KAREN F. ELDER Golfer, Former Navy Officer

Karen F. Elder, 52, a former Navy officer who was a golfer and stamp collector, died of leukemia March 20 at Bethesda Naval Hospital. She had maintained a home in Annandale since 1965 and had lived there permanently for a decade.

A native of Salt Lake City and a history graduate of the University of Utah, Mrs. Elder joined the Navy as an ensign in 1960. She resigned the next year after serving as an administrator in the Naval Schools Command in Newport, R.I.


The wife of a Navy officer, she accompanied her husband on assignments to England, Hawaii, Japan and Newport in addition to Washington.

Mrs. Elder was a member of the Army-Navy Country Club golf team that won the Virginia state team golf matches in 1982 and was historian of the Women's District Golf Association. A stamp collector, she also worked as a volunteer in the philatelic department of the Smithsonian Institution.



Fairley Captures Keefer Cup

Newcomer Beats Wind, Rough Start in 5-Stroke Win

Someone forgot to tell newcomer Paula Fairley of Great Falls how hard it is to win the Women's District Golf Association Keefer Cup—especially at difficult Chevy Chase Club, playing in gusty winds, on slick greens and on her first try. Fairley, a new member at River Bend, recovered from first-hole misfortune and finished with a net 71 for a two-day total of 140 and a five-shot victory over Dory Beltson of Army Navy, who finished at 74—145. Both play to 12 handicaps.

Pressie Hoffman of the host club was third at 73—147, followed at 149 by Trish Gates of Columbia (74 yesterday), Betty Davis of Bethesda (75) and Ruth Ann Verell of Belle Ha-

ven (77). "She's a charming lady, hits a beautiful ball and putts really well," said runner-up Beltson, who pulled even on the first hole when Fairley three-putted for a double-bogey.

But soon thereafter, Fairley put the rest of the field in her rear-view mirror by sinking long putts for natural birdies at the seventh and ninth holes and was generally steady the rest of the way.

"I was very nervous," said Fairley, 44, whose family of three moved here last June from Stamford, Conn. "It's the first time that I've led a tournament after the first round and had to keep it together. The wind made it hard to concentrate. It blows you all around."

Leland Ingham of Columbia Country Club won the gross division with her second straight 76 for a total of 152.

In individual competition, the annual Keefer Cup Tournament brought, as usual, the strongest District players to the Chevy Chase Club on the first two beautiful days of May. Newcomer Paula Fairley of River Bend, a 12-handicapper playing in her first major

District tournament, netted an astounding 140 for 36 holes to lead the field of 72 by five strokes. Dory Belton of Army-Navy, also carrying a 12 handicap, came in second with 145. Third net went to Pressie Hoffman of the host club, (165-18) 147 Trish Gates of Columbia, Ruth Ann Verell of Belle Haven, and Betty Davis of Bethesda were awarded fourth, fifth, and sixth net, respectively, by a match of cards at 149 each. Other winners in net included Ellen McGowan of Springfield, Susan Strittmatter of Mount Vernon, and Teddi Kurcaba of International, 150 net each; Sandy Schiavone of Hidden Creek and Dottie Bennett of International, 152 net each; and Malsun Lee of Indian Spring, 153 net.

The Keefer Cup gross division offered a run-away victory to Columbia's Leland Ingham, the only player with a plus handicap (+1) and the only one with immediate plans to turn pro.

Ingham handily shot (76-76) 152 to lead the tournament by five strokes in gross before heading home to pack for the up-coming Futures Tour, starting in Chattanooga, Tenn., and to celebrate her 25th birthday on May 3.

Second gross for the second year in a row went to Sheila Dagucon of Montgomery, who shot 158 to tie current District champion Shawn McCullough of Mt. Vernon. Carol Davies of Argyle took third gross with 159. KEEFER CUP

Women Tee Off on A Busy Season

THE WOMEN'S DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA **GOLF ASSOCIATION** kicked off the 1991 season with its traditional series of team matches—events that test the skills of the best golfers in each WDGA-participating clubhouse. This year, undefeated Columbia won the Division I championship, knocking off Army-Navy, Argyle, defendingchampion Montgomery Village, Mount Vernon, Chevy Chase and Westwood and accumulating 196 1/2 points in the process. First net went to Montgomery Village with 172 points. Argyle, which initially came on like gangbusters, had to content itself with both second gross (185 points) and second net (169 1/2).

