Manor women upset Army Navy in golf

Manor upset defending champion Army Navy, 29½-24½, in a second-round match to take first place in the championship division of the Women's District Golf Association team matches yesterday at Congressional.

Montgomery Village, which led Manor by a half point after the first round, dropped one point behind Manor after defeating Argyle, 28-26.

Lakewood took over first place in the Second Division despite losing to Army Navy, 27½-26½, in third-round matches at Kenwood.

Two Virginia clubs, Springfield and International, are making the Third Division a two-team race. Springfield leads International, 94 points to 91, with the next team, River Bend, 12 points behind International.

Westwood leads the Fourth

Division, Indian Spring the Fifth Division, and Fairfax the Sixth Division.

The matches will continue next Tuesday.

Montgomery Village wins women's interclub title

Montgomery Village won its first Women's District Golf Association interclub team championship at Brooke Manor yesterday. It defeated defending champion Army Navy, 28-26, to score a clean sweep of all six matches it played.

Congressional, the 1980 and 1982 champion, trailed Montgomery Village by 3½ points going into the final matches and was the only team with a chance to overtake the Gaithersburg club. But the River Road players were only able to squeak by Manor, 27½-26½, and fell another half-point behind Montgomery Village.

Handicaps were used in the championship division for the first time in six years.

M.V. Captain Shirley Kushner said she had to insert only one substitute, Diane Singleton, in winning the six matches. Kushner contributed to yesterday's victory by scoring birdies on the third and fifth holes to give her team a 5-4 lead on the front nine.

In the Second Division, Lakewood overtook the idle leader, Army Navy, to win the

division title by 1½ points over Indian Spring.

International and Springfield tied for first in the Third Division and will engage in an 18-hole playoff in about two weeks.

Final matches in the Fourth Division will be played at Springfield tomorrow.

Winners in the Fifth and Sixth Divisions, decided last week, were Indian Spring and Argyle, respectively.

Mont. Village women near golf title

Montgomery Village's women golfers are in a good position to win their first Women's District Golf Association interclub team championship at Brooke Manor County Club tomorrow.

They hold a three-and-a-half point lead over Congressional as they approach their final match against third-place Army Navy, de-

fending champions who have won the title 18 times.

Congressional, champion in 1980 and 1982, faces sixth-place Manor.

There has been a reshuffling of power in the championship division because of the use of full handicaps, with the better players having to give stroke allowances to their less-talented opponents. For the past five years the competition in this division has been played at scratch, with no stroke allowances, giving the better players an advantage. Even when the handicaps were last used in this division, in 1978, the stroke allowances were only 80 percent of handicap differences.

Thus, with only one match left, we find perennial champion Army Navy in third place and Argyle, always a strong contender, buried in last place.

Lakewood and Indian Spring are the leading contenders for the second division title at Army Navy. Army Navy is in first place, but has

completed its matches and will likely be overtaken by Lakewood or Indian Spring, which trails Lakewood by four-and-a-half points.

Matches have been completed in the fifth division, won by Indian Spring, and the sixth division, won by Argyle.

Evans Takes 1st-Round Lead In Keefer Cup With Net 72

Former champion Jody Evans, 63, "trying to prove there is life in the old girl yet," shot net 72 to take the first-round lead in the 36-hole Women's District Golf Association's Class A Keefer Cup yesterday at Chevy Chase Club.

Evans, winner of this event in 1979 and a member of the host club, got off to a horrible start—bogey, bogey, double bogey—but settled down and made pars on the seventh and eighth holes. She had four more pars on the back nine and finished with an outgoing 41 for an 18-hole score of 85. She applied her 13 handicap to that score for a one-shot lead over Carol Davies, who shot 78-5—73.

After her poor start, which included the double bogey on the par-5 third hole when she drove into trees

and three strokes later hit a weak wedge shot onto the green, Evans said she tried not to get upset. "I tried to put it behind me. I said forget it, play the next hole."

"They all admire that I still walk around," said Evans, who recently retired from the Transportation Research Board. "I'm one of the veterans." She has played golf for 50 years.

Davies, a computer programmer from Washingtonian, had 13 pars yesterday.

"The course was playing long," said Davies. "It's been sort of a rainy spring and it's a long golf course. The greens are beautiful, fast and true. When I putt 'em good, I like 'em."

Kim Williams of Bethesda, the only golfer in the field with a plus handicap, shot 75 and leads the gross division. Williams' net score was 76.

