WOMENS GOLF MEDAL IS WON BY MRS. NOBLE

Kenwood Star Turns In Near-Record 76

Mrs. George Noble, a transplanted Texan, won the qualifying medal Monday in the Women's District Golf association championship at Kenwood Golf and Country club with a near record score of 76.

The host club star had a new course mark in the making but tossed her chances away on the comparatively easy first three holes of the back nine after having played the tougher front nine in one over men's par 36.

Scores Three Birdies

Mrs. Noble, who won the Lakewood club championship at Dallas four times before coming to Washington to live, birdied the par three second and sixth holes and got a third birdie at the long par five ninth hole to manufacture a big three stroke lead over her nearest competitor.

Mrs. E. C. Ferriday, playing with Mrs. Noble and out in 39, overhauled the medalist at the 14th but the smooth-swinging Texas gal rallied, coming to the last green needing only a five to be assured the coveted medal honor.

But, as things turned out, it wasn't Mrs. Ferriday, who threatened Mrs. Noble, but Betty Garber, the defending champion, who finished moments ahead with a 77.

Mrs. Ferriday, after having caught Mrs. Noble, bogeyed the par three 15th to again go behind and then took a disastrous six at the 16th and a seven at the 17th to finish in 79.

Miss Garber, who was out in 40, played the back nine in 37 and had a seven-foot putt on the 18th green for a 76 but left the ball inches short of the cup.

Equals Course Mark

Mrs. Noble's score equaled the course mark established last year by Mrs. Betty P. Meckley in two different club events. Mrs. Meckley, a three-time winner of the city title, finished with an 81 to be tied for fourth low along with Mrs. Jack Smith of Prince Georges, a finalist in last year's tournament.

Mrs. Meckley's card was completely devoid of threes, losing six strokes to the medalist on the par three holes alone. The medalist played the par threes in one-under par, while Mrs. Meckley was five-over on the shorter holes.

Four members of Kenwood's city championship team earned places in the championship flight. Besides Mrs. Noble and Mrs. Meckley, the host club qualifiers were Mrs. Samuel Crocker, 84, and Mrs. J. P. Trouchaud, 86. Mrs. Rex Howard and Mrs. Hartwell McCarterney, the other team members of the Kenwood team, had 88's.

Miss Garber plays Mrs. J. R. Holzapfel of Army Navy, who got in with an 84, in Tuesday's opening match play rounds. Mrs. Noble, in the lower opposite bracket to the champion, drew Mrs. Henry Lebovitz of Woodmont, who earned her place in the select circle with 85.

Champion In Upper Half

Miss Garber was given the No. 1 seeded spot as defending champion, but the luck of the draw placed her in the tougher upper half of the draw along with such stars as Mrs. Meckley, Mrs. Ferriday, Mrs. D. H. Henderson and Mrs. Trouchaud. Mrs. Ferriday, one of the tournament's ranking favorite, drew Mrs. Trouchaud as a first round opponent, while Mrs. Meckley faces Mrs. Henderson.

Pull Upsets to Gain Today's

Medalist, Defender Both Ousted

A pair of stunning upsets marked the semifinal round of the Women's District Golf Association championship as Mrs. Lloyd Dennis defeated Mrs. George Noble, tourney medalist, one up, and Mrs. Edward C. Ferriday beat defending champion Betty Garber, 5 and 3, at Kenwood yesterday.

Of the two, perhaps the greater surprise was the victory over Mrs. Noble of the host club, by Mrs. Dennis of the Washington Golf and Country Club.

The match was even throughout, but Mrs. Dennis won her spot in the finals on the par four, 359-yard fourteenth hole with a bogey five. Her opponent, who was among the top favorites to win the championship, took a double bogey.

First WDGA Try

Mrs. Dennis, playing in her first District tournament, went ahead at the outset, sinking a 25-foot putt for a birdie four on the 385-yard first hole.

They halved the second and third and Mrs. Noble, who posted a four-over-par 76 winning the medal in Monday's qualifying round, won the fourth.

Mrs. Dennis went one down at the sixth after taking a double bogey six. They halved the sixth and Mrs. Dennis won the seventh. Mrs. Noble, a former Dallas, Tex., women's champion, dropped a long putt for a par four and won the eighth to retake the lead.

Mrs. Noble went in front by two at the tenth, but Mrs. Dennis came right back on the next hole with a par four. They halved number 12 and Mrs. Dennis evened the score again with a par three on the thirteenth.

