

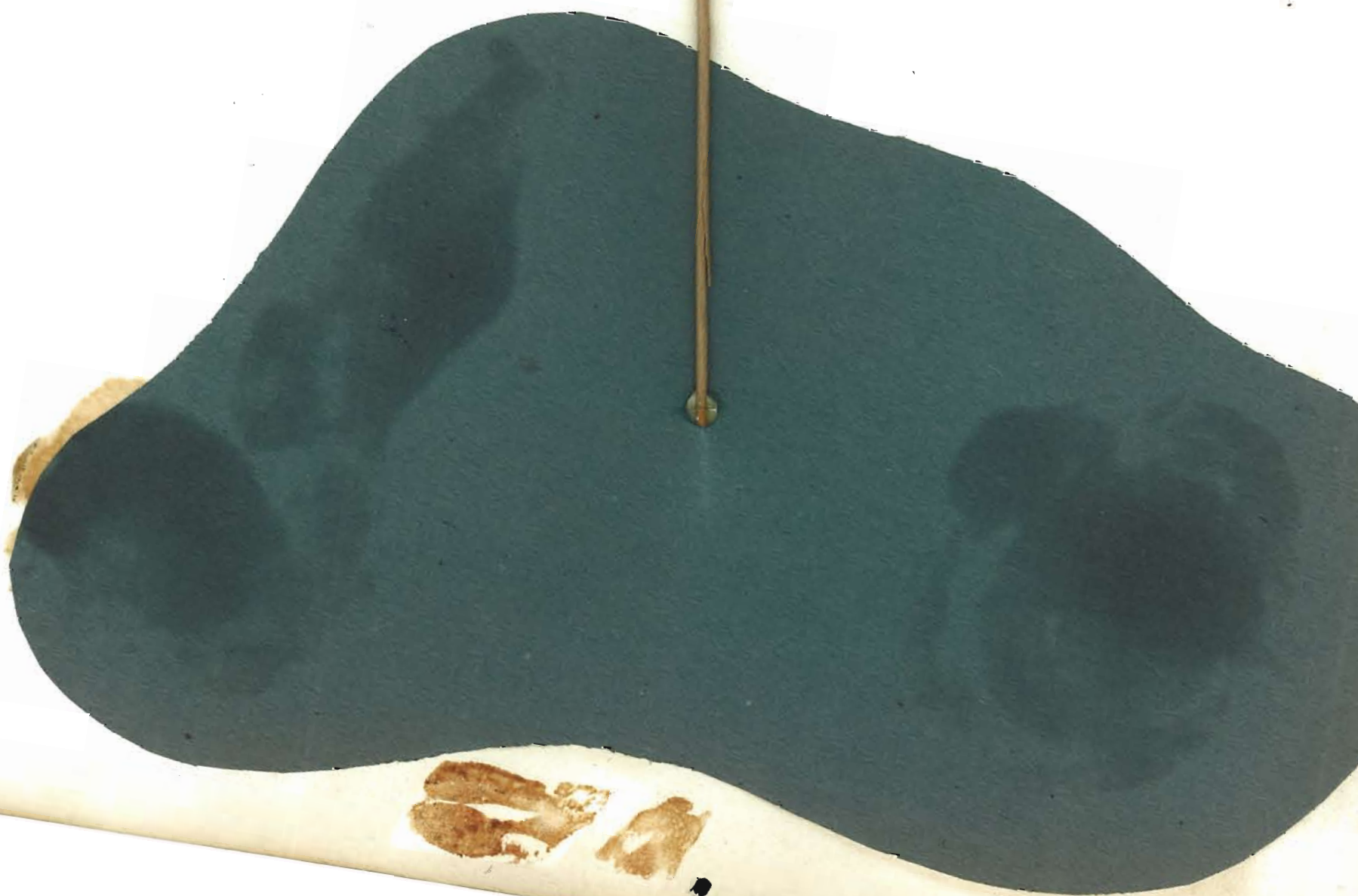

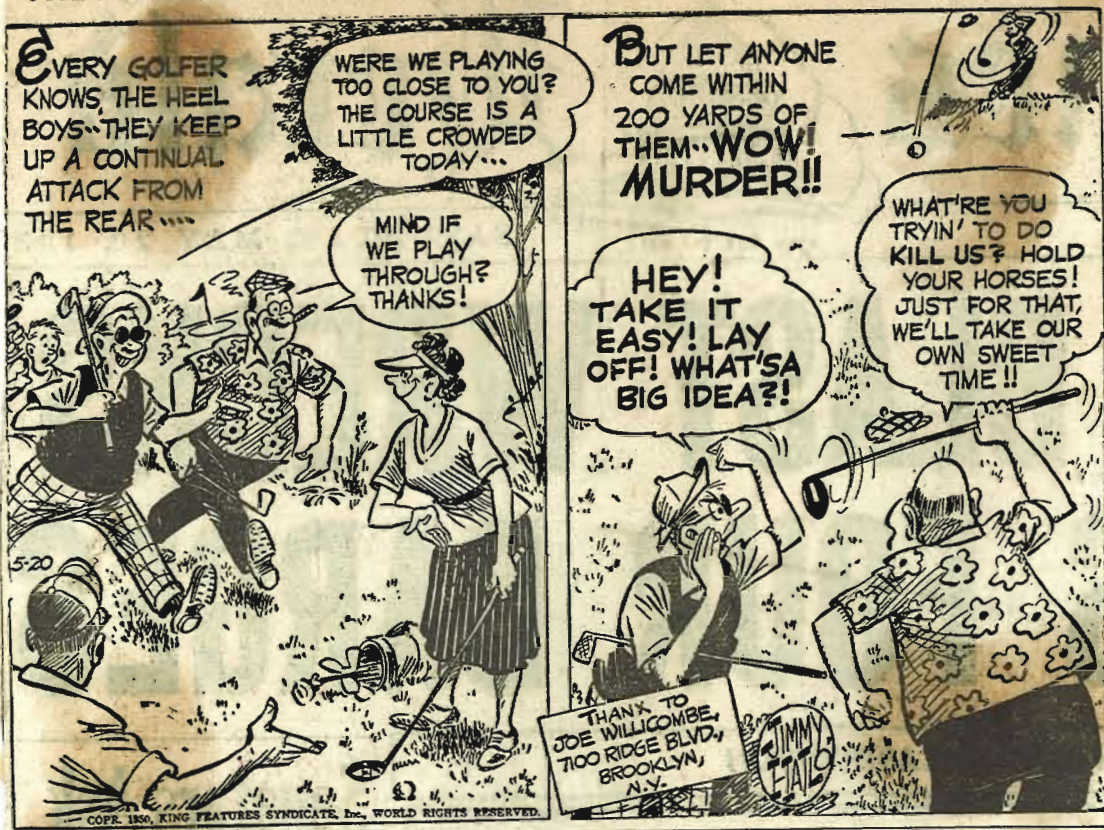

Mrs. Torlinski Named Leader of District's Woman Golfers

Mrs. M. J. Torlinski, who is a second cousin of Bobby Jones and probably the best golfing grandmother in the District, added to her distinctions yesterday when she became the first Army Navy Club member to be elected president of the Women's District Golf Association.

Mrs. Torlinski and the 1950 slate of officers were installed at the annual meeting at Indian Spring Club. The new president succeeds Mrs. W. F. Patterson of Indian Spring, who resigned after two highly successful years as head of the active organization.

Women's tournament golf in the District again will be in three classes next year, Mrs. Torlinski said and the handicap ratio will remain the same. Scratch to 14 will be class A, 15 to 20 will be B and 21 through 26 will be C. There had been some suggestions to rearrange the classes. The average size of the tournament fields last year for five events in each class was 73 players in A events, 58 in B and 43 in C.

One of the principal objects of the WDGA next year will be to adopt summer rules for tournament play, so as to make for uniformity in handicaps when local players compete in Maryland, Middle Atlantic or USGA competition.

Mrs. Torlinski, a non-resident member of Army Navy from 1929 through 1937 and an active member since 1937, served two years as second vice president of the association she now heads and one year as first vice president. Several seasons ago she was finalist in the club championship.

Officers installed with Mrs. Torlinski were Mrs. Willard Edwards of Manor as first vice president, Mrs. M. H. Dinneen of Washington Golf and Country Club as second vice president, Mrs. Verne Wilson of Columbia as treasurer and Mrs. Marie Spates of Prince Georges as secretary.

