



# Elder's 69 Leads Keefer Cup

Lorraine Elder of Annandale, the No. 1 player on the Florida State women's team, eagled her second hole and went on to shoot net 69 to take a one-stroke lead after the first round of the 36-hole Women's District Golf Association's Keefer Cup yesterday at Chevy Chase Club.

Elder, 21, had a one-over-par 72 for her gross score to also lead that division.

Rita Chadwick of Lakewood Country Club (80-10—70) and Dot Gates of Columbia Country Club (83-13—70) were tied for second. Michelle Mackall of Montgomery (74-3—71) was third in the event, which begins the WDGA season.

Elder, who plays out of Army Navy Country Club, began play on the back nine and three-putted her first hole (the 10th) for bogey.

On the next hole, the par-5 11th, Elder reached the green in two after fine tee and three-iron shots,

then sank the putt for her eagle 3. She later had three birdies on a course she said was playing shorter than usual.

The only thing bothering Elder was shaky putting. Three of her six bogeys were the result of three-putt greens.

Chadwick, 41, was "furious" after double-bogeying her two final front-nine holes, but with the help of soothing words from playing partner Betty Hall, she regrouped for a back-nine 39.

Gates, 48, also a swimmer and platform tennis player, birdied the par-4 fifth hole after her eight-iron approach shot landed two feet from the hole. But she had two double bogeys early in her final nine and struggled to an incoming 43.

Mackall, 25, who works in the pro shop at Washingtonian Country Club, birdied her last three holes and five of her final nine.

Last year's champion, Michelle Hiskey, a student at Duke University, did not participate.

# Elder Wins the Keefer Cup

Lorraine Elder eagled Chevy Chase Club's 11th hole for the second straight day and went on to shoot 75-3—72 to earn a two-shot victory in the Women's District Golf Association's Keefer Cup tournament yesterday.

Elder, 21, of Annandale and Army Navy Country Club, had a 36-hole net total of 141 to beat Nada Reuss, also of Army Navy, who had 143. Reuss, a 13-handicap player, shot an 82 that resulted in yesterday's best net round, 69.

Former Keefer Cup winner Carol Hawley of Chevy Chase (net 73), Carol Davies of Norbeck (73), Betty Lou Williams of Army Navy (71) and Michelle Mackall of Montgomery (74) tied for third low net, 145.

Elder, the No. 1 women's player at Florida State, three-putted the

10th hole for bogey to go four over par for the day and allowed Mackall to pull within one stroke.

The 407-yard, par-5 11th hole was decisive. Elder hit a long drive, put her 4-iron second shot onto the green and curled in a 25-foot putt for eagle. Mackall took bogey 6 on the hole to fall from the chase.

"I think I'll just keep playing that hole," said Elder, who won the Louisiana State women's invitational this spring.

Elder did not play as solidly as she did in Wednesday's opening round, when she led by one shot with 72-3—69. After her eagle, she hit into several greenside sand traps, but saved par twice.

On the final approach, she was faced with a difficult 70-foot sand shot. Her effort was too firm and the ball stopped 50 feet beyond the cup. But she two-putted from there for bogey and victory.

BESTHESDA, Md.—As the last golfers began to come in at June 20's WRC Cup at Congressional Country Club, the skies began to cloud and the air turned chilly. What had been a bright, beautiful day was now beginning to turn ugly.

It would seem the tournament would be finished just before the impending rain would come, but four ladies were tied with a net score of 70 and a sudden-death playoff was needed.

But as quickly as the clouds came, they departed, and the sun shone brightest on Beth MacLean. MacLean emerged with the title in only two

playoff holes to edge past Sharon Briggs, Nancy Hollenbeck and Pat Zahand.

MacLean's 80, along with her 10-handicap, put her in the playoff and an eight-foot putt on the second green gave her the victory.

"My game is really starting to improve," MacLean said with a big grin on her face. "I putted really well today."

