Arlene English of Congressional, playing in the final group of the day, bogeyed the final hole but finished with net 71 to take the first round lead of

finished with net 71 to take the first round lead of the 36-hole Women's District Golf Association Keefer Cup yesterday at Chevy Chase club.

English topped her tee shot on the par-4 18th hole, hit a five-wood second shot from heavy rough and struck her three-wood third shot onto the green, four feet from the cup. She missed the putt and settled for a one-shot lead with 80-9-71.

At 36, English is a graduate student in communications at American University and wears braces on her teeth. "I'm doing everything late in life," she said.

Including playing good golf. Before her shaky finish, English had made five pars and a birdie on the back nine. "I got excited about some good pars I made . . . and that made me swing too quickly on the final hole," she said.

Lorraine Elder four-putted her last hole, the slick ninth green, but made four birdies and was tied for second at net 72 with Army Navy clubmate Fran Schultz. Elder shot 79-7-72 while Schultz, who had a strong chipping and putting round, carded 80-8-72. carded 80-8-72.

Elder tied new WDGA member Angie Munno of Argyle for low gross, 79. Munno had no birdies but made 12 pars. Munno left the course to attend her final day of classes in her junior year at the University of Maryland, where she majors in nuclear

engineering.

Munno was tied at net 75 with Bobbie Kane (87-12-75) and Nancy Hollenbeck (83-8-75), both of Army Navy, which had seven golfers among the

Hawley Wins Keefer Playoff

Carol Hawley of the host Chevy Chase Club received a good-luck telephone call from one of her five grandchildren and then won the 51st Women's District Golf Association

Keefer Cup in a playoff yesterday.

Hawley's bogey on the second hole of sudden death was good enough to defeat Fran Schultz of Army Navy after both finished with 36-hole net scores of 147.

Hawley added an 86 yesterday to her first-round 85 and subtracted her 12 handicap each day to arrive at her total. Schultz, who has an 8 handicap, shot 83 yesterday and 80 in Wednesday's opening round. It was Hawley's first WDGA victory.

Hawley maintained she doesn't "have the nerve" for golf, but her name will nevertheless be inscribed on the \$10,000 sterling silver trophy.

It was Schultz who came unraveled in the playoff. After they tied the first hole the two golfers went to the long par-4 second hole. Schultz half-topped her tee shot, topped her

second shot, and finished with triple bogey 7. Hawley was on the green in three and two-putted from 20 feet.

Hawley appeared out of the run-ning when she was nine over par after eight holes. But then she righted herself with her only birdie on the day on the par-3 ninth hole, where she laced her tee shot two feet from the cup and sank the short putt for deuce.

Hawley started the day two strokes behind first-round leader. Arlene English of Congressional and one behind Army Navy clubmates Schultz and Lorraine Elder. English faltered with a four-putt green for a triple bogey on the front nine, and then took a water-induced quadruple bogey on a back-nine hole, finishing six shots back at net 153.

Elder, from Florida State, also wilted. She double bogeyed the ninth hole for the second straight day and finished with 22 and tax

Knowledge of 'The Rules' Can Help in Many Ways

Most golfers don't realize that it pays to know The Rules of Golf because they can help as much as penalize you. Two cases

on because they can help as much as penalize you. Iwo cases in point:

• Arnold Palmer won his first Masters in 1958 because he knew he was entitled to a free drop when his ball became embedded in a mound behind Augusta National's 12th green. An official on the spot told him he would have to play the ball as it lay or take a penalty to drop because the ball was in the "rough."

He scored a double-bogey by playing the ball as it lay, then took a free drop with a second ball and got a par 3. On appeal, the rules committee decided that Palmer was right, and that his official score for that hole was a three. Thus, Palmer was able to win the Masters by one stroke instead of losing by one if he had accepted the original ruling.


• A few years ago a player on the PGA Tour putted his ball too hard and it rolled into a pond bordering the green. Knowing he had to keep the spot where the ball crossed the margin of the pond between him and the hole, he took a penalty drop on the other side of the pond. Obviously upset, he muffed his next shot, dumping it into the water again and winding up with a nine for the hole.

What the player didn't realize was that the rules permit

mine for the hole.

What the player didn't realize was that the rules permit another option. He could have taken a stroke-and-distance penalty and re-putted from the original spot intead of playing back over the water.

This subject comes to mind because of a rules seminar sponsored by the Women's District Golf Association at Columbia last week. Rules committee chairman Nancy Hollenbeck took the audience of almost 100 women on a mythical round of golf, using diagrams of 18 holes from different courses to explain the rules applicable to situations players might experience on those holes.





In opening the seminar, WDGA president Jan Beatty reminded the women that knowing the rules is not only a must in order to play the game correctly, it can also be a "great advantage.

Hollenbeck is an eight-handicap player at Army Navy who spent 21 years in the Navy and came out a lieutenant commander. A referee in field hockey and basketball, she has attended USGA-PGA schools to qualify as a golf rules official. Key points helenbeck made during her presentation about

Key points Hollenbeck made during her presentation about rules that can be helpful include:

• Always place a mark on your ball when you start so you can identify it. It's not enough just to use a ball brand or number different from what the others in your group are using. Someone playing another hole might knock an identical ball near yours. If you can't prove which ball is yours, you have a "lost" golf ball.

