Thurner Shoots 74 for Lead in Keefer Cup

Pat Thurner of Congressional, who has played so little golf lately that, "I was afraid I was going to embarrass myself," shot net 74 (83-9-74) to take a one-shot lead after the first round of the 36-hole Women's District Golf Association's Keefer Cup yesterday at the Chevy Chase Club.

Joan Gould of Bethesda was second at 88-13-75, followed by Ellen McGowan of Springfield (87-11-76), Judi Enright of Army Navy (84-8-76) and Pressie Hoffman of the host club (89-13-76).

Thurner's 83 also tied her for the gross lead with Sheila Dagucon of Montgomery (83-3-80). Thurner, three-time Congressional women's champion, thought she was in a for a long day when she three-putted the first hole for a double bogey and went on to complete the front nine in 45.

But she birdied the 10th and 11th holes after hitting near-perfect 7-iron approach shots and shot a fine incoming 38 on a day when many players had problems with slick greens, high rough and difficult pin placements.

Defending champion Susan Fleming of Bretton Woods lost two balls in the rough and was out of the running with 97-9-88.

"I'm usually straight, but today I was all over the course," Fleming said.

Perennial contender Fran Schultz of Army Navy staggered in with 89-7-82. "I had a seven on a par-4 and a six on a par-3," Schultz said. "Just dumb thinking. I've never seen such scores,"

Thurner has been playing less golf and enjoying it more. "I used to play a lot—four and five times a week," Thurner said. Now, because she helps her husband with his business, she said, "I'm lucky to play once a week

McGowan Wins Keefer Cup In Playoff With Dagucon

Ellen McGowan of Springfield parred the first hole of a playoff and defeated Sheila Dagucon of Gaithersburg to win the Women's District Golf Association's Keefer Cup yesterday at the Chevy Chase Club.

McGowan, using her 11 handicap, shot net rounds of 76 Wednesday and 77 yesterday to finish in a tie at net 153 with Dagucon, whose three handicap was the lowest and best of all participants.

On the playoff hole, the 361-yard, par-4 first hole, both golfers were just short of the green in two shots. McGowan hit a 40-foot wedge third shot one foot from the hole. Dagucon's third shot stopped 10 feet from the hole. Dagucon then missed her putt and tapped in for bogey. McGowan made her short putt for par and victory.

Because she has a higher handicap than Dagucon, McGowan was given a stroke on the playoff hole, but it was a stroke she did not need. She won outright.

"That was the best hole I played all

day," said McGowan, 40, two-time and present women's club champion at Springfield Country Club.

McGowan opened this tournament. Wednesday with birdie-par-birdie-par and then five-putted her fifth hole for quadruple-bogey eight. The slick greens and thick rough caused high scores for most. "These greens will drive you to drink," said Fran Schultz of Army Navy, who struggled both days.

Pat Thurner of Congressional, the first-day leader with 83-9-74, shot a 48 on the front nine yesterday, had a 91 gross and finished tied for fourth with net 156.

Dagucon, 35, who moved here 1½ years ago from Wilmington, N.C., shot the tournament's best gross round yesterday, a 76, and easily won that division with a 36-hole 159, followed by Carol Davies of Argyle, 88-78-166

Joan Gould of Bethesda finished second net with 79-154, followed at 156 by Thurner, Carol Corrigan of Chevy Chase (78 yesterday), Opal-Hyde of Indian Spring (77), Laura Miller of Bethesda (74) and Davies

Ledbetter wins WDGA, eyes school, PGA Tour

Lois Ledbetter of Rockville and Lakewood Country Club is in Brentwood, Tenn., this week playing in the Women's Western National Amateur while comtemplating her future and reflecting on how she won the Women's District Golf Association championship at Bretton Woods Rec Cen-

As a magna cum laude graduate of Alabama in finance, she is considering going back to school for a master's in business administration. She also is thinking about law school.

On the other hand, her success at golf tempts her to try to qualify for the Ladies PGA Tour. She shot 67 for medalist honors and was runner-up in the Southern Amateur championship in Daytona Beach, Fla., last month. Two weeks ago she finished fourth in the Eastern Amateur in Charlottesville, Va.

Ledbetter also has tested her game against the best of the women pros. In the U.S. Women's Open at Baltusrol two years ago, she quali-fied as an alternate. When Hall of Famer Sandra Haynie had to withdraw, Ledbetter took her place and was paired in the early rounds with the great Nancy Lopez and Beth

After a nervous first nine holes, Ledbetter was able to hold her own against the pros. As a result, she has decided to try to qualify for this year's Open on July 13 in Boston, where most of the touring pros will be qualifying the day after the Du Maurier Classic in Quebec. The Open is scheduled for July 23-26 in

At Bretton Woods, Ledbetter had to come from behind on the back nine and survive a penalty on the 18th hole to win her first area major championship when her opponent, Karen Jones of Argyle, three-putted the first hole of a playoff.