The WRC Cup was originally to be played on Congressional's Blue Course but at the last minute was changed to the Gold Course. MacLean ran into trouble in the middle of the course but was still able to hang on.

"You really have to play your shots well on this course," MacLean said. "I played No. 9 all wrong. I went way off to the right."

Briggs (Montgomery Golf Club) made it to the playoff with a 76 gross and a 6-handicap. Hollenbeck shot a 78 (8-handicap) and Zahand an 84 (14-handicap).

Briggs, MacLean and Hollenbeck all did well on the first playoff hole and had to move on to hole No. 2. Zahand, of Westwood CC, bogeyed. Hollenbeck, of Army-Navy CC, was the only one to have an approach shot land on the second green. Briggs had a pair of poor chip shots to double bogey the hole. MacLean bogeyed the hole but it was still good enough for the win.

"This was the first time I've played this course," MacLean said sheepishly. She is a member of Hidden Creek.

Briggs, who qualified for the championship flight with an 83, and Seymour will begin play in the scheduled 18-hole championship this morning at 9:40.

Mackall was 1 up at the turn and 3 up after 14. Briggs parred 15 to close within two. On the par-5 16th hole, Mackall reached the green in three and was left with a 60-foot putt. She three-putted and Briggs parred the hole.

On the par-3 17th, Mackall was on the green in two and two-putted for a bogey. Briggs, on in regulation, two-putted for par to pull even. Briggs drove solidly off the tee on the 18th, a par-4, 349-yard hole. Mackall drove into the right rough. Her second shot was shortened when it caught some leaves. She left her approach on the fringe and got a double bogey as Briggs won the hole and the match with a bogey.

In the other semifinal, Ledbetter was 4 up after five holes. But Seymour pulled even on the 10th. On the 16th and 17th holes, she earned ties by sinking eight-foot putts for par and bogey, respectively.

On the par-4 18th, Ledbetter drove her tee shot beneath some pine trees. She was able to hit her second shot only about 15 yards and reached the fringe with her third shot. Meanwhile, Seymour made the fringe in two and parred the hole to win it.

Sharon Briggs was three holes down and Brenda Seymour was four down after only five holes of the semifinals, but they recovered from the shock to score respective one-hole-up victories over Michelle Mackall and Lois Ledbetter in the Women's District Golf Association championship at International Town and Country Club. Briggs and Seymour will meet this morning at 9:40.

"I couldn't do anything right; Lois played very well," Seymour said of her opponent. Seymour birdied the sixth hole, won the eighth, birdied the ninth and parred No. 10 to even the match. For the next seven holes the two golfers stayed even, then Seymour chipped from the fringe to within inches of the cup for the victory.

This marks the third time that Briggs has been in the finals. She has yet to win.

## Veteran, newcomer will meet in women's district golf final

The veteran Sharon Briggs, former women's champion at Montgomery Village Golf Club, won the last four holes to upset Michelle Mackall of Montgomery C.C., 1 up, in the semifinals of the Women's District golf championship at International C.C. yesterday.

She will face Hidden Creek's Brenda Seymour, winner of last week's Pepsi-Cola Invitational at Salisbury in the 18-hole final match today.

Seymour reached the finals for the first time by beating Lois Ledbetter, of Lakewood C.C., also 1 up.

# Seymour Beats Briggs To Take WDGA Title

Brenda Seymour of Hidden Creek scored a 3-and-1 victory over Sharon Briggs of Montgomery Village to win the Women's District Golf Association championship yesterday at International.

Seymour kissed her four-iron after she used the club to hit her tee shot onto the green at the par-3 17th hole, where the match ended.

"When I hit that four-iron, I knew," said Seymour, 25, who lives in Chantilly.

Briggs, 2-down going into the hole, pulled her wood tee shot to the left of the green, chipped her second over the green, and chipped her third shot four feet from the cup. Seymour two-putted for par and victory.

Seymour is married to golf pro Henry Seymour. "He never watches me play, he couldn't handle the pressure," she said.

