Elder's 69 Leads Keefer Cup

Lorraine Elder of Annandale, the No. 1 player on the Florida State women's team, eagled her second hole and went on to shoot net 69 to take a one-stroke lead after the first round of the 36-hole Women's District Golf Association's Keefer Cup yesterday at Chevy Chase Club.

Elder, 21, had a one-over-par 72 for her gross score to also lead that division

Rita Chadwick of Lakewood Country Club (80-10—70) and Dot Gates of Columbia Country Club (83-13—70) were tied for second. Michelle Mackall of Montgomery (74-3—71) was third in the event, which begins the WDGA season.

Elder, who plays out of Army Navy Country Club, began play on the back nine and three-putted her first hole (the 10th) for bogey. On the next hole, the par-5 11th,

On the next hole, the par-5 11th, Elder reached the green in two after fine tee and three-iron shots, then sank the putt for her eagle 3. She later had three birdies on a course she said was playing shorter than usual.

The only thing bothering Elder was shaky putting. Three of her six bogeys were the result of three-putt greens.

Chadwick, 41, was "furious" after double-bogeying her two final frontnine holes, but with the help of soothing words from playing partner Betty Hall, she regrouped for a back-nine 39.

Gates, 48, also a swimmer and platform tennis player, birdied the par-4 fifth hole after her eight-iron approach shot landed two feet from the hole. But she had two double bogeys early in her final nine and struggled to an incoming 43.

Mackall, 25, who works in the pro shop at Washingtonian Country Club, birdied her last three holes and five of her final nine.

Last year's champion, Michelle Hiskey, a student at Duke University, did not participate.

Elder Wins the Keefer Cup

Lorraine Elder eagled Chevy Chase Club's 11th hole for the second straight day and went on to shoot 75-3—72 to earn a two-shot victory in the Women's District Golf Association's Keefer Cup tournament vesterday.

nament yesterday.

Elder, 21, of Annandale and Army Navy Country Club, had a 36-hole net total of 141 to beat Nada Reuss, also of Army Navy, who had 143. Reuss, a 13-handicap player, shot an 82 that resulted in yesterday's best net round, 69.

Former Keefer Cup winner Carol Hawley of Chevy Chase (net 73), Carol Davies of Norbeck (73), Betty Lou Williams of Army Navy (71) and Michelle Mackall of Montgomery (74) tied for third low net, 145.

Elder, the No. 1 women's player at Florida State, three-putted the

10th hole for bogey to go four over par for the day and allowed Mackall to pull within one stroke.

The 407-yard, par-5 11th hole was decisive. Elder hit a long drive, put her 4-iron second shot onto the green and curled in a 25-foot putt for eagle. Mackall took bogey 6 on the hole to fall from the chase.

"I think I'll just keep playing that hole," said Elder, who won the Louisiana State women's invitational this spring.

Elder did not play as solidly as she did in Wednesday's opening round, when she led by one shot with 72-3—69. After her eagle, she hit into several greenside sand traps, but saved par twice.

On the final approach, she was faced with a difficult 70-foot sand shot. Her effort was too firm and the ball stopped 50 feet beyond the cup. But she two-putted from there for bogey and victory.

WRC Cup Goes To Sudden Death

BESTHESDA, Md.—As the last golfers began to come in at June 20's WRC Cup at Congressional Country Club, the skies began to cloud and the air turned chilly. What had been a bright, beautiful day was now beginning to turn ugly.

It would seem the tournament would be finished just before the impending rain would come, but four ladies were tied with a net score of 70 and a sudden-death playoff was needed.

But as quickly as the clouds came, they departed, and the sun shone brightest on Beth MacLean. MacLean emerged with the title in only two



playoff holes to edge past Sharon Briggs, Nancy Hollenbeck and Pat Zahand.

MacLean's 80, along with her 10handicap, put her in the playoff and an eight-foot putt on the second green gave her the victory.

"My game is really starting to improve," MacLean said with a big grin on her face. "I putted really well today."

The WRC Cup was originally to be played on Congressional's Blue Course but at the last minute was changed to the Gold Course. MacLean ran into trouble in the middle of the course but was still able to hang on.

"You really have to play your shots well on this course," MacLean said. "I played No. 9 all wrong. I went way off to the right."