After losing the first two holes, Jones, former District and Maryland State champion, won the third and fifth to square the match. She bogeyed the par-3 sixth to go 1 down, then won the eighth with a par, the ninth with a birdie 2 and the 10th with a par to take a 2-up lead.

Ledbetter regained the lead by winning three of the next four holes, including one birdie, on No. 11. Jones squared the match with a par on the short 16th, but went 1-down again on the next hole when her drive wound up behind a tree.

On the par-5 18th, Ledbetter got up and down from a greenside bun-ker and appeared to have halved the hole with a par, thus winning the match, 1 up.

The players had packed their bags in their car and were having lunch when officials notified them that Ledbetter had incurred a penalty on the final hole and lost it, and that the match was tied. They would have to

continue extra holes at sudden death. Jones three-putted the first hole to lose the match.

The penalty involved a rake that had been left in the bunker where Ledbetter's ball lay, but not near the ball. Before playing her shot, she removed the rake, raking her footmoved the rake, raking her foot-prints as she went. The penalty, loss of hole, was for raking her footprints before executing her shot. It violated the rule against testing the soil. "In the heat of battle, it did not oc-cur to me that I was violating a rule," Ledbetter said afterward. "If I had

lost, I never would have forgiven myself."




with two holes to play.

Ledbetter, an academic All-America and top woman player at Alabama, from which she recently graduated, won the first two holes with par-birdie and was never in trouble in her match against the 1985 champion, Brenda Seymour of Hidden Creek. She won the fifth hole with a par after both birdied the par 5 fourth and made the turn 3-up. She scored 35, 1-under-par, to Seymour's 39.


The tall 23-year-old from Lakewood Country Club in Rockville carried with her a new title and a heightened awareness of a basic rule of golf.

Ledbetter won the Women's District of Columbia GA championship Friday at Bretton Woods Recreation Center, 1 up in 19 holes against Karen Jones of Argyle. Except for a penalty, the final would have lasted the customary 18 holes.

Leading 1 up playing the par-5 18th, Ledbetter found the right bunker on her second shot, near where someone had left a rake in the sand. Ledbetter retrieved the rake and unthinkingly used it to smooth her footprint before addressing her ball.

Instead of apparently halving the hole in par 5 and preserving the 1 up margin, Ledbetter was forced overtime. But Jones three-putted for bogey 5 on the first extra hole and Ledbetter won with regulation par 4.

Penalty Can't Stop Ledbetter From Winning District Golf

Lois Ledbetter of Rockville appeared to have beaten Karen Jones of Rockville, 1-up after 18 holes, for the Women's District Golf Association championship yesterday at Bretton Woods. But five minutes after the match, the referee determined that Ledbetter had broken a rule on the 18th hole. The penalty she was assessed to even the match and Ledbetter and Jones were called back to the course to contin-

Ledbetter parred the first playoff hole to win when Jones threeputted and bogeyed.

In regulation, Ledbetter, of Lakewood Country Club, won the 17th hole in the see-saw match to take a 1-up lead.

Playing the par-5 18th, Ledbetter hit her second shot into the sand trap in front of the green. Someone had left a rake in the bunker. Before she played her third shot, Ledbetter took the rake-which was not near her ball-from the trap, raking away her footprints as she went.

"I should have spotted it when it occurred," said match referee Joan Coffman. "You can't touch the ground in the hazard with a club or otherwise before the shot,"

Jonés, a former winner of this tournament and the Maryland Women's Amateur, did not see the infraction and appeared to have lost the match on that hole after Ledbetter matched her par.

Five minutes later, Jones was back in the match when Coffman called the penalty. "I asked her [Ledbetter] if she had done it and

she said 'Yes,' " Coffman said.

Ledbetter, who kept her composure after the infraction by hitting two excellent shots and making par said: "I made a mistake and I deserved to lose the hole. That's the rule. I know that's a rule, but in the heat of battle, it did not occur to me. If I had lost, I never would have forgiven myself.'

Carol Davies of Argyle beat Fran Schultz of Army Navy, 2 and 1, to win the championship consolation; Rita Chadwick of Lakewood beat Pam Smyth of Congressional, 2 and 1, to win the first flight; Pat Zirkle of Army Navy beat Lois Finley of Kenwood, 2 and 1, to win the second flight; the third-flight winner was Timmie Weisbaum of Westwood, who beat Dottie Bennett of International, 2 and 1; and Kay Tyler of Kenwood beat Saily Finneran of Army Navy, 3 and 2, to win the fourth flight.

Ledbetter wins WDGA, eyes school, PGA Tou

Lois Ledbetter of Rockville and Lakewood Country Club is in Brentwood, Tenn., this week playing in the Women's Western National Amateur while comtemplating her future and reflecting on how she won the Women's District Golf Association championship at Bretton Woods Rec Cen-

As a magna cum laude graduate of Alabama in finance, she is considering going back to school for a master's in business administration. She also is thinking about law school.