Seymour, only 5-feet-3 and 110 pounds, consistently outdrove Briggs, who lost the 1980 WDGA final to Karen Jones.

When Seymour hit her second shot


within 20 yards of the green at the 516-yard, par-5 16th, a woman in the gallery exclaimed, "Can you believe hitting the ball that far?"

But Briggs made a fine escape from a greenside bunker at that hole and earned a halving par to force the match to the 17th hole.

Seymour won the Payne Cup last summer and last week won the Pepsi Invitational in Salisbury, Md., but said that the WDGA, being played over five days, made it a bigger victory.

Seymour, who played on Stuart High's boys team before graduating from James Madison University three years ago, plans to try to qualify Monday in Pennsylvania for next month's U.S. Women's Open.

Betty Looney of Army Navy beat Beth MacLean of Hidden Creek, 5 and 3, to win the championship flight consolation. Other flight winners: 1, Susan Fleming, Bretton Woods, def. # She's best of the weekend golfers

For Sharon Briggs, two-time women's champion at Montgomery Village Golf Club, playing in the Women's District championship at International Country Club in Fairfax last week and reaching the finals against Brenda Seymour was a lot of fun. It beat working.

For work is what Briggs usually does on week days while other women golfers are practicing or playing in tournaments.

"Let's face it," she said after losing the final match, 3 and 1, to Seymour, whose husband is a golf pro and operates the Northern Virginia Golf Center in Fairfax, "I'm just a weekend golfer."

"I'm not a scratch player. I played my regular game against Brenda. I played up to my potential, maybe a little better."

Briggs, who plays to a five handicap, had to take time off from her job as office manager for the Washington office of an international engineering and construction firm, Parsons Corp., to play in last week's tournament.

This was her third trip to the District finals. In 1980 she lost to Karen Jones at Argyle and in 1977 she lost to Sue Keeney at Montgomery Village. Both matches were close, as was last Friday's against Seymour.

Seymour, who is only 5-foot-3 and 110 pounds, tied the match with a birdie two on the eighth hole and regained the lead for the

Briggs failed to win another hole. They halved 10 and 11 with pars and the 12th with bogeys when Seymour drove into some trees and Briggs's second shot found a greenside bunker.

Briggs went two down for the first time on the par-five 13th hole when her second shot caught the bank of a pond and cost her a bogey. They halved the next three holes with pars, Briggs saving par on No. 16 by getting up and down from a greenside bunker.

The match ended on the par-three 17th hole when Seymour hit a four-iron 173 yards to the green for a routine par and Briggs pulled her tee shot into some trees and took a bogey.

In reaching the finals, Briggs defeated the veteran Pam Smyth of Congressional, 7 and

5; Lorraine Elder of Florida State and Army Navy, who was the other co-medalist, one up in 20 holes, and Michelle Mackall of Montgomery C. C. 1 up, after being three down with only four holes to play.

Seymour, a 1982 graduate of James Madison University and member of Hidden Creek C.C., defeated Lois Ledbetter of Lakewood C.C., a member of the University of Alabama team, 1 up in the semifinals.

Smyth lost a playoff on the second hole to Nancy Hollenbeck of Army Navy for the Metta Streit Senior Medal. Both had shot qualifying scores of 80.





# Williams tops list of amateurs

Kim Williams' domination of women's amateur golf at both the national and area levels last year made her an obvious choice for No. 1 in the *Montgomery Journal's* annual rankings.

Nationally, the Bethesda Country Club member lost a playoff for the U.S. Women's Amateur championship in Seattle to Deb Richard, a University of Florida senior from Manhattan, Kan. Then, a week later, she won the Canadian Women's Amateur in Calgary, Alberta.

Locally, she won the Maryland State and District titles. Returning to Mississippi State for her junior year kept her from competing in the Middle Atlantic championship.

