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WDGA Hopes for Larger Role in 56th Season

The Women's District Golf Association enters its 56th year with 498 members from 28 clubs and a new president determined to make the organization a greater force on the local sports scene.

"So far, the presidency has been the easiest job I've had," said Ruth Ann Verell of Belle Haven, a past treasurer, secretary and first vice president of the WDGA.

"Everything has been going so smoothly I'm afraid I've been ne-glecting something. I keep telling my-self with tongue in cheek that the bubble will burst some day. But everybody in the association has been doing a job. I'll get all the credit if every thing goes well and I suppose all the blame if it doesn't."

The things that seem to be going well include the WDGA's junior program and a slate of competition that begins May 9 and includes some new wrinkles.

Member clubs must be within a 25mile radius of the District.

It is not easy for women to play golf in this area. As it is in other parts of the country, most courses here limit the starting times of women. At the majority of local clubs it is difficult for women to tee off between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. On weekends, women normally are kept off the course entirely before I p.m.

exceptions Among Spring, which offers unlimited memberships to women, and Bethesda and Kenwood which also allow single memberships, with only a few restric-

Verell minimizes the difficulties for

women golfers.
"We have absolutely no problems
"be men" she said. "We rarely with the men," she said. "We rarely have to make any changes in our schedule. The courses have been extremely fair. We have absolutely no complaints, and we think it's great that we've been given the opportunity to play the various courses.

"We have had tremendous coopera-tion out of the pro shops. We are in golf for the fun we get out of it. We are not competing with the men. The success of our association for more than 50 years speaks for itself.'

The organization's junior program is a source of much WDGA pride.

"Tina Marlowe, daughter of Tony Marlowe, the Woodmont pro, is in charge of our junior program," said Verell, "and what a job Tina has done. I feel strongly about junior golf tournaments. It's more difficult to get a young girls interested in junior golf than tennis.

"Our junior program has borne fruit. Out of it came Vikki Staton, whose family was a resident member of Belle Haven until recently. Vikki became one of the top women players in the area. There was, of course,

Sally Voss (current woman star of the area) and also Tina Marlowe. I can also recall the Jordan sisters, Michele and Lene, of Army Navy.

Women's competition starts with the traditional Keefer Cup at Chevy Chase May 9-10. After that will come 22 WDGA-sponsored events. The team matches start April 24. These events do not include the various championships sponsored by the Men's District, the Middle Atlantic and the Maryland State Golf associations.

"But we're looking forward to a brand-new tournament sponsored by Ann Heuer, our former president," said Verell. "The initial tournament will be held at Heuer's home club, Congressional, on Oct. 9 and is called The Tournament of Champions. It is limited to players with handicaps of eight and under and will include all champions of our various events.'

The women are sticklers for fairness. For instance:

"We rate our own courses," says Ve-"We work at it in order to make handicaps more equitable. We found, for example, that the low handicaps of the women who belonged to Brooke Manor in Rockville were not consistent with their performances. Most of Brooke Manor women didn't do well in our net tournaments.

"So we went out ourselves to Brooke Manor. We found the course is nonwatered (no sprinkling system) and the hall there gets a lot more roll

resulting in lower scores and lower handicaps. So we made the necessary adjustments."

Virtually all of the WDGA tournaments are net affairs to give everybody a chance. The team matches used to be head to head without strokes. There are six divisions of team play but the WDGA insists only those players who have handicaps of 22 and under may be in competition.

The WDGA seldom has players of national caliber. An exception is 20-year-old Voss, of Congressional, who last year won the Women's District Championship and the Maryland State Women's Amateur. Voss is a pre-med student at Stanford and while on the Pacific Coast last summer won the San Francisco women's

"I do think that this summer will be Sally's final turn around the circuit," said Verell. "I think Sally could compete on the national level and even on the LPGA tour. But I get the impression that golf is her avocation. She has indicated her true vocation is medicine. She has been a delight to have here with us."

The lowest handicap among the play-for-fun members belongs to Carol Davies of Washingtonian. She carries

Arlene English of the same club and Nancy Hollenbeck of Army Navy both have sevens; Verell has an eight.





