Cool Style Serves Clasper Well

Wootton Senior Aims for 2nd State Golf Title, Team Honors

Even those who know Erin Clasper best have a difficult time gauging her performance during a golf match.

She refrains from hinting how her round is going—not a frown or even a slight smile. Whether 10 strokes up or 10 strokes back, she rarely displays any emotion. And that cool, calm demeanor has served her game well.

Clasper, a 17-year-old senior at Wootton High School in Rockville and the only girl on the boys' team, is one of the top high school girl golfers in Maryland. Last year, the all-Met performer won the state girls championship by 13 strokes and helped the Patriots earn consecutive Class 4A/3A state team titles.

"Her strong suit is her disposition," Wootton golf coach Jack Weiland said. "Her golf management is excellent. Erin makes very few mental errors on the golf course. She goes on to the next hole and doesn't let the last hole affect her."

Clasper followed up a successful 1997 high school season with an impressive summer showing. She took to the junior golf circuit, playing in tournaments in New York, North Carolina and Virginia. At the American Junior Golf Association JNH Marsh & McLennan Apawamis Junior tournament held last month in Rye, N.Y., Clasper finished fifth with a three-day total of 245.

In her win at the Bobby Bowers match-play tournament in July at

the Springfield Golf & Country Club, none of Clasper's four matches went past the 16th hole.

With each showing, Clasper's confidence in her game grows.

"I think she's just starting to realize how good she can be," said her father, Geoff Clasper.

Geoff Clasper, also an avid golfer, started his daughter in the sport. She joined the junior golf program at Congressional Country Club when she was 10. Her younger sister, who is also on the Wootton team, and brother complete a family foursome.

"You never play perfect," said Clasper, describing what she liked about golf. "There's always one shot you could have done better. You never shoot that perfect score. You can always do better." Clasper's strength is her short game, chipping and putting.

"If I get into trouble, I'm not going to blow it," she said. "I'm going to think I can still make par. I can get up and down."

Clasper continued to play this past winter, taking lessons at a heated indoor range. This summer, she estimates there were only two or three days when she wasn't out on the golf course.

"She loves to practice," Geoff Clasper said. "She will hit balls literally all day."

Clasper hopes to earn a golf scholarship to college next year. Her school of choice is the College of Charleston in South Carolina.

Meanwhile, her more immediate goal is helping Wootton become state champions for the third straight year. Clasper also hopes to successfully defend her individual title. With another strong showing at the state tournament, she has the chance to finish in the top 10 for the fourth year in a row. She was ninth her freshman year and third her sophomore year.

Of course, no one will have any idea until the scores are posted how Clasper did. Her placid composure will keep everyone guessing.

"You have to remain low key if you're playing really well," Clasper said. "You don't want to go and think you're playing really well, then, sure enough, you hit a bad shot. Then you're like, 'Oh my gosh.' You get this negative attitude and then you play worse. You just have to stay the same the whole time."