Cindy Davis of Prince Georges C.C., who turned pro last summer, had claimed the top spot in all four of the previous years that the women have been ranked by the Washington Star's Dick Slay, and since then, by this writer in *The Journal*.

Williams' 1984 performance recalled the era of the Thirties and early Forties when Betty Meckley, of old Indian Spring and Kenwood, and Congressional's Helen Dettweiler achieved national stature.

Meckley won a U.S. women's senior title after winning three Middle Atlantic, two Maryland State and one District championships.

Dettweiler won two Maryland and one District titles in 1937-38 before joining the WASPS in World War II. After the war, she became a charter member of the Women's PGA, predecessor to the present Ladies PGA, and won the Women's Western Open in her first pro competition. She is now a club pro in Palm Springs, Cal., where she gave lessons to President Eisenhower when he vacationed there.

The six-foot Williams, who played basketball for Walter Johnson High, also was qualifying medalist in the District championship and lost the scratch Payne Cup tournament at Congressional by one stroke to Brenda Seymour, whom she had beaten in the semifinals of the District.

She should dominate area golf and be a factor in national amateur competition for the next few years until she turns pro, which she will likely do after graduating from Mississippi State.

Not ranked because she did not compete in the area is Congressional's Sally Voss, a previous winner of all area titles. She ranked second to Davis in 1980, before medical studies confined her to the San Francisco area, and sixth in 1983.

Voss would have finished high in 1984 ranking if eligible. Last spring she won her third straight San Francisco women's amateur championship. Later, she lost in the first round of the Women's Western Amateur in Hamden, Conn., but went on to win the consolation.

Credentials of others in the Top Ten:

■ Hiskey — Finished runner-up in the Women's Southern Amateur, although she was tied near the finish of the 36-hole final when rain stopped play. By prior agreement, the title was awarded to the player who led after the morning round, her opponent.

The Duke junior went on to the third round of the Trans-National in Philadelphia, qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur and won the Keefer Cup at Chevy Chase Club.

■ Persinger — Went to the third

round of the U.S. Women's Public Links in Rapid City, S.D.; was low area qualifier at Columbia C.C. for the U.S. Women's Amateur, and went to the second round of the Trans-National.

■ Seymour — Beat Williams by one stroke in winning the Payne Cup at Congressional; lost to Williams in the District semifinals, finished fourth in the Middle Atlantic and second in the Keefer Cup.

■ Dolan — This Seneca Valley senior won the National PGA junior girls championship and the Montgomery high school individual title, beating the boys. She was beaten in the first round of the U.S. junior girls championship in Bothell, Wash., but finished second in the North-South Junior stroke-play championship in Pinehurst, N.C.. She was selected by Golf Magazine for its junior All-America.

■ Mackall — Finished second in the Middle Atlantic and was qualifying medalist in the Maryland State.

■ Davies — Semifinalist in the Maryland State, third in the Keefer Cup and qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur.

■ Ledbetter — This Alabama junior was a semifinalist in the District, and went on to the second round of the Trans-National, and finished fourth in the Payne Cup.

■ Fry — Won the Maryland State and District girls championships and reached the quarterfinals of the U.S. junior girls. Qualified for the U.S. Women's Public Links and was runner-up in the Women's Western Junior. Is a senior at High Point High.

■ Cayce — This daughter of Congressional head pro Kent Cayce is only 13, but much older in golf experience. She beat Dolan in the semifinals of the Maryland junior before losing to Fry in the final match. She won the Middle Atlantic PGA junior. Competing in her age class, she won the Little Peoples championship in Quincy, Ill., and the North-South in Pinehurst, N.C., and lost a playoff for the International Pee Wee Championship at Disney World. Golf Magazine selected her for its All-America in her age class.

Honorable mention goes to Karen Jones of Argyle C.C. and Oklahoma State and Lorraine Elder of Army Nave C.C. and Florida State.

Jones, unranked in 1983 but listed third in both 1980 and 1982, seems to be having problems with her game. She lost in the quarterfinals of the District and finished fourth in the Payne Cup.