Brubaker Returns, Leads by Two

Ruth Brubaker of River Bend, returning to the Washington golf scene after a four-year absence, shot a net 71 yesterday to take a two-stroke lead at the halfway point of the 49th annual Keefer Cup tournament at Chevy

Brubaker's husband is in the State Department and was stationed in Malaysia where it is hot and steamy the year round and only the privileged are permitted to ride carts. So yesterday's warm weather was no great hardship for Brubaker, who carries a 12 handicap and scored a gross 83.

The low gross for the day went to Congressional's Pam Smyth with an 82, 11 over women's par. The best nine-hole score of the day was turned in by Chris Epperly of Army Navy, a newcomer to this tournament, who had 39 on the front side.

Defending champion Betty Looney of Army Navy was safely in the qualifying fold with a net 78. The low 32 and ties qualified, bringing to 35 to-day's field for the final 18 holes.

Tina Marlowe of Woodmont, one of the younger players in the Women's District Golf Association and a former Middle Atlantic junior champion, had a gross 37 for a net 80. Carol Davies Washingtonian, who carries a five handicap, the lowest in the tourna-ment, came in with a gross 84.

Brubaker was out in 41 and home in 42. She started with a bogey on the first hole and a double bogey on the second when she three-putted. But after that her putter had a great touch.

She parred six straight holes from the seventh through the 12th, thanks to some long putts.

Smyth had a 42-40, with her only birdle coming on the short fourth hole

when she sank a 15-footer. Jean Pohanka, also of Congressional, had a first nine of 41, with a birdie on the long third when she put a wedge shot a few feet from the pin. But she faulted on the back with a 46 for an 87 and a net 73.

Evans Wins Keefer Cup

Jody Evans of Chevy Chase returned the prestigious Keefer Cup to the host club for the first time in 17 years yes-terday with a two-day net total of 142, four strokes bettetr than Springfield's

The event, which annually kicks off the Women's District Golf Association tournament season, was begun in 1932 by the late Mrs. Frank Keefer, a for-mer WDGA president.

Low gross for the Keefer went to Carol Davies of Washingtonian, who had gross 79 yesterday for a two-day total of 163. Davies' 79 was matched by defending champion Betty Looney of Army Navy two-time District champion. Looney finished tied for third with clubmate Em Kennedy at net 147.

Looney was an early leader and her two-over-par 37 on the back nine put her in good position for a second consecutive trophy.

But Evans, a onetime junior golfer of national reputation when she lived in Philadelphia, came through to win the event after 13 years of trying. She has a 13 handicap and shot a two-day gross of 166 for her net 142.

Evans attributed her success to Gene Mattari, Chevy Chase assistant pro, who changed her grip and her

swing. "I didn't even make the cut for the Keefer last year," she said, "but Gene took me over this year and

straightened me out."

Evans was out in 43 yesterday and home in 38. She had a double-bogey 6 on the fifth hole when her ball found a trap on the second shot. She came out long and three-putted. She bogey-ed the next four holes going out

and then rallied on the back nine.
Evans parred the 10th and 11th
holes and bogeyed the 12th. But she birdied the short 13th when she put a three-wood shot four feet from the cup. She played steadily from that

Gudely was out in 47 and back in 39.
She had three double-bogeys on the front side but settled down on the easier back nine. Looney had seven straight pars in her round of 79.





In Short, Sally Voss Is the Area's No. 1 **Woman Golfer**

It has been a quiet upheaval. Overthe space of last summer and the spent portion of this one, the ranks of Washington's top women amateur golfers have been assailed and, certainly by now, overtaken.

With a flash of blonde hair and a graceful swoop of her old McGregor fairway wood, Sally Voss, a 21-year-old with the winsome smile and the swing to match, has cut through the area's traditionally strong corps of women golfers and established her-

self as the finest player hereabouts.
She has won the revered Women's
District Golf Association championship the first two times she entered it. She has won the Maryland Women's Amateur. She was a twotime All-America at Stanford University, a remarkable feat considering a women's All-America team has only

been picked for the last two years.

Today she starts play in the U.S.

Women's Open at the Brooklawn
Country Club in Fairfield, Conn. And there have been bigger long-shots who have won the national title before.