Mrs. Edwards will serve as tournament chairman, a position carried by the first vice presidency and Mrs. Dinneen as team captain.

Mrs. Torlinski Heads WDGA

The Women's District Golf Association yesterday elected Mrs. M. J. Torlinski, Army-Navy Country Club, as president for the coming year.

Mrs. Torlinski will be assisted by Mrs. Willard Edwards, Manor Country Club, first vice president and tournament chairman; Mrs. M. Hale Dinneen, Washington Country Club, second vice president and team captain; Mrs. Marie Spates, Prince George Country Club, secretary, and Mrs. Verne Wilson, Columbia Country Club, treasurer.

Mrs. Torlinski served one term as second vice president and for the past two years has served as first vice president, assisting Mrs. W. F. Patterson, retiring president.

Mrs. Torlinski will continue the three divisions in the W.D.G.A., scratch through 15 as Class A, 16 through 20, Class B, and 21 through 26 Class C. Last year Class A averaged 78 players for each of the six events while Class B had 53 and Class C 48 for each of five tournaments.

The new president who has been a member of Army-Navy since 1929, active since 1937 when she came to the District permanently from Wilkes-Barre, intends to institute summer rules for all the W.D.G.A. tournaments this year.

Evening Star Cup Competition To Open Women's Golf Season

The Evening Star Cup tournament, oldest of the Women's District Golf Association's events, will open the 1950 tournament schedule Thursday, May 11 at Manor Country Club. Mrs. Willard Edwards of Manor, tournament chairman, released the schedule yesterday.

The opening event will be the Class A section of The Star Cup, while the Class B section will be played August 1 at Columbia.

The Keefe Cup, only 36-hole medal play tournament and formerly the traditional opening event, becomes the third tournament to be played, May 24 and 25 at Chevy Chase, as always. The opening event for the Class B players will be the WMAL Cup May 18 at Manor.

The District championship, as previously announced, will be played the week of June 26-30 at Indian Spring.

With Class C in its second full year of play, the high handicapped group now has three trophy tournaments plus one still unsponsored. The Simon Cup, which years ago was donated for the District girls' championship, will be re-assigned as a Class C

Cup tournament and be played May 26 at Washington Golf and Country Club. The Pro Cup will be a C event, as will the WDGA Cup.

Inter-city competition, under Mrs. Rex Howard, will consist of a home-and-home series with Baltimore, and a match with Richmond here.

The team schedule, to be announced later, will find a record number of teams entered. The second division opens the round robin series April 11, the first teams April 18, and the third teams April 25. Mrs. M. H. Dinneen will captain the teams.

Keefe Golf Victory Recalls Mrs. Munson's Triumph in '20s

Mrs. Curtis Munson's triumph in the Keefe Cup tournament at Chevy Chase yesterday was by no means in the nature of a comeback for the 1923 women's national champion.

In fact back in 1926, at the peak of her career, Mrs. Munson—then Edith Cummings—decided competitive golf was too much business and not enough fun and simply quit the tournament picture cold.

The Munsons soon will be leaving for the summer for Jasper Park in Western Canada, where Mr. Munson is a mining executive, but a friend persuaded Mrs. Munson to compete in the Keefe Cup, the major medal play tournament on the Women's District Golf Association schedule. It was at Chevy Chase, Mrs. Munson's home club, so she said yes.

The field was made up of the 100 top players in the District, but nobody was within five shots of Mrs. Munson's first-day 78. She added an 86 yesterday for a gross score of 164 and deducted five handicap strokes from each round for a winning net 154, low by seven strokes.

Edith Cummings was an international golf great between 1919

and 1926, when women's golf was dominated by Alexa Stirling, Glenna Collett, Mary K. Browne, Marion Hollins and Miss Cummings. That was a tough league, but the future Mrs. Munson accounted for the 1923 Women's National, two Western Amateur titles, twice was semifinalist in the British women's championship and on two other occasions in the National.

But in the late 1920s the tournament players were developing a regular circuit. Opposed to continuing tournament play and the serious side of the game, Mrs. Munson created a bit of excitement by simply announcing her retirement from competitive golf.

Mrs. Munson's appearance belies that fact that she was a championship golfer more than 30 years ago. But she credits an outdoor life of friendly golf, bird shooting, the training of dogs and gardening.