Elder lost to Williams in the first round of the District and qualified for the Women's Amateur. She lost in the second round of the Virginia State Women's championship, but won the Military Dependents national tournament at Langley Field AFB Golf Course.

Liza and Jane Abood of Kenwood, ranked in previous years, have turned pro and are no longer ranked.

Williams trounces Kerdyk, 10 and 8, in Doherty Cup

The last time Kimberly Williams played a double-round, match-play final, she endured 36 interminable holes and lost on the 37th as the sun went down on Seattle in the U.S. Amateur Championship last August.

Compared to that marathon, Williams' title run in Sunday's Doherty Challenge Cup final at the Coral Ridge Country Club was a 28-hole sprint. Williams, a 21-year-old Mississippi State golfer, defeated Coral Gables' Tracy Kerdyk, 10 and 8, for the most one-sided victory in the tournament's 53-year history.

"I guess I just didn't like the idea of another long, long day on the golf course," Williams said. "After lunch, when we teed off for the second 18, I figured if I played steady, she would have to play her lights out to win."

Williams' confident assessment was based on her six-hole lead after Sunday's first 18 holes. She took the lead on the 361-yard, par-five fourth hole when she landed an eight-iron shot 2 1/4 feet from the pin and sank the putt for a birdie.

"I just staked it on that one," Williams said. "That was the beginning of it, and I kept rolling. The key was my short game. I really won it on the first 18 when I hit eight greens."

Williams birdied the 483-yard, par-five seventh while Kerdyk bogeyed and stretched her lead to four when Kerdyk three-putted the ninth for another bogey. On the back nine, Williams had five one-putt holes; Kerdyk continued to struggle on the greens.

"This is like the opposite of yesterday when I couldn't miss," said Kerdyk, 18, a University of Miami freshman. "My putter failed me. It just didn't feel right in my hands, and I couldn't get any momentum going."

Kerdyk tried a more aggressive approach to start the second 18

and took the third hole when Williams bogeyed, but the round took a bleak turn when Kerdyk three-putted on No. 4.

"That was a very crucial hole because it put her up by seven," said Kerdyk, the No. 1-ranked player in the NCAA with a 74.11 average. "You know how football games go — if you lose the first half, you can still come back and win the second. Well, after that hole, a comeback seemed pretty impossible."

Williams won the seventh despite never hitting the fairway. Her drive was wide left, and her second shot sailed right into a stand of trees. But she used a wedge to pitch over the trees and sank a 10-foot putt for a birdie.

"Getting out of that jam really gave me a lift," said Williams, No. 5 in the NCAA rankings.

Williams went nine up after the ninth and completed the match on No. 10 when she had a bogey and Kerdyk had a double bogey. It was only 2:15 p.m.

Williams, a six-foot native of Bethesda, Md., has made short work of most of her recent opponents. After her second-place finish in the U.S. Amateur, she won the Canadian Amateur and had the best fall season of her collegiate career.

"I didn't start playing until I was 16, and I think the experience is finally settling in," Williams said. "I had been playing basketball up to that point until I realized you couldn't make any money playing basketball. I didn't want to end up a secretary, so I thought it would be fun to play sports for a living."

"It sure has been enjoyable, but the real fun starts when you turn pro and get a paycheck with the trophy."

Miami's Sherrie Keblish, eliminated from championship play in the first round, came back to win the Ione Jones consolation flight with a 3-and-2 victory over Jill Briles of Oldsmar, Fla.

The Women's Eastern Amateur, one of the top women's amateur golf tournaments in the nation, is scheduled for June 11-13 at Prince Georges Country Club in Mitchellville, Md.

Kim Williams of Bethesda Country Club, Clare Dolan of Montgomery Village, and Liz Fry of the University of Maryland, highlight the list of local golfers expected.