This rise to the top all has been accomplished with a measure of grace. While beating just about everyone she's encountered in this area, she leaves not only the loser

but everyone else, talking only of her boundless ability. Says Betty Looney, a two-time WDGA champion: "She's a superb golfer, extremely capable, extremely charming, has an absolutely marvelous swing, a great temperment and never gets rattled. She outclasses

everybody on the golf course."

Says Bruce Summerhays, her coach at Stanford: "She was one of the best women golfers in college and probably is one of the best in the

Says Bill Strausbaugh, the Columbia CC pro and her current coach: 'She is a multi-talented lady. She has

a God-given gift."
Says Bob Benning, the Congressional pro who observed her and her game grow up at her home course, "She's a delight to watch and it's been a pleasure watching her ad-

To which Voss, with her common grin and shrug, says, "I honestly don't consider myself, you know, all that wham-bang successful. This is just something I really enjoy doing.

Such sentiment comes from a woman who graduated from a topflight university with a 3:7 grade right university with a 3.7 grade average. She will attend medical school at the University of California-San Diego next fall after scoring in the 90th percentile on her Medical College Admission Tests. She is pretty enough to furn just about any head she wants, but still will blush and shrug while talking about herself. about herself.

Prodding is needed to get her to admit, "I'm ambitious."

Her golf game evolved slowly, but

most strong players, it was started early. At age eight, she would follow her father and older brother around the old nine-hole course at the Bethesda Naval Hospital, where her father was then a Navy doctor.

"He was most patient when I was first learning how to play," she says of her father Bill, a former college

of her father Bill, a former college All-America baseball player who now plays to a 13 handicap. "He'd walk along with the little daughter topping a 3-wood down the fairway."

With no formal golf program at Holton Arms where she went to high school, Voss split time with tennis, WDGA's junior program and banging it around at Congressional.

"She was the kind of kid who'd pack her own bag and play with all

pack her own bag and play with all the boys from the men's tee," Ben-ning says. "And she could hold her own as a 14- or 15-year-old." "They'd (the WDGA) have tourna-

ments every Monday during the summer," Voss says. "And that's how you start playing. If you shoot 57 for nine holes, they still give you a golf ball or something and that will get you to come back next week."

you to come back next week."
Which she did, week after week.
By the time she reached 15, she was shooting in the mid 80s, and while she was proficient, the idea of play-ing collegiate golf had not occurred. "At Stanford, I just stumbled into a

really good program. It was a nice break for me because I always played a lot of sports in high school and I needed some sort of release."

She made the team as a walk-on and quickly assumed the No. 3 spot on a five-woman team. Stanford finished in the team 100 of the country.

ished in the top 10 of the country that year. Voss, like her every other year at the school, was named to the Northern California All-Conference

"She's one of the best woman players I've dealt with," says Summerhays, a two-year member of the U.S. Ryder Cup team, from his home in Fremont, Calif. "Surely, she could turn pro if she wanted to. She's got the physical ability and she's really come on with the development of here mental game as well.

here mental game as well.

"She really gets off the tee well and she's a real good putter, too. And those are two characteristics it takes to make a winner."

Although skeeis mostly self-taught, at the end of her sophomore year of college, Voss started going to see Columbia's Strausbaugh, the area's noted teacher. Although she was a seven handicapper at the time, the effect on her game was marked

effect on her game was marked.

"The talent was always there,"
Strausbaugh says. "I just tried to blend a little technique into it. I feel that she has learned to reduce the variance in her play, to reduce the

poor swings."
Returning to Stanford, she won the University of Arizona Invita-tional, the Sun Devil Classic and was medalist and titlist of the San Fran-cisco City Championship. Then last summer, in her first try, she won the

Over her last year at college, she averaged 76.5 strokes while playing the majority of her rounds at the university's par-75 course. More remarkably, starting with the fall season, vost in ever finished lower than fourth in any tournament, ex-

cept once.
"She's done it really out of grit,"
Benning says. "She's worked very,
very hard."
Her play now is nearly faultless.
Exceptional with a driver, she hits any club well from the fairway, plays her best under competition and while some may find some small inconsistency with her short game, she has made an impression.