Mrs. Munson was a bit apologetic over that five handicap, but she plays just enough golf locally to hold a handicap and that 78 under summer rules on Wednesday was her best score in the District. "I played good golf, would just like to have taken about two of those shots over," she said, "but yesterday I was ragged."

Moved Here in 1941.

Mrs. Munson played in a mixed Scotch foursome or two last year and in the French High Commission Cup tournament at Chevy Chase, but she hasn't played in a tournament open to other than club members since moving here in 1941.

In addition to Chevy Chase, Mrs. Munson holds a life membership in Onwentsia in Chicago and the Westchester Biltmore in New York. The Cummingses were Onwentsia members. Her brother Dexter, the 1923 and 1924 intercollegiate champion from Yale, was a Washington resident and Chevy Chase member during World War II years.

Mrs. Keefe, donor of the Keefe Cup and a three-time president of the Women's District Golf Association, was in the gallery in the 1923 women's final in which Miss Cummings defeated Mrs. Stirling, 3 and 2. But Mrs. Keefe admitted at the presentation yesterday that she did not know Mrs. Cummings at that time and she was an Alexa Stirling rooter.

Mrs. Clark Wins Gross Prize.

Although Mrs. Munson's score was low in both the net and gross

The weather got tougher but so did Mrs. Curtis Munson yesterday in the final round of the Keefe cup tournament at Chevy Chase club, where the former National Women's champion turned the 36-hole medal play event into a walkaway with a net score of 154.

Mrs. Munson, who won the National championship in 1923, was also low gross for the Women's District Golf association sponsored event but, being allowed only one prize, accepted the more important net trophy. The Chevy Chase club star posted an 86 yesterday to add to Wednesday's 78 and used a 10-stroke handicap for the two rounds to win the coveted trophy by a margin of seven strokes.

Mrs. Clark Gross Winner

Because of Mrs. Munson's decision to take the trophy put up 18 years ago by Mrs. Frank Royer Keefe, a three-time president of the W.D.G.A., Mrs. David H. Clark, another Chevy Chase player, fell heir to the gross with a 169 score. The former Middle Atlantic champion turned in a round of 86 yesterday to add to her previous 83.

Mrs. Henry Riley of Washington finished the second low net victor with a 162 score. The Virginia clubwomen posted gross rounds of 89 and 92 and used a two-day 20 stroke handicap to arrive at the second place figures.

Two players finished with nets of 163 to garble the third low net position but after the W.D.G.A. card-matching system had been put to work by the tournament committee, Mrs. Richard Kreuzburg of Kenwood emerged with the position with 89-90-15-163.

Mrs. Jack Smith of Prince Georges was dropped into fourth place with the other 163 score. Mrs. Smith, who was in second place on opening day with 86-10-76, slumped to 97 yesterday.

Mrs. Landra B. Platt of the host club took the fifth place position via the card-matching routine from Mrs. Samuel Crocker of Kenwood at 164. Mrs. Platt had rounds of 89 and 85, while Mrs. Crocker had an 89 and a 91.

Other winners were: Mrs. R. R. Hendrix, Belle Haven, 97-92-24-165; Mrs. Marie Walper, Prince Georges, 87-94-16-165; Mrs. Walter R. Stokes, Manor, 88-82-4-166, and Mrs. R. E. Streit, Army-Navy, 88-96-18-166.

Practically every class A player in the Women's District Golf Association record book entered the 36-hole medal play Keefe Cup tournament at Chevy Chase. Today's field of 100 will be cut to the low 32 and ties for tomorrow's second and final round.

Mrs. Voight Proves Apt Pupil Of Husband in Star Cup Win

George Voight was spending a busy afternoon at the office yesterday when suddenly the phone rang and a voice said, "We won."

The party on the other end was his wife, Mrs. Margaret Cox Voight. She had just won The Star Cup at Manor Country Club and by "we" she meant that patient hours of instruction at the hands of her famous golfing husband had paid off.

Mrs. Voight had the lowest score of her golfing career, a 40 on the woods nine, 45 on the back nine for an 85, and deducted 14 handicap strokes for a net 71 to win the 33d competition for the oldest cup on the Women's District Golf Association schedule by five strokes.

Mrs. Voight is a mathematician with the Army Map Service, Corps of Engineers, and strictly a week-end golfer. It was only her fifth 18-hole round of golf since last November and her first victory in a cup tournament.