They will join former U.S. Women's Amateur champion Carol Semple Thompson of Sewickley, Pa., Curtis Cup player Lancy Smith of Williamsville, N.Y., Ohio State all-America Dottie Pepper, University of Georgia standout Cindy Schreyer, and zero handicapper Leslie Shannon of Hamden, Conn.

Williams, after winning the Women's District and Maryland State titles last season, gained the finals of the U.S. Women's Amateur, and then won the Canadian Women's Amateur.

Dolan, the only girl on Seneca Valley High's outstanding team, won the National PGA Junior Girls championship last summer.

Absent from the field of 80 will be Cindy Davis of Prince Georges, who briefly was a professional but has applied to regain her amateur standing. Davis won all three area women's amateur tournaments in 1983, then turned pro. She became disenchanted after playing the women's mini-tour last year, and the U.S. Golf Association granted her permission to return to amateur status, but not until January.

Williams has to be considered a favorite anytime she tees it up. Coming off a win in the Southern Amateur at Mid Pines, Williams led a seven-wire to score a seven-stroke victory in the Eastern Amateur held at Prince Georges

Williams opened with a under-par 70 followed with a over 76 in rainy weather finished with a strong 73 in conditions. Caroline Keggi paired with Williams the last and was just two strokes off. But Williams consistent in swirling winds was able. She hit 16 greens in 10—many with short irons Keggi struggled.

Williams only miscue came on 14 missed the green to the left of the hole. She quickly got the ball back on the par-5 16th when she took two wood shots within 100 yards of the green. She pitched and drained her birdie putt, to make it even par.

## Williams Wins Women's Golf

Kim Williams of Bethesda Country Club shot even-par 73 in difficult, windy conditions at Prince Georges Country Club for a seven-stroke victory in the 74th Women's Eastern Golf Association championship yesterday.

Williams' 54-hole total of 219 also matched par and easily outdid Caroline Keggi of Waterbury, Conn., who was second at 78—226.

For Williams, 22, a resident of Potomac, this is a third national-level women's title in two years. After narrowly losing in the final of last summer's U.S. Women's Amateur, she won the Canadian Amateur. This season she has won the Southern Amateur, and now the Eastern.

What's left? The Western. Williams departs today for that tournament in Ann Arbor, Mich. She also is an automatic qualifier for the upcoming U.S. Women's Open, and likely will be named to the U.S. Curtis Cup team.

Williams, at 6 feet, 160 pounds, opted to pursue golf over basket-

ball, and her display yesterday left little doubt she chose well.

"I thought it would be close," said Williams, who plans to transfer from Mississippi State to Florida International in Miami for her senior year. She cites a year-round golf season and better courses to play.

Williams credited Bethesda club-mate and strong area player Dave King with helping her with her swing. "I was picking the club up too quickly on my backswing," she said.

King will caddy for Williams in the women's U.S. Open next month at Baltusrol in New Jersey.

"There wasn't much I could do," watching Williams' margin keep growing from two strokes, said University of New Mexico player Keggi.

# Cindy Davis leaves pro ranks

The area's leading women amateur golfers haven't heard the last of Cindy Davis of Prince Georges Country Club, who was their chief nemesis during the four years she was ranked No. 1 before turning pro last summer.

"I'll be back," she warned after writing to the United States Golf Association last week to request restoration of her amateur status.

Yes, she'll be back, but not until next year, at least. The USGA normally requires a two-year probationary period before reinstatement. However, in cases where the applicant has been a pro for less than a year, as in Davis's case, the period is shortened, usually to one year.

The rules require that an application for amateur reinstatement must be filed through an amateur golf association, which is expected to make a recommendation. Davis will probably apply through the Women's District Golf Association, whose championship she won two years ago, the only time she competed in it.

Asked what the WDGA's reaction might be, rules committee chairman Nancy Hollenbeck said, "Cindy's a wonderful girl. We'll be delighted to have her back."

Davis won about \$2,300 in six mini-tour tournaments in Florida and the midwest last summer while preparing to qualify for the Ladies PGA Tour. At the final qualifying school in Houston last October she missed getting her tour card by two strokes.

