Speaking of Humans—Now Take Golfers

THOSE having so much as a nodding acquaintance with the puzzling sport called golf might profit here by breezing around the course with a low-handicap amateur psychiatrist—Prof. Robinson Murray. He is a man with steel nerve enough to tackle a question of the ages: "Tre golfers human?" This is something that has bothered millions the world over, especially golf widows, as the brooding brides of divot-diggers prefer to be known.

Prof. Murray's name suggests he hails from the bonny shores of the thrifty



land where the game was popularized and possibly he is a golfer of sorts himself. His new book (Prentice-Hall, title same as the burning question above) was still damp when received—not with the ink of a recent press run, but with muddy water from the moat guarding the 16th green at Columbia.

The author attempts to answer his brave question by letting his characters speak for themselves, a clever trick employed by those professionals whose chief stock in trade is a couch. It's Prof. Murray's honor, so he splits the middle with that tiny white object golfers pursue so avidly through rain, snow, sleet,

Fabulously wealthy men spend hours of their precious time searching for golf balls that retail at \$1 per copy. Can such men be human? To the can such men be human? To the golfer, a caddy with two good eyes is dearer than a gold brick at Fort Knox. Take Jock MacPherson as he steps onto the first tee. "Laddie," says he to his caddy, "are ye guid at finding balls?" Caddy: "Yes, sir, that I am." Jock: "A-weel, then, go find one and we'll get started." we'll get started."

Losing a golf ball, Prof. Murray reports, can make a man madder than losing a good wife, even one who has a lot more mileage left in her than the golf ball had. The attitude of the golfer looking for a lost ball is: "I don't care if I never see that blanketblank thing again, but I'd give 10 years of my misbegotten life for the satisfaction of knowing where it is." Human?

If they practiced more golfers would lose fewer balls, but only the pros practice. In every other sport, a sensible man likes a trial run before sticking his neck out. The batter takes batting practice. The pitcher warms up. The tennis player lobs a few. But the golfer who swears he'd give an arm to break 100 would rather go to the first tee as cold as a rock. His motto is to shoot first and ask afterward such questions

A golfer who practices is accused of taking the game too seriously. Of course, there's the eager-beaver who desperately wants to learn and slaves away on the practice tee with five bushels of balls beside him. A hundred yards out a small caddy, tongue lolling, runs in all directions retrieving the foozles our hero hits. This fellow

really isn't improving his game. All he's doing is perfecting his mistakes. When Alex slings his clubs over his shoulder and tells his cold-eyed wife he's off to the club, he says he's going out for some "fun." Is he? To see him later, fraught with frustration, limp with exasperation, one wonders. Golfers have been known to go through an entire season without favoring their closest friends with even a frosty smile. The

game does require considerable concen-

tration, you know.
For example, Alex shanks a shot 175 yards from a well-trapped green. The ball hits a tree, bounds off a boulder, skips across a footbridge spanning a canyon and suddenly ducks into the cup-for a birdie 3 on a tough par 4. Does Alex smile at his luck? Don't be foolish. He pokes out his chin, glares at his companions and says in acrid tones: "Maybe you guys don't believe it, but that's the way I played it." Could he be human?

Golf attracts all types and is played in all languages, particularly bad lan-guage. The most sinful utterance ever attributed to a minister-golfer was when one missed a pitifully short putt. "I don't swear," he said, "but where I step, no grass grows.'


Golf balls must be played from where they lie, in theory at least, and Prof.

Just as he got the spoon to his lips, a ball smashed the window and holed out in his soup. Dripping with displaced vitamins, he jerked back in stunned surprise and started to push away the bowl. Just then a purplefaced golfer, club in hand, stuck his head through the broken window and yelled: "Don't touch it, stupid—I'm playing it from there!"

Human or not-gimme my baffy and cleek, this cloudburst is just what the course needs.



Schedule Approved For Women Golfers







HAPPY NEW YEAR! STYMIE NOW DEAD BUGABOO IN GOLF

New York, Dec. 31 (AP)—It's goodbye, and good riddance, at midnight to the stymie in golf. At the stroke of 12, the pesky ole stymie becomes a dead duck under the new uniform code of golf.

The abolution of the stymie was the major change made in the rules when the U.S. Golf association and the Royal and Ancient golf club of St. Andrews, Scotland, got together last May. The new rules go into effect Jan. 1 and will be the same the world

Gooseneck putters and other trick putters used by Americans got the okay from the golfing brass.

Another change, designed to speed up play, prohibits all practice strokes on a round, includ-retrying putts after holing out. The penalty for violation in medal play will be two strokes.





20-Plus Golfers Out In Women's Revision Of Handicap Classes

After spending several seasons encouraging the high handicap golfers to compete in its tournaments, the Women's District Golf Association reluctantly cut the 20-plus handicappers out of all but one event in a revision of the handicap classes yesterday.

Effective with the 1952 season, Class A will be scratch through 10, Class B will be 11 through 15, and Class C will be 16 through 20. Last year the class limits were scratch through 14 for A, 15 through 20 for B and 21 through 26 for C.

However, the tournament fields became so large under the 1951 limits that it became increasingly difficult for the tournament chairman to obtain courses for the 18 regularly - scheduled competitive events of the Association. The women golfers have been asked to keep their tournament fields under 100.

One Tourney For 20-Plus.

Now players with handicaps over 20 will have only one tournament sponsored by the Association, and in it will play for a trophy donated by Mrs. Owen Hines of Washington Golf and Country Club. It will be known as the Duffers tournament. The original Duffers will become the Elizabeth Harris Cup.


