the luncheon that she is a newcomer to Washington, but from her experience has found all from her experience has found all from her experience has found all golfers and all links organizations have common problems.

"I think we should hold sports-manship as our ideal" said Helen. "If we don't have sportsmanship we lose the essential part of the grand game of golf. We should all see that handicaps are properly adjusted and that all scores made and recorded are turned in for handleaps." Helen Hicks is an accomplished talker. She made a very favorable impression on the women golfers, and was the lion

Tournament Sponsorship, Nature of Prizes Also Will Be Debated

There isn't any secret about the fact that the gals, banded together in one association, produce more acany single men's organization in this neighborhood. But they will have three problems before them

There is a disposition to change the team match schedule by spread-ing the team schedule throughout the year and in some quarters the women want the matches abandoned entirely, on the claim that so many women will be busy in war work they won't have time for team matches.

Debate Over Prizes.

Talk also crops up about eliminating from the schedule those fournaments which do not have current sponsors; that is, those which do not have money or prizes furnished.

The other angle concerns the kind of prizes in the 1942 tourneys. Many of the women favor prizes in De-

of the women favor prizes in De-fense bonds or stamps. Others want to keep on with distribution of the dinky little prizes of previous years, on the theory that when a competitor wins a prize it should be something tangible, even though not necessarily valuable in terms of money

Nowhere along the line of future probabilities has there been dis-position among the women to aban-don their long-built-up tournament don their long-built-up tournament achedule and the summer of 1942 undoubtedly will find them doing business at the old stand, the country clubs around town. Tomorrow's meeting will cover the broad phases of policy in view of changed conditions. Arrangement of a tournament schedule will come later.

Travel Problem Intrudes.
Looming large behind the entire setup is the transportation problem. "I think we should eliminate insofar as possible a lot of the needless traveling we have done in past years," said Mrs. Walter L. Welble, president of the Women's District Golf Association. "We should arrange a slate which will require the minimum of traveling. That may mean spreading the team matches over the entire season, or even their cancellation."

Another major consideration will be that old problem child—handicaps. The woman want to do something about them, probably by lowering the par ratings of the local courses, which would have the effect of raising handicaps. But there's division among some of the lower-handicapped competitors on this point, too, some claiming a low handicap is a mark of distinction while others say present handicaps are too low say present handicaps are too low by comparison with handicaps in other feminine golf centers.

W.D.G.A. Approves Full Tournament Schedule

Officers Drop Only Duffer Cup, **Corby Matches**

Women to Give Part Of Entry Fees to Service Charities

The Corby and the Duffer Cup tournaments will be dropped from the Women's District Golf Association schedule for 1942 but otherwise the usual extensive tourna-ment schedule will be played. This was decided yesterday at a meeting at Kenwood Golf and Country Club attended by President Mrs. Walter L. Weible, the executive committee and delegates from the various member clubs.

This came as a surprise as it has been announced earlier in the year that not only the unsponsored Corby and Duffer tournaments would be dropped but the annual team match championships as well. But the chairmen of the various golf club committees decided that the team matches were to be included in the regular tourna-ment schedule.

Lauds Lady-Pro Golf

Last year's schedule listed 13 tournaments but the decision of the delegates to eliminate only two reduces the number of events to 11. That list, of course, will include the annual women's District Championship.

Mrs. Weible told the delegates that the most important thing about this year's tournaments was that they would have to be played at courses easily accessible by bus in case of a curtailment in bus in case of a curtailment in the use of automobiles. She also said that she intended to set aside a percentage of entry fees from each tournament and that the monies so received would be turned over to the U.S.O. and Army and Navy Relief Societies. Because of the success of last year's Lady-Pro tournament, Mrs. Weible told delegates that she thought the association should onate \$50 toward the professional prizes. She also suggested that the tournament campaign begin a

tournament campaign begin a little later than usual this year because of the existing caddy

because of the existing caddy shortage.

Another suggestion of Mr. Weible's was that nothing definite be done about the intercity team matches with Baltimore until next month's meeting, at which time all of the president's suggestions will be officially passed upon. Should the intercity matches become a part of the regular schedule, Mrs. Myron Davy of Columbia will be named to captain the locals. tain the locals.