• Likewise, when playing a provisional or second ball, use a ball with different marking in case you find both near each other. You have to know which you played first, and which second, or your ball is also "lost."


• When checking your swing in order to get relief from an obstruction, you must use the club with which you intend to play the shot in determining the nearest point of relief. However, in measuring the additional club length of relief to which you are entitled from that point, you may use the longest club in your bag, the driver.

you are entitled from that point, you may use the longest club in your bag, the driver.

• When taking relief from, say, ground under repair, you must take total, not partial, relief. You may not, for instance, drop out close by in order to get a better angle on the hole, and then stand in the ground under repair to play the stroke. Sometimes you are better off playing the ball as it lies rather than drop in an undesirable area. For that reason, you shouldn't lift your ball until you are certain you want to.

• When dropping out of a lateral water hazard, you may drop

• When dropping out of a lateral water hazard, you may drop on either side. Sometimes, it's to your advantage to drop on the side opposite from where it entered the hazard

You are entitled to relief from casual water in a bunker or on the putting green, if water intervenes between your ball and the hole. A ball resting in water in a bunker may be dropped

the hole. A ball resting in water in a bunker may be dropped out with one stroke penalty, or dropped in another part of the bunker without penalty.

• There is no penalty for someone to hold the flagstick up so that you can see where the hole is while you play a blind shot.

• There is no penalty in stroke play for playing out of turn. In a singles match, your opponent may, if he chooses, ask you to replay the stroke. In a four-ball match, he may ask you to replay the stroke only if it occured on the tee or the putting green.

• In four-ball competition, any player may have any ball lifted and marked on the putting green. A ball that is struck by another ball must be replaced. In a singles match, the player whose ball is struck has the option of leaving it where it came

Regarding penalties, a general rule to remember is that, unless otherwise specified, the penalty in stroke play is two strokes and in match play loss of a hole.

Columbia's Lester Barker, one of the country's top-ranked rules officials who assisted Hoillenbeck, brought to the seminar two volumes of decisions interpreting the 41 rules published by the USGA.

"Most rules violations are unintentional and the result of ignorance of the rules," he believes.

One of the most common violations is asking another player, not your partner, what club he used on a shot before you are about to play a similar one, usually done on the tee of a par 3 hole. Another is agreeing with an opponent to waive a rule, for which both players can be disqualified.

In an article poking fun at the complexity of golf rules, Charles Price, former Kenwood club champion and at the time editor of Golf magazine, told about an incident that occured when he was playing in a pro-am tournament at Bethesda

editor of Golf magazine, told about an incident that occured when he was playing in a pro-am tournament at Bethesda Country Club in 1946.

On one hole, Price hooked his tee shot and his partner, George Diffenbaugh, Kenwood pro, hit one of his rare slices to the opposite side of the hole. Because of a gallery between them, neither could see the other and they hit their second shots simultaneously.

Believe it or not, the balls collided in mid-air.

"I never did discover what the rules had to say about this situation," Price concluded.

Barker found the answer in Decision 75-18 under Rule 11-4 in Volume One of the USGA's Decisions on the Rules of Golf. Both players must replay their shots and take a two-stroke penalty.

Bob Benson, the District Golf Association's rules committee chairman, will conduct a seminar on tournament management at Kenwood Saturday for committee members and volunteers who will be assisting in the conduct of the association's tournaments this summer.

The six-foot Bethesda Country

Club champion is playing in San Jose, Calif., this week in the first of nine 54-hole tournaments in which

she will compete, winding up in Red-lands, Calif., on Nov. 11.

Group Fore competitors are most-ly professionals who won less than \$15,000 on the Ladies' PGA Tour last year. They play for \$10,000 in prize money. Williams will play as an amateur eligible for merchandise prizes.

She has been in Hemet, Calif., several weeks practicing while staying at the home of the father of Dave King, District Amateur champion and a Bethesda member.

"Kim just wants to find out early what her chances are and whether she would like playing the tour," her father, Doug, said on returning from California last week. "She's probably two or three years away from her po-

tential, but she needs competition to reach it."

The suggestion that Williams play on the Group Fore tour was made by Mary Alice Canney, assistant pro at Chantilly National.


"She wents to find out how good."

When a 15-year-old shoots oneunder par rounds, a professional career has to be considered a possibility. Both Turnbull and Dolan think it is possible but both agree it is still some time away.

"The probability is high that she could play professionally, but it is sheer nonsense to say that she will," said Turnbull. "She definitely has the ability but she may find something that she likes more than golf. With her determination and drive, she will be good at whatever she does."

Davis Wins Amateur Title

Cindy Davis of Crofton withstood a back-nine challenge from defending champion Karen Jones of Argyle and scored a 2-and-1 victory for the championship of the 62nd Maryland State Golf Association women's amateur yesterday at Bretton Woods.