Kim Williams won the Women's District championship Friday over her home course, Bethesda Country Club, and is now in Harrisburg, Pa., today trying to qualify for the U.S. Women's Open.







SOMEHOW IT WAS fitting that Deb Richard, a slim young woman from Manhattan, Kansas, should win the 84th United States Women's Amateur Championship, which was played at the Broadmoor Golf Club, in Seattle. In the first place, Seattle is known locally as the Emerald City — as in *The Wizard of Oz*. The connection was talked about during the players' dinner, which precedes the championship, and that was six days before Miss Richard was to thrust her fist skyward as the new champion and to be compared immediately to Dorothy, the young heroine of the Frank Baum novel.

Moreover, the fictional Dorothy went spinning off to Oz in the funnel of a tornado that ripped across the Kansas prairie, and that, after all, is where Deb Richard originated. Also like Dorothy, Miss Richard had no wish to leave Kansas.

Dorothy probably would have been puzzled by Deb's reasoning, because match-play golf wasn't an issue in *The Wizard of Oz*. It was with Miss Richard, though; she simply doesn't like match play and had no plans to play in the Women's Amateur. While Dorothy's unwilling journey to a far-off place was caused by nature, Deb had only a fellow Kansan to blame. The culprit is Miss Judy Bell, Chairman of the USGA Women's Committee.

Miss Richard was in Colorado Springs, Colorado — Miss Bell's present residence — to qualify for the U.S. Women's Open, in early summer, and bumped into Miss Bell.

When Miss Bell learned that Deb planned to skip the Women's Amateur, and heard the reason why, Judy, horrified, threatened to submit the entry herself. Deb said her entry form arrived two days before the deadline. "A good thing, too," she said after her victory, "or I

would have passed up the opportunity for the greatest week of my life."

In view of the circumstances, it was appropriate for Miss Bell to tell Deb during the awards ceremony: "Dorothy, you aren't in Kansas anymore." (Actually, Dorothy said this to her dog, Toto, in Baum's book.)

DEB RICHARD perhaps could be described as the Wizard of Ahs, based on the finish of her third-round match, a 1-up victory in 19 holes over Heather Farr, of Scottsdale, Arizona.

You must understand that Miss Farr is an accomplished player. In 1982, she won the U.S. Girls' Junior Championship, at the Greeley Country Club, in Greeley, Colorado. Less than a year later, she was low amateur in the 1983 United States Women's Open. Earlier this year, she was a member of the Curtis Cup Team, and less than one month later, she won the U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship, at the Meadowbrook Golf Course, in Rapid City, South Dakota.

Although the Misses Farr and Richard were all square after nine holes, Heather won the 10th, 11th, 12th, and 14th holes to go 4-up with only four holes to play. Miss Richard won the final four holes to even the match, and then birdied the first hole, a 415-yard par 5, to win.





Williams, of Bethesda Country Club, will meet University of Florida player Deb Richard of Manhattan, Kan., in Saturday's final.

Williams Loses on 37th Hole

SEATTLE, Aug. 18—Kim Williams of Potomac, Md., lost to Deb Richard of Manhattan, Kan., today in a sudden-death playoff in the final of the 84th U.S. Women's Amateur golf championship at the Broadmoor Club.

Williams, the Maryland state and Women's District champion from Bethesda Country Club, had survived close matches all week, including a Friday semifinal match with British Amateur champion Jody Rosenthal, but fell to Richard's birdie on the first extra hole.

Williams, a junior at Mississippi State, won the par-4 17th hole to even the match. Each had parred the 485-yard 18th hole (the 36th of the match), sending the match to sudden death.

Richard, a University of Florida student, was over the green with her second shot on the par-5 hole, but chipped within two feet. After Williams missed a six-foot birdie putt, Richard made her putt for birdie that gave her the championship.

Playoffs had been kind to Williams most of the week. She parred to win the first extra hole in her first match and birdied it every other match until the final.

"I won a lot of matches on that hole. I think I birdied it every time I played it," she said.

Williams birdied the 18th to end the morning round, 1 up. Richard, playing in only her second tournament of the summer, won the first two holes of the afternoon round to take the lead for good.

The match might not have gone to sudden death if Williams had been able to sink a five-foot putt on the first hole of the afternoon round. But she missed her birdie attempt and then missed again, from three feet.

Neither player led by more than two holes and the match was tense, although characterized by mediocre putting. Williams three-putted three times on the front nine of the afternoon 18.

"It's a funny game," said Williams. See WOMEN, F3, Col. 5

and putted great. I started hitting the ball today but couldn't putt."