Members of the victorious Columbia team include captain Leland Ingham, who headed to Tennessee for the Futures Tour the day after the May 9 team-match finals; Linda Collins, who did double duty as both team member and first division captain; the motherdaughter combo of Dot and Trish Gates; Jean Kennedy; Lenore Martinez; and substitute Beth Carpenter.

Bethesda took Division II with 184 points to runner-up Army-Navy's 173. Montgomery prevailed in Division IV with 175 1/2 points. Brooke Manor placed second with 168. Bretton Woods swept past International on the last day of play to win Division VI with 179 1/2 to International's 170 1/2, and undefeated Kenwood beat second-place Fairfax by 9 points in Division VII, 181 to 172.

Divisions III and V will be decided when rain-dates are played.



RULES AND INFORMATION FOR WDGA TEAM MATCHES

- Method of Play: 18 holes using the Four-Ball Match format. В.

- Tardiness: When a player is late the match will proceed after a five minute delay. The late player may join the bracket at any subsequent tee.
- Maximum of 14 Clubs: For violation of Rule 30-3.b., the panalty of loss of a point if discovered during the first hole or loss of 2 points if discovered anytime subsequently shall be subtracted from the violator's score at the end of the match. The opponent's score is not affected.

Undue Delay: Club has had the opportunity to field

- Procedure: third team. Each team shall consist of
 - a. HOST TEAM SHALL PATROL OWN COURSE.
 - If a delay occurs Host Team Member shall investigate. b.
 - Where undue delay appears, the offender shall be observed for one or two holes to ensure that the situation is not caused by bad play or loss of ball(s).
- d. If violation is apparent, the Host Team Member should confer with the Host Team Captain. If the Captain agrees, the panalty shall be assessed as soon as possible on the course.

2. Penalty:

- A player who is causing the undue delay shall be disqualified from that hole; her partner shall not be penalized.
- Ascenb. If undue delay occurs between holes, the player shall be disqualified from the next hole. Her partner shall not be penalized.
 - If a player persists in undue delay, on the second offense the side shall be disqualified from the match, losing any points won in the bracket involved. The opponents shall receive the points from the remaining holes.
- Ineligible PLayer: For using the ineligible player, a team shall lose any points won in the bracket involved. Points won by opponent stand as earned.

Default: G.

If a team should default by non-appearance at a scheduled team match, the team shall be barred from further team play in the current season. ALL points won or lost by the team will be withdrawn.

- 2. If a team should default by non-appearance at the final match the penalty is as follows:
 "A team must field a full team at the last match or the team members absent would be ineligible the following year". Please note: This rule holds true even when the last match is a make-up/rain-date.
- H. Failure to Field Full Team: Unless special dispensation be granted by the District Team Chairman and the Second Vice President, a team fielding fewer than six players more than once will forfeit all points won in that season. All regular members will be ineligible for team play the following year. Please note: A team must field a full team at the last match even when the last match is a make-up/rain-date.

II. COMPOSITION OF TEAMS: Who see hand you was has been reduced to

- A. Number of Teams Permitted: Every club may field at least one team. No club shall be permitted to field a fourth team before another club has had the opportunity to field its second and/or third team. Each team shall consist of six regular members, with two substitutes for the first team and one substitute for each succeding team.
- B. Submitting Three or More Teams: For clubs submitting three or more teams, those teams will be put into pools (i.e., a pool consisting of 3rd submitted teams, a pool consisting of 4th submitted teams, etc.) and a blind draw will be conducted to select a team to fill out a division. Should a blind draw become necessary the following year, the teams that participated the previous year would be eliminated from consideration in the blind draw, unless one or more of these teams would be needed, in which event there would be a blind draw also.
- C. Ascending Handicap Indexes: A club which submits more than one team must place its regular members in teams according to ascending handicap indexes.

III. PROCEDURE OF PLAY: where the original member of the

A. Scoring: Landicap index on the feam. That

1. Division I: 18 point system - 1 point for each hole won, point for each hole halved, and 0 points for each hole lost - GROSS and NET.

2. <u>Division II-VII</u>: 18 point system - 1 point for each hole won, ½ point for each hole halved, and 0 points for each hole lost - NET only.