Garber's Putting Off

Then came the match-winning fourteenth, that placed the attractive Washington golfer within sight of victory. Mrs. Dennis had some trouble when her approach shot went wide, but Mrs. Noble lost the hole with poor putting. They halved the remaining holes.

Miss Garber's big difficulty, and what she later claimed was wrong with her game, was putting. She missed a short one on the first hole and went one down to Mrs. Ferriday, of Chevy Chase, who holed a long putt for a birdie.

The Argyle golfer missed a short putt on the ninth hole with Mrs. Ferriday leading two up. Mrs. Ferriday was two over par with a 38 at the turn.

Miss Garber was four down at the eleventh hole and after halving the number 12, 13, and 14, she lost to Mrs. Ferriday, a long-time competitor in the WDGA but never a champion, on the fifteenth.

Mrs. Dennis and Mrs. Ferriday will tee off for the 18-hole final round today at 10 a.m.

WDGA Final

Mrs. Ferriday Wins, 2 and 1

New D. C. Women's Champion No Longer Fears Match Play

Mrs. E. C. Ferriday's triumph in the District Women's Golf championship has restored her confidence in her match-play golfing ability.

The pretty, hazel-eyed blond, mother of two daughters, took the title to Chevy Chase Club for the first time since Elizabeth Houghton's victory in 1940, with a 2-and-1 victory yesterday over Mrs. Lloyd Dennis, surprise finalist from Washington Golf and Country Club.

Mrs. Ferriday was looking back over her golf career after winning her first District title, and she pointed out she has been better at stroke play than match.

Frequent Medal Winner

In Philadelphia she won the medal three times in the junior championship, but each time lost in the finals at match play. In 1951 and '52, Mrs. Ferriday was medalist in the District championship, but was a victim of the medalist jinx in the first round both years. She lost in the Chevy Chase club championship finals last year, after winning the title two straight years.

After qualifying with a 79 in the District championship, Mrs. Ferriday won her way through the toughest half of the draw, defeating Mrs. J. P. Trouchaud in the first round, Mrs. James A. Swink in the second and Betty Garber, the defending champion, in the semifinals. She played below-80 golf every day until yesterday, when she needed par for an 80 when the match ended.

Outhit All Opponents

Mrs. Ferriday outhit all her opponents, putted well all week and was particularly pleased with her iron play. She did not have a three-putt green yesterday and chipped into the cup on the first hole and came within an inch of holding a 9-iron shot on the 16th.

Mrs. Dennis also needed part on the 18th for an 80 when the match ended and it culminated the best golfing week of her career. She actually was surprised she qualified for the championship flight, and then won three matches, upsetting

the medalist, Mr. George Noble. With a fine short game she was a constant threat to Mrs. Ferriday.

Mrs. Dennis' Upset Golf Victory Is Anticlimax to Her Family

The District women's golf championship finals today almost was anticlimax to the family, friends and clubmates of Mrs. Lloyd Dennis of Washington Golf and Country Club. When Mrs. Dennis' arrived yesterday her son, Jeff, had just semi-final triumph over Mrs. George Noble of Kenwood, the medalist, there was a sign "Welcome Mrs. Lloyd Dennis, Home, Champ," on the steps of the Dennis' home.

It was the work of her 8-year-old son, Jeff, who like the rest of the neighborhood had heard of his mother's victory. He scurried after a big piece of cardboard and in huge letters printed the greeting.

Mrs. Dennis, who defeated Mrs. Noble, 1 up, was sent home by her friends with orders to stay away from the telephone and take a complete rest for today's final match with Mrs. E. C. Ferriday, jr., of Chevy Chase Club.

Mrs. Ferriday Wins Easily.

In the other semifinals at Kenwood yesterday, Mrs. Ferriday was an easy 4 and 3 victor over Betty Garber of Argyle, the defending champion. That was a mild upset, principally because Mrs. Ferriday had lost in the first round of the last two District women's championships, after winning the medal in each.

Mrs. Dennis, who all week has been apologizing for her golf in her modest fashion, brought out her best game for the match against Mrs. Noble. She was 2 down at one time, but squared the match on the 13th and went ahead on the 14th. She had 79 for the round.

Washington members were pulling hard for one of their most popular players as the Virginia club has not had a District women's champion since Mrs. Dorothy White Nicolson won more than 20 years ago. Mrs. Nicolson, now a resident of Delaware, was Miss White at the time.