Mrs. Brantley Honored

Mrs. J. P. Brantley of Kenwood was appointed class B handicap chairman to succeed Mrs. E. A. Swingle of Congressional, Mrs. Frederick Evans of Kenwood was named to a similar post in class A. The new handicap chairmen were instructed that their duties would include using exceptional scores of feminine golfers published in newspapers but not reported to the handicap commit-

Mrs. Carter Magruder of Army and Navy was appointed to take the place of Mrs. Paul W. Rut-ledge of the same club as tournament chairman, while Mrs. Rutledge was assigned, at her own suggestion, as assistant tourna-ment chairman. The only other appointment announced was that of Mrs. Theodore Peyser of Woodmont as team chairman.

Women Are Avoiding Winter Rules With Late Golf Start

First Tourneys in May; Association Will Hold Session February 11

Woman golfers of Washington
who heretofore have gotten their who heretofore have gotten their schedule under way in April's showers, won't start their competition this year until mid-May. The women will meet at Kenwood February 11 to take final action on several matters referred back to the clubs by the meeting held last month. These include a cash fund for the woman-pro tournament; payment of professionals who aid payment of professionals who aid in running tournaments of the Women's District Golf Association; prize distribution in all feminine tournaments in Defense bonds and stamps, and a cut of the entry fees for war relief purposes.

Winter Rules Big Objection.

Because of the spreading of inter-club team matches throughout the entire season, and for another rea-son, the gals won't start their com-petition until weeks after the nor-mal starting time of other years, Last year the Keeler Cup tourney was played at Washington on April 21 and the team matches started 21, and the team matches started four days later. But the team tour-neys, which were cleaned up last year in two months, will run for more than four months this year, and won't start so early.

Main objection to the previous early start, however, is based on the winter rule situation. Mrs. Walter L. Weible, feminine prexy, who is a stickler for adherence to the rules, says that competition under winter rules means little, and that scores made under winter rules mean less. Course conditions in April, she says, may make winter rules necessary, and she would have the opening of the season put beck to May so regular rules will be in to May so regular rules will be in

rce for all tournaments. Belittles Winter Rule Scores. Belittles Winter Rule Scores.
"Scores made under winter rules mean little," says Mrs. Welble, "When you tee the ball you wipe out the rules of the game. Possibly winter rules will lower the average score by several strokes. I rather would have the tournaments start later and have all of them played under regular rules." Last year the Keeler and Keefer Cup tourneys, at Washington and Chevy Chase, were played in April, under Chase, were played in April, under winter rules.

Probably three woman-pro tourneys will be played this year, with several groups of women rated according to handicaps, competing with the professionals. Bob Barnett has suggested the change, in view of the wish of the women to play in these tourneys. He has proposed that women in the 1-12 handicap group play in one prowoman tourney; those in the 13-18 group in another and those with higher handicaps in another. This type of tournament has been popular with the women for several ular with the women for several

Junior Girls' Trophy Returned to Awards For Linkswomen

Last Played For in 1935, It Will Be at Stake In Association Event

Women golfers around town will have another cup in competition next year, further increasing the imposing list of silver mugs for which the fair golfers play every

The cup is the Junior Girls' Championship Trophy, and it isn't a new one. It was presented to the Wom-en's District Golf Association eight years ago by Mrs. Morris Simon and only thrice has been won. Last winner was Helen Dettweller in 1935. Where it has been since and why a junior girls' tournament hasn't been played is a mystery.

But Mrs. Walter L. Weible, president of the Women's District Golf Association, says the organization will schedule a junior girls' tourney next year. She happens to be a valiant booster for junior girls' golf and would seek the co-operation of the local pros in mass lessons for instruction of college girls.

"Such class lessons," says Mrs. Weible, "would be the biggest spur for promotion of golf among the younger women we ever have had around Washington. We do not have enough young golfers coming along. Almost all our better players are past the youngster stage. And the girls would turn out for a series of class lessons. I know of two local colleges where large classes of students will come out for lessons if the professionals will work with us." She probably won't find any opposition from the pros, who want to see the game progress.

The feminine association prexy sees in the coming of Helen Hicks Harb to Washington a lift along the road to better golf. Although Helen will not be a competitor in the women's tournaments she will be playing next year in friendly matches at all the clubs. Her husband probably will join Congressional. Helen has been a topnotch competitor for many years.

"Many of our golfers will watch Mrs. Harb with benefit to themselves," said Mrs. Weible.