Victory Is Popular.

An occasional tournament golfer, Mrs. Voight decided to take a day's leave to compete in the opening event on the tournament schedule. She knocked in an 8-foot putt for a birdie three on the first hole and scrambled to a fine four on the tough second hole. The winner finished the front nine in fine style, three men's pars for a 40 after encountering a little trouble on the sixth hole and taking seven.

Mrs. Voight played steady golf on the back nine for 45 and posted a score that will take a couple of strokes off her handicap. She was a surprised, excited and popular champion when her score was posted.

Mrs. Walter R. Stokes, who won the Star Cup in 1937 and since that time has won just about everything else in this section more than once, kept the low gross prize at the host club as she

posted an 81, best score of the day by two strokes.

Mrs. Stokes started and finished with sixes, but she played some fine golf in between, including birdie twos on the fifth and eighth holes. The next best score was an 83 by Mrs. A. B. Bower, the defending champion, also of Manor, who posted an 83, including eight fives on the back nine and a par three on the 11th hole.

Mrs. G. L. Purmort, a 12-handicap player from Army Navy, who was competing in her first District tournament, won second net with a fine 41 on the out nine and a 47 coming back for 88-12-76, a score that might have won the big cup on an ordinary day's scoring.

A former Manor Club champion, Mrs. John R. Daily, and a member of Manor's championship first team, Mrs. Herbert Lacey, both played their home course in 88 strokes and deducted 11 handicap strokes for net 76s, but Mrs. Daily won third net by matching cards.

Mrs. Ravenel Fifth Net.

Mrs. Henry Ravenel won fifth net with a 91-13-78 and sixth went to the 1938 and '39 Star Cup champion, Mrs. Richard Kreuzburg of Kenwood, who had 87-8-79, in her first tournament round in almost two years.

Prince Georges had another prize winner in one of its most improved players, Mrs. Jack Smith, who had 90-11-79, and eighth went to Mrs. Robert Wilson of Chevy Chase, 91-12-79, with the ties decided by matching cards. Mrs. Mildred Jorg of Indian Spring won the ninth net prize with 91-11-80, as Mrs. Edward Ferriday of Chevy Chase lost out with 84-4-80.

Mrs. Ferriday had the third best gross score of the day while the next best was Mrs. Hugh Nicolson, another two-time Star Cup champion, with 85 and Mrs. Betty Meckley, the 1941 winner, had 86.

Putting together nines of 42 and 40 for a gross score of 82, her lowest competitive round, Mrs. Arnold A. Willcox, of Chevy Chase club, captured the annual class A division of the Washington Times-Herald Cup tournament yesterday at Kenwood Golf and Country club with a net round of 74.

Playing over a course made heavy by all night rains, Mrs. Willcox got away to a good early start but ran into a pair of sixes on the par five seventh and ninth holes to get her 42. On the back nine the Chevy Chase player, who used an eight stroke handicap to manufacture the winning score, collected one three, a brace of fours and five fives to return in 40.

Field of 99 Entered

A field of 99 players were entered in the Women's District Golf association-sponsored 18-hole medal play handicap event in which there were eleven prize winners. And if it hadn't been for the presence of Mrs. A. B. Bower, Manor club's District champion, Mrs. Willcox might have stolen the whole show.

Mrs. Bower's gross winning score of 81, the low round of the day, was only one stroke better than the score posted by the net cup winner. The former Kentucky State titlist and four-time winner of the city championship was out in 40 and back in 41 to collect the silver award for that division of the tournament.

Two players—Mrs. Sam Lewis of Belle Haven, and Mrs. H. E. Davies of Manor—filled net scores of 76 to deadlock for second net but when the tournament committee applied the WDGA card matching system the Alexandria club player emerged the victor. Mrs. Lewis turned in a card of 88-12-76, while Mrs. Davies third place winning tally was 87-11-77.

Mrs. G. R. Gable of the host club finished fourth with a net score of 77. The Kenwood representative collected twin nines of 45 and used a not-too-lucky 13 handicap to earn the place.

Mrs. Jack Smith of Prince Georges, 86-8-78; and clubmate Mrs. M. S. Shahan, 92-14-78; were next in line for prize places, Mrs. Smith getting the nod in fifth place and Mrs. Shahan dropping back into sixth position.