Briggs (Montgomery Golf Club) made it to the playoff with a 76 gross and a 6-handicap. Hollenbeck shot a 78 (8-handicap) and Zahand an 84 (14-handicap).

Briggs, MacLean and Hollenbeck all did well on the first playoff hole and had to move on to hole No. 2. Zahand, of Westwood CC, bogeyed. Hollenbeck, of Army-Navy CC, was the only one to have an approach shot land on the second green. Briggs had a pair of poor chip shots to double bogey the hole. MacLean bogeyed the hole but it was still good enough for the win.

"This was the first time I've played this course," MacLean said sheepishly. She is a member of Hidden Creek.



Williams tops list of amateurs

Kim Williams' domination of women's amateur golf at both the national and area levels last year made her an obvious choice for No. 1 in the Montgomery Journal's annual rankings

Nationally, the Bethesda Country Club member lost a playoff for the U.S. Women's Amateur championship in Seattle to Deb Ri-chard, a University of Florida senior from Manhattan, Kan. Then, a week later, she won the Canadian Women's Amateur in Calgary,

Locally, she won the Maryland State and District titles. Returning to Mississippi State for her junior year kept her from competing in the

Middle Atlantic championship.

Cindy Davis of Prince Georges C.C., who turned pro last summer, had claimed the top spot in all four of the previous years that the women have neen ranked by the Washington Star's Dick Slay, and since then, by this writer in The Journal.

Williams' 1984 performance recalled the era of the Thirties and early Forties when Betty Meckley, of old Indian Spring and Kenwood, and Congressional's Helen Dettweiler achieved national stature.

Meckley won a U.S. women's senior title

Meckley won a U.S. women's senior title after winning three Middle Atlantic, two Maryland State and one District championships.

land State and one District championships.

Dettweiler won two Maryland and one District titles in 1937-38 before joining the WASPS in World War II. After the war, she became a charter member of the Women's PGA, predecessor to the present Ladies PGA, and won the Women's Western Open in her first pro competition. She is now a club pro in Palm Springs, Cal., where she gave lessons to President Eisenhower when he vacationed there.

The six-foot Williams, who played baskethall

The six-foot Williams, who played basketball for Walter Johnson High, also was qualifying medalist in the District championship and lost the scratch Payne Cup tournament at Congressional by one stroke to Brenda Seymour, whom she had beaten in the semifinals of the District.

She should dominate area golf and be a factor in national amateur competition for the next few years until she turns pro, which she will likely do after graduating from Mississippi State.

Not ranked because she did not compete in the area is Congressional's Sally Voss, a previous winner of all area titles. She ranked second to Davis in 1980, before medical studies confined her to the San Francisco area, and sixth in 1983.

Voss would have finished high in 1984 ranking if eligible. Last spring she won her third straight San Francisco women's amateur champion-ship. Later, she lost in the first round of the Women's Western Amateur in Hamden, Conn., but went on to win the consolation.

Seymour -- Beat Williams by one stroke in winning the Payne Cup at Congressional; lost to Williams in the District semifinals, finished fourth in the Middle Atlantic and sec-

fourth in the Middle Atlantic and second in the Keefer Cup.

Dolan — This Seneca Valley senior won the National PGA junior girls championship and the Montgomery high school individual title, beating the boys. She was beaten in the first round of the U.S. junior girls championship in Bothell, Wash., but finished second in the North-South Junior stroke-play championship in Pinehurst, N.C.. She was selected by Golf Magazine for its junior All-America. America.

Mackall — Finished second in the Middle Atlantic and was qualify-ing medalist in the Maryland State.

Davies — Semifinalist in the Maryland State, third in the Keefer Cup and qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur.

■ Ledbetter — This Alabama junior was a semifinalist in the District,

nior was a semifinalist in the District, and went on to the second round of the Trans-National, and finished fourth in the Payne Cup.

Fry — Won the Maryland State and District girls championships and reached the quarterfinals of the U.S. junior girls. Qualified for the U.S. Women's Public Links and was runner-up in the Women's Western Junior. Is a senior at High Point High.