Fair Sex Golf Tests Here to Cost \$1 For Each Affair

Elimination of the usual budget book sale this year, as recommended by the Executive Committee of the Women's District Golf Association, will raise the cost of feminine golf if the women O. K. the proposal to charge a straight fee of \$1 a tournament. Budget books cost \$4 for the past several years, and not only assured the association of a certain assured the association of a certain income, but reduced the cost of each tournament. Entrants who did not buy budget books paid \$1 for each tourney in which they played last year. Mrs. Walter Weible, president, said 11 tournaments will be on the schedule this year. The girls apparently are more concerned about caddies and the tire shortage than the cost of golf. Already they have proposed a late start, preferably in June, for their

New Golf Rules Likely to Get Few Followers

Strictly unimportant in a war year when tournaments (around Washington) are rare occasions. are the changes in the rules of golf just announced by the United States Golf Association. The USGA remains the beliwether of the game, and the official rules body, but it has not held a tourn-

ament since 1941. Since all the clubs around Washington use winter rules (in all seasons) nowadays, in order to save golf balls and turf, it isn't important that under the rules a ball now may be lifted from a

flock of situations which had not before been defined by the USGA. Under winter rules the player would just place the ball and forget the rule anyhow. But when golf becomes normal again, and the the ball must be played where it lies it may be important to know that if your ball rolls into a paper bag in a bunker, or up against a bottle, you can move it (the ball). That opponent with the eagle eye should know it, too.

Nor is it important that a section of the 14-club rule making it a rule violation to borrow clubs from your boy friend has been left out of the newest rule book.

A couple of years ago, in a District championship, some of the woman golfers, who go by the book anyhow, were exercised be-cause one competitor felt the grain of the grass before she stroked her putt. There were frowns and whispers and talk of possible penalty, but nothing was done. Now it can't be done, un-der the new rule, which says: "A practice stroke with a ball during a round is not permissible, nor is rolling a ball by hand or other similar act to test a putting sur-

The new rules are all apple sauce anyhow. None but the extreme purists will abide by them, and the rest don't care. Maybe the USGA had better save print-ing until the end of the war and people begin again (if they do) to regard those things seriously.

Mrs. Leo Walper of the Indian Spring Country Club, knowing exactly what she had to shoot at, breezed home with a great round of 79 at the Chevy Chase Club yesterday to capture low medal honors in the qualifying rounds of the annual Women's District Golf Association Championship,

One of the last players to tee off in the tournament's record field of 152 players, the long driving wife of a driving range professional was out in 41 and back in 38 to displace Mrs. Betty P. Meckley of Kenwood, as the medalist. Mrs. Meckley, who won the District Championship in 1930-31 and 1936 and who was a finalist in last year's tournament, was out in 42 and back in 40 in her 18-hole trial.

Mrs. Walper, the city champion of 1939, produced her best round of the year in winning the coveted medal and, but for a couple of bad breaks, could have lowered her score. Her first bad break came at the fifth hole, where the determined Indian Spring color-bearer stabbed for a birdie, but three putted.

Back In Running

Apparently unnerved, the former titlist took an almost disastrous seven at the eighth. But the wife of the former Middle Atlantic P.G.A. champion wasn't long in adjusting herself, for she got a great par three at the ninth and still another par three at the equally tough tenth and was back in the running again—this time to stay.

Her only birdie against men's par came at the twelfth, where she dunked a 15-footer into the cup. Just when things looked rosy disaster struck again at the sixteenth, where Mrs. Walper's tee shot struck the top of the ditch and, after hanging there for a second, rolled back into the water. Mrs. Walper was forced to take a penalty stroke, and then finished out the hole in six.

Eight Break 90

After a fine four at the seventeenth, Mrs. Walper came to the home green with an eight-footer to break 80 and a couple of putts to win the medal. Without hesitation the Indian Spring player walked up and knocked the putt squarely into the back of the cup for the only round of the tournament below 80.



Mrs. Weible was named to succeed Mrs. Robert A. Lacey as president of the local association.

Mrs. Winkler Renamed

Mrs. Weible served last year in the capacity of handicap chairman and it was her great work in that job that resulted in her selection as head of next year's entire association. Mr. Frank Kramer, of Manor Club, chairman of last year's tournament committee, was named first vice president, while Mrs. F. Dickinson Letts, of Cheyy Chase Club, was elected second vice president.

Mrs. Harvey J. Cooper, of Kenwood, was named to the post of secretary, and Mrs. P. J. Winkler, of Congressional, was retained as treasurer. Mrs. Winkler was the only officer from last year to be renamed.