3. All Net matches will be played with full course handicap with strokes off the low handicap index in the foursome.

B. Line-up of Players:

1. The lowest handicap index player (regular of substitute) on each team shall play in the first bracket. All other players may play in any bracket. If two players have the identical lowest handicap index the captain may play either one, at anytime, in the 1st bracket. First bracket must play opposing team's 1st bracket, 2nd bracket must play opposing team's 2nd bracket, etc. Line-ups must be submitted in a sealed envelope to the Host Team Captain and duplicate copies of the line-ups exchanged simultaneously by opposing Team Captains. If a substitute takes the first bracket position in the line-up, the opposing team's captain should be notified of that change before line-ups are submitted - either the night before or early the morning of play.

2. A <u>substitute</u> whose handicap index has been reduced in order for the team to comply with the division aggregate limit does <u>not</u> have to play in the first bracket if this reduction should make her handicap index the

lowest on her team.

C. Order Off the Tee: Provided agreement is reached between the captains, brackets may tee off in any order.

D. Suspension of Play:

1. Suspension of play shall be decided only by the Host Team Captain.

When play is suspended, it is recommended that players complete the hole, if possible. If not, mark the location of balls with tees, remove the balls and head in.

3. If play is resumed after a short interval, it shall begin from where it was discontinued.

4. If play is resumed on another day, it shall begin on the tee of the first incompleted hole.

5. On the designated rain date, the following procedure shall be followed:

a. Each team shall resubmit the same line-up used before suspension of play.

b. If a substitute is required, she shall be placed in the line-up where the original member of the team played, except when a substitute has the lowest handicap index on the team. That substitute shall play in the 1st bracket. The original low handicap index player shall than fill the vacant position.

E. Termination of Play:

1. The decision to terminate play for that day will be made jointly by the Host Team Captain and the Division Team Captain.

2. Should the members of BOTH teams, playing in the same bracket, decide at any point of the match that they wish to discontinue play, all players in that bracket shall be disqualified from the match and any delayed continuance of the match. No points shall be given to either side.

3. Should both members of one team in any bracket leave the course before the match has been decided, they shall be disqualified from the match and any delayed continuance of the match. They shall forfeit all points.

F. Disputes:

- 1. When disputes cannot be settled on the spot, play may be continued under USGA Rule 34-1.a. (Claims and Penalties).
- 2. At the end of play, disputes shall be referred to the Division Team Captain. If the dispute involves a USGA Rule of Golf, she will defer to the District Rules Committee for a decision. If the dispute involves other than a USGA Rule of Golf, and she cannot resolve it, the Division Team Captain shall refer the matter to the District Team Chairman.
- 3. All disputes must be settled no later than one week after match was played.
- G. <u>Pick-up</u>: IT IS REQUESTED THAT A PLAYER PICK-UP WHEN SHE IS OUT OF THE HOLE.
- H. Reporting Scores: Both teams are responsible for reporting scores to officials.
- I. Winners: At the end of the season's play, the team in each Division winning the greatist number of points will be the winner of that Division. The team winning the second greatest number of points in each Division will be the runner-up of that Division. The GROSS winner of the 1st Division will be the WDGA TEAM CHAMPIONS and the NET Team winner will be the runner-up.

J. Ties:

- 1. In the case of a tie for first place in any Division there shall be an 18-hole playoff, at a neutral course, on a date set by the District Team Chairman and the Second Vice President. If still tied after 18 holes there will be a sudden-death playoff of all brackets.
- 2. A tie for second place in a Division will be decided on the last day of play by a sudden-death playoff of all brackets.
- K. <u>Recording of Scores</u>: Individual score for Four-Ball Match Play must be recorded. (Revised USGA 1989 Handicap Manual, pages 6, 7, 48 & 49)

IV. ELIGIBILITY:

A. Player Eligibility:

1. Regular, replacement and substitute team members must be full members of the WDGA. WDGA members who are members of more than one club may play for one club only as a regular or substitute.

The handicap index of each regular, replacement and substitute team member is frozen as of November 1st of the preceding year. The only exception is a player who has just become eligible to join the WDGA on April 1st after posting winter scores from in-season courses. Her handicap index is frozen as of April 1st.

The established handicap index of an eligible individual joining the WDGA on April 1st from another area will be

frozen as of November 1st of the preceding year.