Four players finished with nets of 79 and that quartet took care

of the last remaining prize places. Mrs. J. P. Trouchaud of Kenwood was drawn into seventh place with a card of 83-4-79.

Mrs. Franklin Babcock of Chevy Chase, took the eighth place prize with 93-14-79; Mrs. Betty P. Meckley of Kenwood, was ninth with 83-4-79; and the last prize place went to Mrs. Paul Streit of Army Navy Country club with 88-9-79. Mrs. Trouchaud had a great chance to make things interesting for the low gross award when she got out in 40 but the host club star ran into trouble midway of the second nine and took a 43.

The class B division of the Times-Herald tournament will be played August 25 at Prince Georges Golf and Country Club.

Best Golf Score She Ever Shot Wins Tourney for Mrs. Willcox

Mrs. Arnold A. Willcox took the Times-Herald Cup to her home Chevy Chase Club yesterday after posting her lowest competitive round, an 82, and deducting eight handicap strokes for a winning net 74 in the 18-hole Women's District Golf Association Cup event at Kenwood.

Mrs. Willcox, a member of the first team at Chevy Chase, a frequent prize winner in the WDGA cup tournaments and a constant threat in her home club championship, was out in 42 and back in 40. Consistency paid off in her winning round as Mrs. Willcox's card showed only two sixes, both on long par five holes.

District Champion Mrs. A. B. Bower of Manor added to her col-

lection of low gross trophies. Mrs. Bower's 81 was only one stroke better than Mrs. Willcox's score. The next best gross scores were 83s by the home club's Mrs. J. P. Trouchaud and Mrs. Betty Meckley.

Bower, Meckley Meet Again In W.D.G.A. Final

Two three-time winners—Mrs. A. B. Bower of Manor club, and Mrs. Betty P. Meckley of Kenwood—will meet this morning at 10:30 in the final round of the Women's District Golf association championship at Indian Spring Country club.

Mrs. Meckley, the former United States senior champion, has met Mrs. Bower, an erstwhile Kentucky State champion, on two other occasions and both times the latter has been the victor.

Scores in Thriller

Mrs. Bower turned in one of the most sensational scoring exhibitions in the history of the tournament in defeating Mrs. Meckley in the final of the 1948 championship at Woodmont, and beat the Kenwood player again in last year's semifinal at Columbia, 1-up on the twentieth green.

Mrs. Bower, the 1946, '48 and '49 champion, turned in another torrid performance in yesterday's semifinals, defeating Betty Garber of Argyle, 4 and 3. The Manor Club star played the first nine in 38 strokes to lead 2-up and then played the back nine two-under women's par for six holes to close out the match on fifteenth green. Par on the remaining three holes would have given Mrs. Bower a 72.

Ends Match on Fourteenth

Mrs. Meckley needed only 43 strokes on the front nine to build up a 4-up lead on Mrs. Frank Browning of Army Navy County Club. After alternately winning and losing the next four holes, Mrs. Meckley knocked in an 8-foot putt for a birdie to end the match on the fourteenth green, 3 and 4. In the championship consolation it will be Mrs. Rex Howard of Kenwood, who with Miss Garber tied for the qualifying medal, and Mrs. Henry Riley of Washington. Mrs. Riley gained the final by a default from Mrs. Cecil Burnside of Chevy Chase, while Mrs. Howard was eliminating Mrs. Marty Gordon of the host club, 3 and 2.

Chance for Record Golf Streak Is Making Mrs. Bower Nervous

Mrs. Albert B. Bower of Manor Club, winner of the Women's District golf championship every time she has entered, admittedly is getting nervous in the current event. Before she teed off today in her quarter-final match against Mrs. J. P. Trouhard of Kenwood, Mrs. Bower said: "I hope I don't beat myself."

While all the contestants are finding the sun-baked greens of Indian Spring difficult to master, the defending champion is under the most pressure.

For one thing, no one ever has won the title three times in a row and Mrs. Bower has the opportunity. Semifinals are slated for tomorrow and the final Friday.

"I want to win this tournament very, very much," said Mrs. Bower yesterday after winning her opening-round match, 5 and 3, over Mrs. Ralph Goldsmith of Woodmont. "But, I'm getting nervous and that's bad."