Makes Recommendations

Mrs. Weible made several recommendations after her year's experience at handicapping, and the main one had to do with the playing of the annual team matches. The new president has asked that the matches be patterned after the U.S.G.A. system of playing the first team at scratch and the second and third teams with handicaps.

She also asked that all teams be composed of six players and that the team field day events be played at the home clubs of the victorious teams.

But the team captains had other ideas. They recommended that the same system of eight players on the first team six on the second, and four on the fourth be retained along with the scratch systems for all competitors. Mrs. Weible's argument against the old system was that some clubs had too much advantage over the others and that handicapping the second and third teams would put the competition on a more even basis.

Unanimous Vote Needed

It also was pointed out by the retiring president that several of the new recommendations would mean the changing of the association's constitution and to be able to arrive at that action delegates from more than five clubs must vote unanimously in favor of the changes. Mrs. Weible, in her annual report as handicap chairman, said that 1.336 entries had been made in the association's 14 major tournaments and that 414 of these were in Class A and 503 in Class B.

Mrs. Kramer, in her report as last year's tournament chairman, requested several changes. The main one was that all ties in tournaments must be played in July and August. She also recommended that the team match field day be played at the end of the present plan of being played at the end of the present plan of being played at the end of the season.

Mrs. Lacey, the retiring president, was presented with a gold pin in recognition of her two years of service as prexy.

Under the leadership of Presi dent Mrs. Walter L. Weible, the Women's District Golf Association yesterday adopted a policy of complete co-operation and accord with the United States Golf Association at the annual meeting of the executive committee held at Ken-wood Golf and Country Club.

Reforms in local methods of establishing handleaps based women's pars at the several clubs around Washington; a survey of the courses to accurately establish women's par, and a broadening of the scope of activity for the organization were approved.

Handicaps Recognized

As a result of the new program, long advocated by Mrs. Weible, the handicaps of the local women golfers will be recognized by the United States Golf Association. The parent body at present takes no official cognizance of the ranking District players. This is due, insiders stated, to the fact that on several courses in the metropolitan area permit winter rules to be played the year round. It is fundamental that such procedure makes scoring easier. It also lowers handicaps.

The practice boomerangs, how-

The practice boomerangs, how-ever, when the District players meet teams from cities where the old St. Andrews custom of playing the ball as it lies, governs play. The low handicap player on courses where orthodox golf is customary usually is a better and more consistent performer than the player favored by local rules.

Par Does Not Conform

It was pointed out to the execu-tive committee that women's par on the local courses did not conform to the standards long established in the royal and ancient game, Fred McLeod, veteran progame, Fred McLeod, veteran pro-fessional at Columbia Country Ciub, informed Mrs. Weible and her associates that par from the front tees at Columbia was estao-lished at 76. This, the old cham-plon declared was three strokes higher than United States Golf Association would make it. Mc-Leod said that women's par at Columbia; Mrs. J. A. Anderson, 73.

Anderson of Argyle, and Mrs. Charles Vaile of Kenwood, to survey all courses in the local area, establish standard pars, and by adopting the orthodox rule of playing through the green, to fix handicaps in accordance with the rules of the United States Golf Association. By carrying out this work, District women's teams will meet players from other cities on a more even

Mrs. Edward Fox, of Kenwood, was named tournament chairman, with Mrs. C. M. McGowan, of Manor Club, her assistant. It was decided that this year tournament play would be continued through July and August. Heretofore play had been abandoned in those months because of the number of players who left the city on vacation. It was decided to make all teams of six players.

Ties for the top prizes long have been problems for the women golfers to handle. Under the present rule all ties must be played off the following day.

But backed by the Women's Committee of the United States Golf Association, which asked the cogent question: "Is it a one-day tournament when you carry over a playoff to the next day?" Mrs. Welble will seek revision of the present rule to force playoffs of all ties for gross prizes the same day as the tournament proper, and in the case of ties for the net award will seek a rule forcing matching of cards to settle the tie at once.

Wants Rules Understood.

Mrs. Weible happens to be tickler for written rules. Jokin she admits she is forced into such an attitude by some of the golfers themselves. Some have insisted on justification of certain regulations, so Mrs. Weible, in self-protection, wants the rules written and under-stood in advance of competition. Rules should be flexible enough to cover all situations, she says, but at the same time should unmistakably state their purpose.