"She is simply outstanding off the tee," says Looney, a very active player in the WDGA for more than a decade. "She can reach most par 5s in two and any long par 4 with a drive and a middle or short iron which most women just aren't capa-ble of doing."

It is too soon to tell if she will develop as the finest women player to come from Washington. But she certainly now ranks in the top three. She holds Congressional club records on both the Blue and Gold courses, having shot a 71 on the Gold the first day it opened last year. She also set the Columbia record last summer in 69.

So, what is left for an amateur's amateur? Besides the Open, Voss will play in the U.S. Women's Amateur, the Trans-National and the Western Open with hopes of gaining enough and attention to make the Curtis

Cup team.
"In 1980, they go to England in August." Voss says. "And I would love to

Sally Voss of Congressional moved closer yesterday to retaining her Women's District Golf Association championship at Springfield Country Club, but is expected to face her strongest challenge today in a semifinal match against Carol Davies of Washingtonian.

Voss gained the round of four by defeating her longtime junior partner, Woodmont's Tina Marlowe, 7 and 6, while Davies was disposing of Pam Smyth of Congressional, 5 and 4.

In the other bracket, Chris Epperly of Army Navy, joint medalist with Davies, had an uphill battle to beat Congressional's Pat Thurner, 3 and 2, while Betty Looney, a two-time champion, upset Army Navy teammate Nancy Hollenbeck, 2 and 1

Voss and Marlowe were roommates at the National Girls Junior Championship in San Diego a few years ago and have known each other since they

But Voss, who averaged 225 yards a drive, was relentless in besting Marlowe yesterday. She was never headed after winning the first hole with a par. Voss was 5 up after seven holes par. Voss was 5 up after seven holes and made the turn with the same lead. She went 6 up at the 10th and won the 12th with a par to finish Marlowe, a University of Maryland junior. Voss, a recent graduate of Stanford University who will enter medical school in September, was even par for 12 holes.







Michelle Jordan Picks Missouri as Her Course

After an already illustrious career as a local golfer, Michelle Jordan of Fairfax has decided to accept a full scholarship offer from the University of Missouri-Columbia to play

golf next year.

Jordan, the defending Women's
District Golf Association (WDGA) junior girl's champion, signed a let-ter of intent earlier this week. There were 19 such scholarship offers from various colleges, but Jordan chose Missouri because of the rapport she felt for Coach Dianne Lyon, the compatability and skill she saw on the team, the practice facilities and the university itself.

The Fairfax High School senior and her sister, Lene, have domi-nated the WDGA junior tournament for the last three years. Michelle won the title in 1976, the year that both girls became the first female golfers to receive varsity letters from Fairfax High School, and Lene captured the championship the fol-

After graduating in 1978, Lene moved west and is now at Brigham Young University on a full golf

scholarship.

Michelle Jordan began playing golf in California in 1972. As a 12-year-old, she finished first in her age group of the Junior World Championships. Since moving to Fairfax, she has won the representation rights for the mid-Atlantic region to the Junior World Championships twice. In addition, she became the only junior golfer in the nation to qualify three straight years for the PGA Junior Nationals. As a member of Army Navy Country Club, Michelle has won the Tournament of Junior Golf Champions at Reston twice (1976 and 1978).

On the national level, Michelle has reached the quarterfinals of the USGA Junior Girls Championship, finished as the runner-up in the PGA Junior Nationals, been named to the national team for the Lengfeld International matches, ended up eighth in the Eastern Women's Amateur, and qualified for the championship flight of the Women's Trans-Na-

A taller golfer with a smooth, even swing, Michelle is involved in more than just golf. She recently displayed her musical and dramatic talents in winning the Miss Fairfax title at a local pageant. And later this spring, she will have the co-lead in her high school's production of the musical "Wonderful Town."



All Right, Maryland, What About Women?

For two golf organizations that share a common border, namely the Potomac River, the Maryland and Virginia state golf associations prob-ably couldn't be more dissimilar. At about 160 member clubs, the Virginia association is almost three times the size of its colleague to the north, but the size of the clubs' mem-bership rolls is not the important difference.