Mrs. Dennis' Game Keen.

Mrs. Dennis qualified with an 86 and defeated Mrs. Jack Smith, last year's runnerup, in the first round. When congratulated on her victory, Mrs. Dennis said



Mrs. Smith had an ailing back and did not play her game. In a second-round 5 and 4 triumph over Mrs. Oren Lane, Mrs. Dennis said her opponent apparently was off her game.

Again yesterday, Mrs. Dennis refused to take much credit for the victory. But she has been playing good pressure golf all week. She has been entirely too modest over her victories, which include last year's runnerup and the medalist as victims.

Mrs. Ferriday has found Kenwood's front nine her favorite. She has been close to men's par of 35 on each of her four trips this week and has held a commanding lead each time after nine. Against Miss Garber, Mrs. Ferriday was out in 38 and 3 up.

The tall, former high school physical education teacher, played the front nine in 38 strokes to accumulate a big 6-up advantage at the turn. The match, the shortest one of the day, ended on the 12th green.

Garber vs. Meckley

The Argyle Country club star meets Mrs. Betty P. Meckley of the host club in Wednesday's second round. Mrs. Meckley, a three-time holder of the city title, eliminated Mrs. D. H. Henderson, club champion at Congressional, 2 up.

Mrs. George Noble, the medalist, ran into a tartar in Mrs. Henry Lebovitz of Woodmont. The transplanted Texan lost the first hole to a par and the fourth to a birdie to be two-down at that juncture but managed to win four of the remaining five holes to be two-up at the turn.

Mrs. Dennis Steals Show In WRGA Second Round

Mrs. E. C. Ferriday jr., of Chevy Chase club, played the best golf, but Mrs. Lloyd Dennis of Washington stole the show in Wednesday's second round matches in the Women's District Golf association championship at Kenwood Golf and Country club.

Mrs. Dennis makes her first appearance in the city championship semifinals Thursday against Mrs. George Noble, the medalist. Mrs. Ferriday played the front nine of the Kenwood course in 36 strokes, despite an out-of-bounds penalty on the fourth hole, to earn the right to play Betty Garber, the defending titlist, in the other championship flight semifinal.

Defeats Mrs. Lane

Mrs. Dennis turned back Mrs. O. H. Lane of Belle Haven, another tourney darkhorse, 5 and 4. Both Mrs. Dennis and Mrs. Lane were first round upset victors but there was no question as to who was the best golfer Wednesday. The Washington Golf and Country club player was out in 42 to manufacture a huge 6-up halfway point lead and then closed out the match on the 14th green, 5 and 4.

But Mrs. Dennis meets sterner opposition Thursday in Mrs. Noble. The transplanted Texan eliminated Mrs. C. L. Egenroad of Washington, 4 and 3, the same score by which Miss Garber and Mrs. Ferriday won.

This season Betty has upheld her top ranking by winning low gross in The Star and Herald Cup tournaments, and she was low among the District players in the recent Eastern women's championship with 80—82—82 at Congressional. Mrs. Ferriday won the Keefer Cup, second most important of the District events.

Then Mrs. Noble came through with a 76 in the District women's qualifying to win medal honors. Thus far the three players who figured to dominate the women's golf picture have done so.

Today Miss Garber, still tickled over recovering her old putting stroke, met Mrs. Ferriday, who again yesterday showed she can play the most spectacular golf of the three. At times she lacks consistency.

Finals Tomorrow Morning.

The other match was between Mrs. Noble, the host club champion, and Mrs. Dennis. The winners meet at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning for the title.

Mrs. Betty Meckley, three-time District champion from the host club, fully believes Miss Garber is a new person on the greens after the latter rapped in two 15-foot putts and a 20-footer en route to a 4 and 3 victory over Mrs. Meckley. The match was even after six holes and then Betty started dropping the long ones.

Mrs. Ferriday was out in 36 in spite of a ball out of bounds in a 4 and 3 victory over Mrs. James A. Swink of Belle Haven, and when the match ended on 15 and the players walked in Mrs. Ferriday had par for a 74.

Loses Hole on Technicality.

Mrs. Swink made an excellent stand against that type of golf considering that she lost the sixth hole when Mrs. Ferriday's approach shot hit the pin held by Mrs. Swink's caddie. Mrs. Swink was one down at that point and would have evened the match with a three there, but instead automatically lost the hole to go two down.