"There's nothing wrong with life on the pro tour," the Furman graduate said. "I don't want to knock it. But it's a different life, and not the life for me. Not for the kind of person I am."

"You're living on the road, and the golf at the pro level is different. You're playing for a living. That wasn't for me."

"For me golf has always been one of the enjoyments of life. I've always loved golf and always will. I didn't

want it to become my work.

"But I wanted to try it, to find out if it was for me or not. I felt I owed it to myself to find out. It took courage, and I found out quicker than I expected."

"I feel I could have made it on the tour, but it just wasn't the life I wanted."

Davis, a member of Bowie High's 1979 state championship team, had chalked up an outstanding record before departing the amateur ranks last June after graduating from Furman.

In four years she won seven regional major championships — three Middle Atlantic, two Maryland State and two District — including each one in 1983 for a single-year Triple Crown.

Davis tied for second low amateur in the 1982 U.S. Women's Open and finished second, after leading on the final morning, in the 1983 NCAA. She also finished third in the 1983 Women's Eastern Amateur, which this year will be held at Prince Georges, June 11-13. Her father John is chairman.

Davis is doing paralegal work for tax lawyers in a downtown law firm. She plans to earn a masters in business administration at the University of Maryland and get into the business side of golf for a living.

Her return to amateur competition will probably occur just as her successor, Kim Williams of Bethesda, a Mississippi State junior, will be heading for the pro ranks after graduation.

Williams took over the No. 1 rank-

ing last year after winning the Maryland, District and Canadian Women's championships, and finishing second in the U. S. Women's Amateur.

She is off to a good start this year, having already won the prestigious Doherty Challenge Cup in Florida last month.

# Mont. Village wins state golf title

Montgomery Village's women's team had a surprisingly easy time beating Green Spring Valley Golf Club for the Maryland State team championship yesterday.

It was the first time the Gaithersburg club had gotten as far as the semifinals.

The Village team won 5½ points at Green Spring Valley in Garrison, Md., and three at home for an 8½-3½ victory.

A bit of strategy by team captain Shirley Kushner apparently paid off. She sent her No. 1 team, which was Maryland champion Clare Dolan and herself, to play away instead of staying home to be available in the event of a playoff, which would be held there. The strategy also avoided another confrontation between Do-

lan and Sarah LeBrun, whom Dolan beat in the finals of the state individual championship last week.

Green Spring Valley sent its No. 1 team — LeBrun, who plays No. 2 on the Duke team, and Carolyn Boykin — to Montgomery Village.

The result was that Montgomery Village won five and a half out of a possible six points in the two No. 1 matches. At Green Spring Valley, Dolan and Kushner beat Faith Riggs and Sana Naylor, 2½-½, and at the Village, Sharon Briggs and Rosemary Pricci shut out the favored LeBrun-Boykin tandem, 3-0.

Dolan-Kushner were two down after the fifth hole, but won the sixth and eighth to halve the front side, ½-½. They then won the 11th, 12th, 14th and 15th holes to win the match, 4 and 3, and pick up two and a half points.

Kushner said she and Dolan went to Green Spring Valley because she had heard that LeBrun was going to be out of town and would not play.

"I didn't find out until our match ended on the 15th hole that LeBrun was playing against us in Gaithersburg," she related later. "It gave me some qualms."

Kushner need not have worried. Briggs, runner-up for the Women's District championship last month, and Pricci failed to knuckle under and played their best golf under pressure.

Briggs-Pricci won the third and fourth holes to take an early two-up lead. After LeBrun-Boykin won the next two with birdie-par, Pricci birdied the short seventh hole to regain the lead and win the front nine, 1 up.

LeBrun birdied the 10th hole and

won the 14th with a par to take the lead, 1 up. Briggs-Pricci responded by winning the next three holes with three 3's. Briggs birdied the 15th, both partners parred the 16th and won when both opponents three putted, and Pricci birdied the 17th. The visitors' chances of salvaging a half point by winning the last hole vanished when LeBrun drove her tee shot into a parallel hazard.