Judging from a number of Virginia and Maryland events that this observer has attended over the years — admittedly a far greater number in Maryland — the Maryland State Golf Association (MSGA) takes more care in the actual conduct of its championships. But the Virginia State Golf Association (VSGA) is superior in at least two important cate-

The VSGA accepts memberships from public courses that meet certain requirements and, therefore, is more of a pure state-wide organiza-tion. Also, the VSGA includes a women's division that is able to conduct a greater number of women's events than the MSGA.

According to current schedules, the Virginia State conducts 16 events, 12 of them championships. Six of the 16 events are for women and girls, and five of these are championships. In comparison, the MSGA runs 12 events all told, 10 of them

runs 12 events all told, 10 of them championships, but only one each for wooen and girls.

Very quietly, the Maryland association this year abandoned its women's team championship in the fall. Also, with the shrinking of its Women's Amateur from five days to four last week — by scheduling the quarterfinals and semifinals in one day at the Country Club of Maryland — the MSGA gives the appearance of hoping that the women will go away.

Says Dick Latimer, the conscientious president of the Maryland as-

tious president of the Maryland as-sociation: "We're not antiwomen at all, but we have to have participa-

His reference is specifically to the women's team championship, which was abandoned after only three years when only eight clubs fielded teams last fall, four each from the Washington and Baltimore areas. Also noteworthy this year was the absence of Sally Voss of Congressional Country Club from last week's Women's Amateur at CC of Maryland Women's Amateur at CC of Maryland in Towson. She mentions "a handful of reasons" for her decision not to defend the title she won a year ago at Woodmont Country Club in Rock-

Foremost, apparently, is her concentration this summer on events of a national stature. If she had made the 36-hole cut in the U.S. Women's Open last weekend in Connecticut, it ould have been almost impossible for her to return home to qualify last Monday in the Maryland Women's championship at Towson. Also, she is scheduled to play in the Women's Western that begins tomorrow in Madison, Wisc., and the Trans-Na-tional the following week in Bay St.

Louis, Miss. It is clearly a crowded schedule.

Further, although she refused to be quoted on the matter, she did not care for how the MSGA ran its Women's Amateur last year at Woodmont. It was not nearly as enjoyable for her as the Women's District GA championship, which she won for the second straight time last month. "Let's say I really enjoy playing In the Women's District champion-ship," she says without elaboration. Also, she seems irritated by the

engraving on the MSGA trophy, which came back from the engravers last year minus her club affilia-tion and minus the top. The trophy top since has been recovered, but the entire matter didn't sit well with

As for the doubling up of two rounds into one day of the MSGA Women's championship, Voss was not concerned for herself because she is still 21 years old and can han-dle the heat and extra stress. "I personally don't mind, but for some of

the older players it might even be dangerous," she says.

It now appears that another Congressional member, Ann Heuer, could be a leading force in reviving the women's team championship this fall and also possibly beginning a women's organization that could become a division of the Maryland association.

After learning that the MSGA was abandoning the women's team events, Heuer, who is immediate past president of the Women's District GA, called a meeting in February that was attended by female representatives of 15 Maryland clubs. Heuer's hope, she says, is eventually to organize women from about 50 clubs, each with a captain, but it appears that this fall there will be only 13 clubs playing in the new team matches.

If these matches get off the ground, they could possibly — only possibly — form the basis of an organization that could become a women's division of the Maryland

"If it is successful," Heuer says of the new team chambionship. 'I would hope it would be the beginning of a women's organization working within the Maryland state.

"I would like a women's organiza-tion, but I would like to work out a compromise with the men. I do not believe in having two organiza-

Latimer, of course, cannot commit the MSGA to a women's division, but at the same time he sounds encouraged. "If we really felt it was produc-tive," he says, "I think we could have a women's arm of some sort.

Clearly, the chances are not great at this time. But the idea has been planted firmly.

Strangely enough, some of the things that Toski told her three years ago are just now making sense. It was during a family trip to Miami when her father Gary was able to contact Toski, who was in the area. The results of those three lessons were debatable.

"At that time, I wasn't too sure of everything he was saying," Eyre said. "But we tape-recorded everything he said. We typed it up and Richard (Cormier) just read it and

was able to understand what he was

saying."
And now Eyre's putting those lessons to use.