Cayce — This daughter of Congressional head pro Kent Cayce is only 13, but much older in golf experience. She beat Dolan in the semifinals of the Maryland junior before losing to Fry in the final match. She won the Middle Atlantic PGA junior. Competing in her age class, she won the Little Peoples championship in Quincy, Ill., and the North-South in Pinehurst, N.C., and lost a playoff for the International Pee Wee Chamthe International Pee Wee Championship at Disney World. Golf Magazine selected her for its All-America in her age class.

Honorable mention goes to Karen Jones of Argyle C.C. and Oklahoma State and Lorraine Elder of Army

Nave C.C. and Florida State.

Williams trounces Kerdyk, 10 and 8, in Doherty Cup

The last time Kimberly Williams played a double-round, match-play final, she endured 36 interminable boles and lost on the 37th as the sun went down on Seattle in the U.S. Amateur Championship last August.

Compared to that marathon, Compared to that marathon, Williams' title run in Sunday's Doherty Challenge Cup final at the Coral Ridge Country Club was a 28-hole sprint. Williams, a 21-year-old Mississippi State golfer, defeated Coral Gables' Tracy Kerdyk, 10 and 8, for the most one-sided victory in the tournament's 53-year history.

"I guess I just didn't like the idea of another long, long day on

idea of another long, long day on the golf course," Williams said. "After lunch, when we teed off for the second 18, I figured if I played steady, she would have to play her lights out to win."

Williams' confident assessment was based on her six-hole lead after Sunday's first 18 holes. She took the lead on the 361-yard, par-five fourth hole when she landed an eight-iron shot 2½ feet from the pin and sank the putt for

a birdie.
"I just staked it on that one," Williams said. "That was the beginning of it, and I kept rolling. The key was my short game. I really won it on the first 18 when

I hit eight greens."
Williams birdied the 483-yard, par-five seventh while Kerdyk bogeyed and stretched her lead to four when Kerdyk three-putted the ninth for another bogey. On the back nine, Williams had five one-putt holes; Kerdyk continued

to struggle on the greens.

"This is like the opposite of yesterday when I couldn't miss," said Kerdyk, 18, a University of Miami freshman. "My putter failed me. It just didn't feel right in

my hands, and I couldn't get any momentum going."

Kerdyk tried a more aggressive approach to start the second 18

and took the third hole when Williams bogeyed, but the round took a bleak turn when Kerdyk three-putted on No. 4.

"That was a very crucial hole because it put her up by seven," said Kerdyk, the No. 1-ranked player in the NCAA with a 74.11 average. "You know how football games go — if you lose the first half, you can still come back and win the second. Well, after that hole, a comeback seemed pretty impossible."
Williams won the seventh de-

spite never hitting the fairway. Her drive was wide left, and her second shot sailed right into a stand of trees. But she used a wedge to pitch over the trees and sank a 10-foot put for a birdie.

"Getting out of that jam really gave me a lift," said Williams, No. 5 in the NCAA rankings.

Williams went nine up after the ninth and completed the match on No. 10 when she had a bogey and Kerdyk had a double bogey. It was only 2:15 p.m.

Williams, a six-foot native of Bethesda, Md., has made short work of most of her recent opponents. After her second-place finish in the U.S. Amateur, she won the Canadian Amateur and had the best fall season of her

collegiate career.
"I didn't start playing until I was 16, and I think the experience is finally settling in," Williams said. "I had been playing basketball up to that point until I realized you couldn't make any money playing basketball. I didn't want to end up a secretary, so I thought it would be fun to play sports for a living.

"It sure has been enjoyable, but the real fun starts when you turn pro and get a paycheck with the trophy."

Kim Williams of Bethesda Country Club shot even-par 73 in difficult, windy conditions at Prince Georges Country Club for a seven-stroke victory in the 74th Women's Eastern Golf Association champion-ship yesterday.

Williams' 54-hole total of 219 also matched par and easily outdid Caroline Keggi of Waterbury, Conn., who was second at 78—226.

For Williams, 22, a resident of Potomac, this is a third national-level women's title in two years. After narrowly losing in the final of last summer's U.S. Women's Amateur, she won the Canadian Amateur. This season she has won the Southern Amateur, and now the Eastern. What's left? The Western. Wil-

What's left? The Western. Williams departs today for that tournament in Ann Arbor, Mich. She also is an automatic qualifier for the upcoming U.S. Women's Open, and likely will be named to the U.S. Curtis Cup team.