In the second match at Green Spring Valley, Kathy Malpass and Sandy Yolles won three more points for the Village. They won the front nine, 6 up, and the back, 1 up, from Susan Oberke and Nancy Brewster.

In the other match at Montgomery Village, Tinker Eck and Mary Harper won all three points for Green Spring Valley. They beat Dot Mathes and Marilyn Hunt, 1 up, on each side.

Two weeks ago, there were a couple of days in northern New Jersey that Lois Ledbetter calls "the highlight of my life," when she accompanied Nancy Lopez and Beth Daniel in the first two rounds of the U.S. Women's Open golf championship.

"It was the first time I had ever seen gallery ropes [from the inside] and had people pay to see me play," the tall 21-year-old from Lakewood Country Club said yesterday.

But she said that two weeks from now, in the U.S. Women's Amateur near Pittsburgh, her all-time highlight film might have to be lengthened another reel.

Ledbetter yesterday tied for the medal in sectional qualifying for the Women's Amateur as she, Clare Dolan of Montgomery Village

and Sarah LeBrun from Green Spring Valley near Baltimore each shot 75, one over women's par at Columbia CC.

The field of 18 aspirants played the men's white tees at Columbia, the distance measuring roughly the same as the 6,128 yards at Fox Chapel GC in suburban Pittsburgh, site of the

championship. And 75 was a commendable score.

Seven contestants qualified for the Pittsburgh trip, and the other spots went to Liz Fry, University of Maryland, at 78; Beth Ward, Harrisburg, Pa., 80; Bonnie Fry, Havre de Grace, Md., 81, and, after a playoff, Susan Thomas, West Chester, Pa., with 82.

Thomas qualified by parring the first hole of the playoff, leaving Bonnie George from

Huntingdon Valley, Pa., to win first alternate from Montgomery Village's Sharon Briggs on later holes.

Dolan, the new Maryland Women's champion, and LeBrun, Dolan's final-round victim last week, each played steadily with three bogeys and two birdies. Each will play in her first U.S. Women's Amateur.

# Dolan Wins Amateur With Brother's Help

Clare Dolan's golf game was good enough last summer to win the national PGA Junior Girls Championship, and good enough last fall to help Seneca Valley to the Maryland state high school title.

But a tuneup under the guidance of her brother Bob and former PGA Tour player Jerry Heard, improved Dolan's game even more, and in mid-July, she defeated Sarah LeBrun for the Maryland Women's Amateur championship.

The following week, Dolan, 18, of Montgomery Village, shot 75 at Columbia Country Club and shared the medal with LeBrun and Lois Ledbetter in leading seven qualifiers into one of golf's prestige events, the U.S. Golf Association Women's Amateur, to be held at Fox Chapel in Pittsburgh, Monday through Aug. 10.

After finishing high school, Dolan went to South Seas Plantation on Captiva Island, near Fort Myers, Fla., where her brother is head pro and Heard is director of golf. Heard helped with her short game, and a new graphite driver and her brother's tips added distance to her tee shots.


With the double improvement, she shot par for 15 holes in defeating LeBrun in the Maryland State Golf Association women's tournament. LeBrun, of Duke University and Owings Mills, Md., had won the three previous meetings between the two.

"All our matches were so close before," Dolan said. "I just felt if I could really hit the ball well, I could win. I finally got her this time."

Dolan had rounds of 74 and 75 last autumn at the University of Maryland to win the state high school girls title. Her total tied that of the boys winner, Doug Ridgway.

After the national amateur, Dolan will likely play in the Middle Atlantic Women's tournament in September. Then she will be off for her freshman year at Stanford, where she earned a full golf scholarship.

"I just can't wait to get out there," she said. "I'm pretty excited about it. They have some good players, and I'll have to work very hard."