Replacements:

A regular team member may be replaced with the approval of the District Team Chairman and the Second Vice Regardless of a change in aggregate handicap President. index, the team shall remain in the same Division

The player being replaced may not play on a team as a

substitute in the year she is replaced.

Substitutes:

Unless special dispensation be granted by the District Team Chairman and the Second Vice President, a team member may be substituted for only twice, except in the last Division, when that Division has only five teams, the limit is once.

Use of regular team members in other Divisions as

substitutes is prohibited.

3. If no eligible substitute is available under these rules, a club shall field a bracket with one player.

4. If a team member needs a substitute in the last day of play and the substitute, on that last day of play, declines to play, she shall find a substitute to take her place or become ineligible the following year to play as a regular member or as a substitute on any District team.

D. Eligibility of Replacements and Substitutes:

Division I - The handicap index of replacements/substitutes may not RAISE or LOWER the team aggregate more than two (2) whole index points above or below that of the highest or lowest team in the Division. Replacements/substitutes must play with no higher handicap index than is required to keep their team aggregate within the Division limit.

Division II-VII - The handicap index of replacements/ substitutes may not RAISE the team aggregate more than two (2) whole index points above that of the highest team in the Division. There is no limit on how low a handicap index may be. Replacements/sugstitutes must play with no higher handicap index than is required to keep their team aggregate within the Division limit.

If two or more substitutes are placed on a team the same day, raising the team aggregate above the allowed limit, the Team Captain will decide as to the manner in which the index points will be reduced (taken from one only

- Each regular team member must pay a fee to be determined each year. The fees shall be collected by the Club Team Captain and paid on the first day of team play to the Division Team Substitutes pay no fees.
- VI. TROPHIES: A Team Trophy will be presented to the winner of the Division by the Division Team Captain.
- PRIZES: Each regular member of the winning and runner-up VII. teams of each Division shall receive an inscribed gold disc.

CLUB TEAM CAPTAINS' RESPONSIBILITIES: VIII.

- To determine that each player on the opposing team is eligible and that their course handicap is correct. Also to determine that the lowest handicap index player is in the 1st bracket and that the total team aggregate is accurate, particularly if opponents have a substitute.
- To determine that the WDGA dress code is followed.

When hosting matches:

To arrange for adequate caddies or carts.

To check with the Club Porfessional regarding conditions of the course with respect to use of carts. If carts are banned on the scheduled day of play, advise the Division Team Captain in time for postponement or

arrangements for play.

To receive line-ups in sealed envelopes and determine that the lowest handicap index players are in the 1st brackets. To check the total team aggregates carefully, particularly when substitutes are listed, to assure that reduction of handicap indexes are made when necessary. Also, to be sure that the handicap index of each player has been converted to the course handicap accurately.

If "Winter Rules" are being used, be sure to specify what is covered by "Winter Rules" on that particular

course (see page 91, USGA Rules of Golf).

To have members of the Host Club available thirty minutes 5. prior to commencement of play to assist with duties. 6.

To provide spotters, as necessary, to speed up play. 7.

To provide monitors on the course to keep the field moving and to caution players regarding undue delay. 8.

To assess penalty for undue delay, is warranted. 9.



10. To have members at the 18th green to record points and receive scores.

There will be two rounds today to make up for Tuesday's rainout. The final round is scheduled for Friday.







Tony Marlowe and Pro-Lady Tournaments Draw Capacity Fields

When rain forced the Women's District Golf Association's 1991 Tony Marlowe Two-Lady Better-Ball to be postponed for a week-from Friday, August 9 to Friday, August 16-many of the would-be participants were faced with a difficult decision. August 16 was also the date of the Middle Atlantic PGA's annual Pro-Lady Tournament to benefit the American Cancer Society. 



Golfer Hanley points her game toward pro tour

By MIKE BUCKLEY

Shannon Hanley spent her first four months out of college cramped into the starter's booth at PGA National Golf Club in Palm Beach, Fla., earning \$4 an hour and making the most of the precious few opportunities club management afforded employees to play the course.