Williams, at 6 feet, 160 pounds, opted to pursue golf over basket-

ball, and her display yesterday left little doubt she chose well.

"I thought it would be close," said Williams, who plans to transfer from Mississippi State to Florida International in Miami for her senior year. She cites a year-round golf season and better courses to play.

Williams credited Bethesda clubmate and strong area player Dave King with helping her with her swing. "I was picking the club up too quickly on my backswing," she said.

King will caddy for Williams in the women's U.S. Open next month at Baltusrol in New Jersey.

"There wasn't much I could do," watching Williams' margin keep growing from two strokes, said University of New Mexico player Keggi.

Cindy Davis leaves pro ranks

The area's leading women amateur golfers haven't heard the last of Cindy Davis of Prince Georges Country Club, who was their chief nemesis during the four years she was ranked No. 1 before turning pro last summer.

'I'll be back," she warned after writing to the United States Golf Association last week to request restoration of her amateur status

Yes, she'll be back, but not until next year, at least. The USGA normally requires a two-year probationary period before reinstatement. However, in cases where the applicant has been a pro for less than year, as in Davis's case, the period is shortened, usually to one year.

The rules require that an application for amateur reinstatement must be filed through an amateur golf association, which is expected to make sociation, which is expected to make a recommendation. Davis will probably apply through the Women's District Golf Association, whose championship she won two years ago, the only time she competed in it.

Asked what the WDGA's reaction might be, rules committee chairman Nancy Hollenbeck said, "Cindy's a wonderful girl. We'll be delighted to have her back."

Davis won about \$2,300 in six mini-tour tournaments in Florida and the midwest last summer while pre-paring to qualify for the Ladies PGA Tour. At the final qualifying school in Houston last October she missed

getting her tour card by two strokes.

"There's nothing wrong with life on the pro tour," the Furman graduate said. "I don't want to knock it. But it's a different life, and not the life for me. Not for the kind of person

"You're living on the road, and the golf at the pro level is different. You're playing for a living. That wasn't for me

"For me golf has always been one of the enjoyments of life. I've always loved golf and always will. I didn't

want it to become my work.

"But I wanted to try it, to find out if it was for me or not. I felt I owed it to myself to find out. It took courage, and I found out quicker than I ex-

pected.
"I feel I could have made it on the tour, but it just wasn't the life I wanted.'

Davis, a member of Bowie High's 1979 state championship team, had chalked up an outstanding record before departing the amateur ranks last June after graduating from Furman.

In four years she won seven regional major championships — three Middle Atlantic, two Maryland State and two District — including each one in 1983 for a single-year Triple Crown.

Davis tied for second low amateur in the 1982 U.S. Women's Open and finished second, after leading on the final morning, in the 1983 NCAA. Last year her Furman team took third in the NCAA and she finished 12th individually. She also finished third in the 1983 Women's Eastern Amateur, which this year will be held Amateur, which this year will be held at Prince Georges, June 11-13. Her

father John is chairman.

Davis is doing paralegal work for tax lawyers in a downtown law firm. She plans to earn a masters in business administration at the University of Maryland and get into the business side of golf for a living.

Her return to amateur competition

will probably occur just as her successor, Kim Williams of Bethesda, a Mississippi State junior, will be heading for the pro ranks

after graduation.
Williams took over the No. 1 rank-

ing last year after winning the Maryland, District and Canadian Women's championships, and finishing second in the U.S. Women's

Frights won't be a factor

in qualifier's 2nd Amateur

Two weeks ago, there were a couple of days in northern New Jersey that Lois Ledbetter calls "the highlight of my life," when she accompanied Nancy Lopez and Beth Daniel in the first two rounds of the U.S. Women's Open golf championship.

"It was the first time I had ever seen gallery ropes [from the inside] and had people pay to see me play," the tall 21-year-old from Lakewood Country Club said yesterday.

But she said that two weeks from now, in the U.S. Women's Amateur near Pittsburgh, her all-time highlight film might have to be lengthened another reel.

Ledbetter yesterday tied for the medal in sectional qualifying for the Women's Amateur as she, Clare Dolan of Montgomery Village

and Sarah LeBrun from Green Spring Valley near Baltimore each shot 75, one over women's par at Columbia CC.