Mrs. Bower won the tourney in 1946, '48 and '49. She didn't play in 1947.

Had Early Golf Start

There is no secret behind Mrs. Bower's ability to handle a golf club. She began playing at the age of 12 and hasn't stopped.

"My parents belonged to a country club back in Kentucky," she relates, "and they played golf. We girls used to swim and play tennis and when we got bored with that, we took to golf."

"But I didn't become greatly interested in the game until I won a tournament. I was 13, then, and had a 30 handicap. It was the first time I ever had broken 100 and there was no holding me after that."

Mrs. Bower would like to see all the youngsters get into golf, but it's so time-consuming and expensive—what with clubs and balls to buy and green fees.

"In Kentucky people don't live the hectic life they do here," she says. "There seems to be more time there for golf. I'd like to see my son (3-year-old David) play golf when he is old enough, but not to excess. Some children become so interested in the game they neglect their studies."

Brilliant Approach Wins

Betty Garber of Argyle, who tied Mrs. Rex Howard of Kenwood for medalist honors Monday, edged Mrs. Henry Riley of Washington in the closest match of the championship flight, 1-up, on the 19th hole.

On the deciding hole, Miss Garber landed in the sand trap on

her approach, but chipped out beautifully to land within 2 feet of the cup. Mrs. Riley found the rough on her approach, and took a 5 to Miss Garber's 4.

Mrs. Howard was erased by Mrs. D. H. Henderson, women's champion of Congressional, who won the last two holes to prevail, 2-up.

Mrs. Albert B. Bower, who with her husband moved here from Kentucky in the middle 1940s, apparently is here to stay, and apparently the District Women's golf championship is going to be a fixture in the Bower household.

However, Mrs. Meckley, a three-time former District women's champion and winner and runnerup in the United States women's senior championship the last two years, was only 1 down at the ninth. The Kenwood player missed two short putts on the back nine as Mrs. Bower widened the margin.

Mrs. Bower hit the ball for championship distances all week and except for an occasional putting letdown would have been 75 or better in each round.

Mrs. M. J. Torlinski, president of the Women's District Golf Association, presented the prizes, including the medalist trophy to Mrs. Rex Howard of Kenwood. The latter tied with 83s with Betty Garber of Argyle in the qualifying round but the USGA ruled Miss Garber suffered a two-stroke penalty for moving the ball on the first hole, and not the one-stroke penalty recorded at the time.

Mr. and Mrs. Bower and their 3-year-old son will move to the Virginia capital on December 1, where Mr. Bower and a group of associates have taken over a private business.

The Bowers will retain a non-resident membership in Manor Country Club, but plan to become active members of the Country Club of Virginia.

Mrs. Bower's absence will be a definite loss to District women's golf, which has had a minimum of new faces over the past several years.

The Bowers joined Congressional, but transferred to Indian Spring when the former course was closed. Later they transferred to Manor Club.

The first important title Mrs. Bower won here was the Maryland State crown in 1945. Since the birth of their son Mrs. Bower has played a limited tournament schedule. Her outings here have included net or gross prizes in most of the one-day cup events, including winning The Star Cup in 1945 and 1949.

As a Country Club of Virginia player Mrs. Bower doubtless will play on the Old Dominion team against the District in the inter-city matches next year.

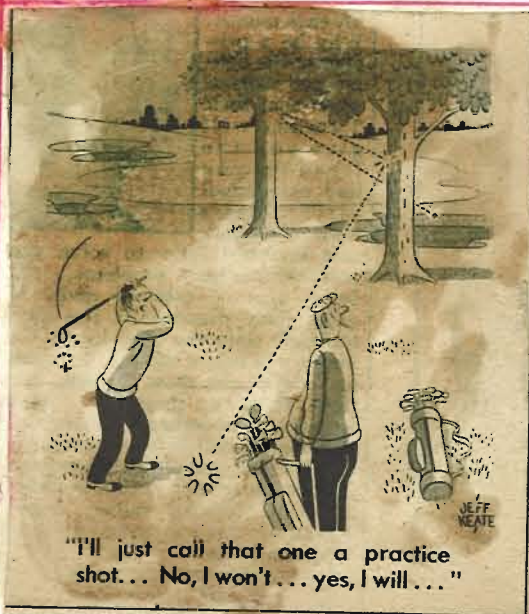