Mrs. Noble started with a six on the first hole, a jinx to her, and still was out in 39 in a 4 and 3 triumph over Mrs. Charles Egenroad of Washington.

Mrs. Dennis was six up at the ninth and won 5 and 4 over Mrs. Oren Lane of Belle Haven. This is Mrs. Dennis' first District championship and she has been playing consistent low-80 golf for the three rounds. "But today," she observed, "I started running into the 70 shooters."

Betty Garber Breezes As Long-Lost Touch With Putter Returns

Betty Garber is not bragging—she's hardly the type—but the Argyle Club champion who is seeking her second straight District women's golf championship this week at Kenwood claims she has regained a putting touch missing for two years.

Last winter she listened to a pro in Florida and had her putter bent to an upright position. The other day, putting poorly, she discovered her eyes—which should be directly over the ball—were missing this position by a foot.

So Betty bought a new putter and went back to the practice putting green at Rock Creek, where she used to be queen. Suddenly she found the touch. She had 77 in the qualifying round and yesterday defeated Mrs. J. E. Holzapple, 8 and 6. For eight holes she was one over men's par before taking a six on the ninth.

The usually quiet Miss Garber was exuberant over her newly found putting touch.

Mrs. Meckley was a 2-up victor over Mrs. D. H. Henderson of Congressional. Mrs. Ferriday, who has won the medal the past two years but lost in the first round each time, avenged a 1951 defeat by leading all the way in a 3 and 2 triumph over Mrs. J. P. Trouchaud of Kenwood. Mrs. Swink, constantly improving, won 3 and 2 over Mrs. George Maksim of Manor.

Mrs. Dennis Surprises.

Mrs. Dennis was the big surprise of the first round with her 1-up victory over Mrs. Jack Smith, the Prince Georges club champion who was runnerup to Miss Garber last year, and also lost a medal playoff to Mrs. Ferriday.

Mrs. Lane had par in for a 79 when she defeated Mrs. Samuel Crocker of the host club, 5 and 4. Mrs. Noble had a scrap on her hands for nine holes against Woodmont's promising newcomer, Mrs. Henry Lebovitz, who finally lost 4 and 3 after admitting she was terribly nervous in her first big match.

Mrs. Egenroad was a 3-and-2 winner over Elinor Finckel, the Columbia club titlist. Semifinals will be played tomorrow starting at 10 o'clock, and the final Friday at 10.

Tournament winners usually average 30 putts per round. Mrs. Ferriday is hitting her woods long and straight and her irons with accuracy. This could be the season for golf stardom for the pretty mother of seven and nine-year-old daughters if she can find the putting touch.

Winner Also Has Low Gross.

The Keefer Cup event, second only to the District championship in importance on the Women's District Golf Association schedule, was dominated by Mrs. Ferriday. Her gross score was low by six strokes and she was the low net winner by eight. It was the fourth straight year a Chevy Chase player has won the event over her home course and the eighth time in all.

Mrs. Ferriday has won low gross cups before, but, in her competitive golf here and in Philadelphia, yesterday was the first time she has won a low net award. For the past two years, Mrs. Ferriday has been the low gross winner in the Keefer competition.

Wins With Net of 75.

Mrs. Kerkam won her club championship two years ago. Her winning score yesterday was a 42-40-82, minus 7 handicap for a net 75. That was not her lowest score, as she has played Columbia in 79.

The Columbia women golfers believe Mrs. Kerkam can hit a ball as far as anybody in town. She frequently reaches the long par 4 sixth in two shots. The winner's score yesterday included 10 men's pars. On the 17th where she went three over she drove in the ditch and had a horrible time, but recovered nicely on the 18th.

Until Mrs. Kerkam finished it appeared that Betty Garber, the District women's champion, and Mrs. Morton Kaufman of Woodmont would play off. Miss Garber has won dozens of low gross prizes but she too was excited about the prospects of winning low net. She had 80, minus handicap three for 77.

Mrs. Kaufman, mother of three children, 12, 10 and 5, also was hopeful of a first cup triumph. She played the back nine first and had 41, and took 45 on the front nine for 86, minus 9 for a net 77. Mrs. Kaufman was a member of the third bracket of Woodmont's first team that was the second high-point scoring bracket of the series.

Miss Garber Wins Low Gross.

With the tie broken, Miss Garber won low gross with her 80, despite little putting luck. Mrs. E. C. Ferriday, jr., of Chevy Chase, the Keefer Cup champion, was second gross winner with 82, including a back nine of 39.