"I'll be back next year and the year after that. I beat a lot of great players getting here."

Williams' touch around the greens most of the week was the talk of the tournament. She was unable to give an answer to the change in her putting fortunes.

"I don't know what it was," Williams said. "I was either charging the putts a lot more or just the greens were much faster."

Richard, as she had done all week, took command early with solid shotmaking and was two up after nine holes.

"The first 18, I had a lot of birdie putts, but I was too tentative," said the three-time Southeastern Conference champion. "I've never played a 36-hole final and I just didn't know how to approach it."

Actually, Richard had to be nearly begged into entering the tournament by U.S. Golf Association official Judy Bell. Richard was in Colorado Springs when Bell finally convinced her to enter the tournament, and she got her entry in two days before the deadline.

"I hate match play," Richard said. "I have not enjoyed it in the past and I wasn't wild about spending \$800 to do it. I've had so many times where I've shot 72 and my opponent has shot 73 or 74 and beat me. That gets old."

However, Richard added, "I have not a regret in the world" about entering the tournament.

Richard shot her third nine in

two-over-par 37 and was 2 up with nine holes to play, but she bogied No. 10 and Williams remained one down by sinking an eight-foot bogey putt at No. 11 (the 28th).

Williams dropped the next hole with a double bogey to go 2 down again. Richard protected her lead by making a 15-foot par putt for a half at the 29th hole and then conceded an eight-foot birdie to Williams at No. 30, remaining 1 up.

Both players parred the next two holes and then Richard, who was distracted by gallery noise the entire match, cracked on the 35th. She drove to the right, missed the green to the right, and missed an eight-foot par putt while Williams evened the match with an easy par.

After Williams drove perfectly off the 36th tee, Richard drove to the right, flirting with out of bounds on the 485-yard, par-5 hole.

"I thought I hit it OB," Richard said. "I almost had a heart attack."

After that, both made routine pars to force an extra hole.

Williams' father, Doug, nervously watched the final. He fidgeted as his daughter sank a two-foot par putt at the 36th hole and said: "We're right where we were when we started a 9 a.m. But they're tired and I'm tense. It was worth the 3,000-mile trip."

Although Williams did not win the championship, she will be remembered for a gesture that occurred during her Friday semifinal against Curtis Cup player Rosenthal. On the 16th hole, Williams missed a 12-foot par putt and then conceded a very missable 2½-foot putt by Rosenthal that evened the match.

Williams Will Enter Canadian Amateur

After playing an exhausting 163 holes of golf in six days and coming agonizingly close to winning the top women's amateur tournament in the nation, one might think Kim Williams of Potomac would rest.

But Williams, 21, who fell to University of Florida golfer Deb Richard on the first playoff hole to lose the 84th U.S. Women's Amateur Saturday in Seattle, will practice this week and will play Thursday in the Canadian Women's Amateur in Calgary.

"I'm ready to go," Williams said cheerfully. "As long as I keep winning, why not?"

It figures. Good friend Karen Jones recently telephoned Williams' house to arrange a golf game; there was no answer. Jones now knows she should have tried Williams' second home, the Bethesda Country Club golf course.

"From what I know she spends all day at the golf course," Jones said. "I could never get in touch with her to play."

Jones, who played collegiate golf at Oklahoma State, is an expert witness to Williams' improvement. She beat Williams in the semifinals of the 1982 Maryland State Golf Association women's amateur. This year they played each other in the third round of that event, which Williams eventually won.

"I was even par after the front nine and I was four holes down," Jones said. "She just hit the ball close to the pin and knocked 'em in for birdie. She beat me, 5 and 4. She was four under par for 14 holes."

"She's really turned into a sharp player," added Jones, who plays at Argyle Country Club. "She doesn't make too many mental mistakes. She can hit the par 5s with regularity in two, which is a great help, and her iron game has improved."

Williams broke through this season by winning two area tournaments that had frustrated her. She won the Women's District Golf As-

sociation championship at her home course, and the Maryland State at the Naval Academy. She also made the quarterfinals of the highly regarded North South Women's for the third straight year. Among her victims in the National Amateur this week was Jody Rosenthal, a Curtis Cup player and the reigning British amateur champion.

"Beating Jody, that was great," said Williams. "I pretty much considered her and Deb the best players there. It was very surprising."

"I have yet to get a major, but I almost got the biggest one of all."

On the 37th and final hole against three-time Southeastern Conference champion Richard, Richard came very close to driving out of bounds, but went on to birdie the par-5 for victory.