She came home to Germantown in May, only to take off again on a three-month journey around a women's minor-league golf circuit, ambling to venues like Decatur, Ill., York, Pa., and Sunbury, Ohio, and staying in homes of nearby residents to cut

Hanley, who turned 24 on Saturday, hopes to trade these experiences and countless hours of practice into a spot on the Ladies Professional Golf Association Tour. She'll find out next week if it was worth it, when she turns pro and tries to qualify for the Tour next Tuesday through Thursday at Plantation Country Club in Venice, Fla.

Working in Florida "was a tre-mendous experience," said Hanley, who plays out of Congressional Country Club. "But some mornings... I had to be there by 5:30 and by the time it came to practice, I was awful tired. That was the problem. I feel if you have to pursue the playing aspect of golf, there's only one way you can do that and that's put in more hours of practice.

That practice has paid off with a pretty solid year of competition. After graduating from James Madison University last Decem-

ber and spending lots of time on the driving range in Florida, Hanley qualified for four events on the Futures Tour, the training ground for future LPGA stars and the recovery room for those trying to get back on the top circuit. Her best finish was 47th place, for which the \$217 prize would have barely covered the entry fee. The true prize, though, was a first look at the life of a touring pro.


"I made the cuts for all the Futures events I tried for, and I played very well the majority of the time," said Hanley, who will practice this week in Boca Raton, Fla. "I'd have one or two bad holes that would cost me.

She won the Maryland Women's Amateur championship last month, beating Maryland State senior champ Joan Lins a year after losing to Jane Fitzgerald of Beaver Creek in the finals. But her momentum duck-hooked a few days later, when she failed to qualify for the U.S Women's Amateur by shooting 83 at Columbia Country Club.

"I think part of the problem for me is that golf comes in such waves," Hanley said. "Some days you play well and some days you don't play well.

"I'm getting much better," she said. "When you get to this level, all you're doing is working on consistency, or what shots will give you the best consistency. It's course management now, more than anything else. My swing is in fine shape, it's just a matter of eliminating the errors. I'm learning to do that now. It's always a

learning process."

Bill Strausbaugh, the head pro at Columbia Country Club and Hanley's coach for the past 21/2 years, said consistency should come.

"What she's looking for is maturity and experience, and that comes with time," Strausbaugh said. "She'll have to get used to the pressure and being under the gun . . . those are things that all amateurs, when turning pro, have to overcome. I think she's got a very good chance.

Pro golf was once the furthest thing from the mind of Hanley, who as a 13-year-old used to tag along with her mother once a week to Congressional. She said she used to scoop balls from the water and use them to practice her chipping and putting, and soon she was smacking them off the tee in distance contests

with other juniors. "It was just a match to see who could hit the ball farthest," Hanley said. "It was never anything serious. Then the Women's Golf Association started and they had a little juniors program, where you'd pay two bucks and you'd get to play some of the courses in the area. There were only about three of us so it was no big

deal to the clubs." From there it was on to Connelly School of the Holy Child in Potomac, and golf became the summertime

sport lumped in with field hockey, basketball and softball during the school year. When it came time for college, though, golf bypassed field hockey as the sport of choice.

"I never really played golf with the exception of summers, until I went away to college," said Hanley, who started at Purdue but transferred to James Madison after two years. "I think I've still got a lot of field hockey in my golf swing. I think that's what increased my strength and I tend to hit a long way. Golf was still something I picked up along the

way."
"She just has a lot of inborn athletic ability," Strausbaugh said. "I mean, she could play point guard on a basketball team, too. Her talent is inborn, and her technique is improving.'

Two strong seasons at James Madison, tremendous improvement in her game and the lagging job market in December led her to explore the world of pro golf. For the past couple years Hanley helped out at youth golf programs around the county and entertained thoughts of becoming a teaching pro. But that thought died with the long hours and additional business training needed for a teaching apprenticeship.

Besides, what she really wanted to

do was play.

"I think when I went to college I felt like I had developed quite a bit of talent," Hanley said. "I had been working with my coach and I sat down and discussed the possibilities

degree in management, and it really became an issue of what I wanted to do. I mean, I've graduated from college, I've got my life ahead of me and if I was going to try to do something with golf, which is what I'd like to do, now is the time. I'll always have a business degree to fall back on, but golf is what I like.'

She'll try to make it her career next week, at the first of three LPGA Tour qualifying events. If she misses at Plantation she can try again next month in Palm Springs. The top 70 from each event move on to four more days of qualifying in October in