On the other hand, her success at golf tempts her to try to qualify for the Ladies PGA Tour. She shot 67 for medalist honors and was runner-up in the Southern Amateur championship in Daytona Beach, Fla., last month. Two weeks ago she finished fourth in the Eastern Amateur in Charlottesville, Va.

Ledbetter also has tested her game against the best of the women pros. In the U.S. Women's Open at Baltusrol two years ago, she qualified as an alternate. When Hall of Famer Sandra Haynie had to withdraw, Ledbetter took her place and was paired in the early rounds with the great Nancy Lopez and Beth

After a nervous first nine holes, Ledbetter was able to hold her own against the pros. As a result, she has decided to try to qualify for this

year's Open on July 13 in Boston, where most of the touring pros will be qualifying the day after the Du Maurier Classic in Quebec. The Open is scheduled for July 23-26 in

Plainfield, N.J.
At Bretton Woods, Ledbetter had to come from behind on the back nine and survive a penalty on the 18th hole to win her first area major championship when her opponent, Karen Jones of Argyle, three-putted the first hole of a playoff.

After losing the first two holes, Jones, former District and Maryland State champion, won the third and fifth to square the match. She bogeyed the par-3 sixth to go 1 down, then won the eighth with a par, the ninth with a birdie 2 and the 10th with a par to take a 2-up lead.

Ledbetter regained the lead by winning three of the next four holes, including one birdie, on No. 11.
Jones squared the match with a par on the short 16th, but went 1-down again on the next hole when her drive wound up behind a tree.

On the par-5 18th, Ledbetter got up and down from a greenside bun-ker and appeared to have halved the hole with a par, thus winning the match, 1 up.

The players had packed their bags in their car and were having lunch when officials notified them that Ledbetter had incurred a penalty on the final hole and lost it, and that the match was tied. They would have to

continue extra holes at sudden death. Jones three-putted the first hole to lose the match.

The penalty involved a rake that had been left in the bunker where Ledbetter's ball lay, but not near the ball. Before playing her shot, she removed the rake, raking her footprints as she went. The penalty, loss of hole, was for raking her footprints before executing her shot. It violated the rule against testing the soil.

"In the heat of battle, it did not oc-cur to me that I was violating a rule," Ledbetter said afterward. "If I had lost, I never would have forgiven








Lois Ledbetter goes pro

Lois Ledbetter of Rockville and Lakewood Country Club has turned professional and will compete as a professional in the U.S. Women's Open, which starts tomorrow at the Plainfield (N.J.) C.C.
"I want to find out if I can be a suc-

cess on the Ladies PGA Tour," said Ledbetter, the 1987 Women's Dis-trict champion and No. 1 player at Alabama, from which she graduated this year as a three-time academic All-American

The 5-foot 10½-inch winner of the Bear Bryant athlete-of-the-year award at Alabama — and who has considered graduate studies in law or finance -- said she can always go back to school if she does not succeed as a pro or doesn't like the life

of a tour player.

Cindy Davis, winner of the women's amateur Triple Crown in regional golf, who plays at Prince Georges C.C., tried the pro tour but decided that the life of a tour player was not for her. Her application for reinstatement as an amateur has been approved by the USGA, but she has not picked it up. She is studying for a masters degree in business administration at Maryland.

'I wouldn't want to be sitting at a desk in the years ahead and wonder if I could have made it on the tour. I just have to find out. School will always be there when I want it," Led-

better said.

Ledbetter, who won three straight women's championships at Lakewood, has shown signs of brilliance on the golf course. She shot a 67 to win medalist honors and was runner-up in the recent Women's Southern

Amateur.
In the Women's Western Amateur,

she lost her first match but won the championship consolation.

Last year Ledbetter qualified for the U.S. Women's Amateur in Santa Cruz, Calif., but lost her first match. She finished second in the Women's Western. She won the prestigious Payne Cup, a 36-hole scratch competition played at Congressional.

The highlight of her golfing career

probably occurred two years ago at the U.S. Women's Open at Baltusrol in Springfield, N.J.

She got into the championship as an alternate for Hall of Fame star Sandra Haynie, who had suffered a disability that forced her to withdraw. Playing in Haynie's place, she was paired with two LPGA super-

stars, Nancy Lopez and Beth Daniel.
Playing with Lopez and Daniel before large galleries, Ledbetter natu-

rally experienced a slight case of jitters. Even so, she shot two rounds of 79 and 75 and missed the 36-hole cut by only three strokes.

Ledbetter shot 75 in Boston last week to qualify for this week's U.S. Open. Kim Williams of Bethesda, who has started to win money on the tour, shot 79 and missed qualifying.

Following the Open, Ledbetter will test her game in two tournaments on the Futures Tour, the women's second pro tour. One will be in Jamesburg, N.J., Monday and Tuesday. The other will be in Wichita, Kan., Aug. 24-26.