Williams had a knack for winning close matches this week. "I played basketball (at Wootton and Walter Johnson high schools)," she said. "I was a shooter, and when it came down to the end of the game, I had the ball and I never missed them. That trains you, and prepares you. It's the same kind of circumstances."

Williams also putted exceptionally all week, until she played Richard in the final, and then had some troubles on the greens.


"Before I went out there, Mr. (Jim) Folks, my pro, gave me a putting lesson. That putting tip got me there, I'll tell you that right now," Williams said. "He said to move the ball back in my stance a little bit, and move my hands forward."

Williams also credited Columbia Country Club's teaching pro, Bill Strausbaugh, with helping her swing mechanics.

The hard work theme is also echoed by Brian Richard, Bethesda Country Club assistant professional. "Kim's been out here every day since she got home from school" (after completing her sophomore year playing women's golf for Mississippi State.) "She's out here hitting anywhere from 100 to 500 balls a day."

ASSOCIATION CORNER

WOMEN'S DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA GOLF ASSOCIATION

The Women's District of Columbia Golf Association is one of the best golf associations in the area. There are tournaments for golfers of various levels. In order to join the WDGA as a full member, a player must belong to and be actively associated with a member club, must be eighteen years of age; and must have a USGA handicap based on twenty (20) scores which does not exceed the current WDGA limit. In addition, at the time of joining in December, a player must have twenty (20) scores posted from in-season rounds of the preceding year (November 1 through October 31). A player not meeting this last requirement may join (but in no case before April 1) when she acquires enough in-season scores from the preceding year and the current season (e.g., a player with 18 scores from November 1 through October 31 is not eligible to join in December but may join, after April 1, after posting two additional in-season scores from the current season.) There are several types of Tournaments:

A. Class Cup Tournaments by handicaps

1. Class A 0-13
2. Class B 14-16
3. Class C 17-19
4. Class D 20-22

B. Added Fee Tournaments - included are championship events plus invitationals.

Tournament sites are excellent, the cost is reasonable and everyone has a great time. A handbook is provided for each member which lists all tournament schedules, officers, rules and members.



Top area amateur Cindy Davis turns professional

"I feel extremely confident about my game," Davis told *The Journal* in an interview. "I worked hard on it all

spring. It will be nice not having the academic pressure I always felt when I was playing for Furman.

"I have played against some of the players on the ladies' tour and know I can keep up with them. I wouldn't try it if I didn't think I could make it."

She'll get an early test in about a month at the U.S. Women's Open at Salem Country Club in Peabody, Mass., July 12-15 — if she passes the qualifying test July 3 in Atlanta. To prepare herself, she is returning to Greenville, S.C., this week for more coaching from Mic Potter, Furman coach and head pro at the university's golf course.

Last year she qualified for and fin-

ished tied for second low amateur in the Open played in Tulsa. She shot 79-72-76-77—304, 14 shots more than winner Jan Stephenson, and tied for 40th.

She also finished second in the 1983 NCAA after losing the lead on the final day. This year she finished 12th, but was especially proud of the Furman team, which finished third.

Davis, whose home is adjacent to the Prince George's course in Mitchellville, played several times last week with the new assistant pro, Troy Beck, who will try to qualify for the Women's Open July 2 in Philadelphia.

Asked to evaluate Davis's game, Beck said, "Her swing is real solid, but she needs to develop a few more shots. That will come with experience."

"Cindy is not a very long hitter, but she is above average."

The Bowie High-School graduate will not be eligible to defend the three major area championships she won last year — the District, which will be played June 25-29 at Bethesda; the Maryland State at the U.S. Naval Academy course July 17-20; and the Middle Atlantic at Prince

Anne in Virginia Beach, Sept. 5-6. She also won the Maryland State in 1982 and the Middle Atlantic in 1980 and 1981.

Interestingly, the second- and third-ranked players last year have also turned pro. They are 1982 District champion Amy Geithner, former member of the Country Club of Fairfax, and Jane Abood of Kenwood.

Geithner, who coaches the women's team at her alma mater, Wake Forest, has taken a job as assistant pro at a club on Fishers Island, N.Y. Abood, captain of last year's Penn State team, tried to qualify for the ladies' tour in Texas last October, but failed the 54-hole test. She is employed full-time by a communications firm.

Another Triple Crown winner, Congressional's Sally Voss, who won the District title twice, will be home on vacation from her medical internship in San Francisco later this month, but will not try for a third District championship. Instead, she will compete in the Women's Western Amateur in Hamden, Conn.
